## THOUGHTS FROM FR. SCOTT

As we celebrate the third Sunday of Lent, our thoughts turn more intently toward sacrifice and obedience. So, how are things going with respect to your promises and intended sacrifices this Lent? Are we preparing for Easter in the most appropriate way possible? It is important for us to check in on our promises and keeping them at the front of our minds during the middle of Lent. I am very pleased to see the large numbers of people turning out to deepen their prayer lives. If you have not joined us for Adoration and/or the praying of the rosary on the Tuesdays of Lent you are depriving yourself of something very beautiful and necessary. The Thursday evening Taize prayer is most beneficial and very calm hour of prayer. Additionally, praying the devotion of the stations on Fridays is another great way to reflect upon His Passion and grow in love for God. Please use these opportunities for prayer to help you through Lent and life so as to be immersed in faith.

My thoughts at this time of year turn to a very special group of people in our parish. The OCIA stands for the Order of Christian Initiation of Adults. This program is how adults seek full communion with the Church. Most people refer to those involved as "converts." Well, some are actual converts to the Catholic faith and others are not. Some folks are simply completing their initiation in the Church and others are being received into full communion. In any case, they are important for our parish community. This Sunday we begin an intense time of prayer for them and begin certain presentations of the Creed and Our Father for their reflection. After a great deal of study, they have come to a fuller knowledge of Christ and are now ready to accept the mysteries He left for us to follow. This week, we invite them to pray with us more intently and to be one with us in our proclamation of faith. So, continue to pray for these wonderful folks and when you see them encourage them in prayer.

**MARCH 12, 2023**

Of course, this is not the only group of people in our parish preparing for sacramental celebrations. We have two other groups of young people preparing for First Communion and Confirmation. These young people are just beginning to understand their relationship with the Christ and realize His presence in their daily lives. They need our prayers as well. To this end, I remind you that in the main gathering area of the Church there is a poster board listing the names of our OCIA, Confirmation and First Eucharist candidates. Immediately in front of the poster is a basket with the names of those receiving any sacrament of initiation this year. I encourage everyone to take a name from the basket and remember that person, by name, in your daily prayers until they receive the sacrament for which they are preparing. This is a great way for us to support those who are freely choosing to enter our community of faith in a most profound manner. The poster will be up and names will be available for a while. Please make an effort to pray for all of those entering any sacramental stage of their life.

This weekend we read the first of three catechetical Gospels presented to us during Lent. The first Gospel story is about the woman at the well and her encounter with the Lord who promises us the spring of life-giving water. The Gospel is about our baptism in Christ and how we are to live out our baptismal promises. Obviously, the story is also about repentance and forgiveness of sins. Our baptisms compel us to be people of repentance and forgiveness. Of course, this is the teaching presented in our Gospel story. So, as the Lord invited the woman to repent and believe in Him, we too should follow this example and drink freely from the spring of life-giving water. Finally, I pray and hope your Lenten journey is bringing faith alive in your heart. Lent can be a time of great change and growth.

**Thought for the week:** Thirsty? Come drink from the spring of life-giving water!

### VOILAND'S VIEW

I had a friend back in the day. She was intelligent and engaging, a good Catholic, and attractive. We had similar backgrounds and interests. We had different personalities, though. She was raised in a family where I noticed a lot of kidding around . . . on a personal level. The kidding around usually seemed to include an element of sarcasm or veiled criticism. It seemed to me that most comments made were intended to throw the other person off balance a little. You always had to be ready for what might be coming next. That pattern carried over into my relationship with this girl. Conversation between us often felt to me like getting a series of little cuts and bruises. It got old.

Now, kidding around has always been a part of my family upbringing, too. It is part of most family dynamics. To this day, my sisters, brother, and I exchange playful jabs in the course of our discussions. But there has always been a very low threshold of tolerance for any comments that come across as being mean. We stay aware of the words we speak and try to be conscious of how they affect others personally. Our parents would not put up with *any* disrespect of them, and it became clear as we grew up that we were to respect others as well. Respect meant not putting other people down. At best, it meant building them up. As kids, we weren't always so good at the 'building up' part, but we did know what was expected of us.

Expectations of common courtesy have pretty much evaporated in our culture. People tend to initially approach each other as competitors, or even enemies, rather than as friends or collaborators. There is an assumed hostility in the air that doesn't feel right. Not to say that *feelings* should be the primary factor in human interactions. In fact, feelings play a big part in *causing* the problem of our breaking apart as a society. Our hypersensitivity to every single comment made, that might possibly be interpreted as an insult – *when it was never intended as such* – is childish and truly destructive to social unity. But the specifics of hot-button topics like sex, race, religion, or politics are not what I'm talking about.


What I am talking about, in reference to perpetually sarcastic or argumentative behavior, is an unwillingness to let another person just be herself or himself. Sarcasm and constant teasing comes from a negation of the other person. It instantaneous "cancellation" of another. It is a way of climbing on top of the other guy or gal just to boost ourselves up. It is uncharitable; it is unproductive; it is stupid; and it is exhausting. Beyond a possible quick laugh in the right situation, there is no value in being a wise guy. Building ourselves up at the expense of someone else's self-esteem or dignity is for losers. It proves nothing.

The tendency to step on others to build ourselves up has deep psychological roots. You can bet that poor self-image is behind a ceaselessly sarcastic attitude. The eternally snarky probably had a pretty cold childhood. After all, it's hard to feel good about yourself, or anyone else, when receiving a simple compliment is hard to come by. That was much the way I sensed family life for my friend. Even her parents seemed to have the same cutting way of communicating – not so much with gory gashes, but with tiny lacerations – that built up over time. Behavior like this is a form of self-defense for a soul that doesn't get enough love and positive reinforcement as it grows.

It is important that the souls of our children be filled with love – a love that encourages goodness and drives out evil. Evil currently permeates our society and attacks our young ones. Electronic media makes it easy to attack each other from the dark. We can step all over each other without ever having to see the faces of the ones we hurt. And, be it through technology or in person, we have become increasingly desensitized to the damage our attacks bring about. Constant fear of being ridiculed or made fun of causes people to isolate and withdraw into themselves. Fear of negative attention stifles inquisitiveness. It kills creativity. It extinguishes joy. And it snuffs out the light that God made his people to be.

All of the teasing, mean-spirited kidding, and sarcasm can be countered with love. Loving others *first*, instead of stepping on them like a stone, will go a long way to turn our world around. We must love our children, encourage them in their growth, and intervene when others are pushing them down. 'Big kids' – adults – can benefit in the same way. It's the Christian thing to do.

# Jean's Jottings | Faith Formation News

As we turn the corner of three weeks into Lent, perhaps this is a good time to revisit our Lenten observances and ask if they are bearing the fruit of bringing us closer to God and inviting others to do the same. If you have gotten forgetful in your observance (as I have on some days) be patient with yourself and ask God to help guide you in your journey. Do you need to adjust your Lenten plan or tweak it a bit so that you are fertilized in the hope of transformation? Know this day and always that "the Lord is kind and merciful" and all He wants for us is to be closer to Him in all ways and to bring others closer to Him. I invite you to take a moment and think of one action you can take this week to help fertilize your prayer life and your relationship with Christ; perhaps you haven't taken the opportunity to pray the Stations of the Cross, Taize Prayer or go to a daily Mass since Lent has begun. Perhaps there is a spiritual reading or Scripture that you can choose to focus on. Once you decide what you are going to do this week, invite someone else to join you.

## **Family Connection**

Lent is a season for repentance. It is a season during which we are called to reflect upon and to live deeply the promises of Baptism. The well and the conversation about water immediately recall for us the Sacrament of Baptism. As the Samaritan woman was converted and sent on a mission because of the conversation about water, we too are converted and sent by our Baptism to preach the good news of Jesus to others.

Take this opportunity to reflect upon the importance of Baptism with your family. If you have photos or other mementos of your family's Baptisms, bring them out and take some time to recall the day of Baptism and its importance to you and your family. Create a prayer table that includes these mementos and a bowl of holy water. After you have spent some time talking about Baptism, invite everyone to listen carefully and prayerfully to today's Gospel. Read John 4:5-42 together. Ask how Jesus' meeting with the woman at the well is like Baptism. (Jesus knows the woman's sin and forgives her. The woman comes to know Jesus as the Messiah. The woman invites others to meet Jesus.) Pray a prayer of blessing for each member of the family that God will help each one live the promises of his or her Baptism. 
