NEW HORIZONS
The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary
by Fr. Mark Watson

THE HOLINESS OF MARY The Assumption reminds us that after her earthly life, since Mary was the Mother of Jesus Christ, was without sin and lived a faithful life, she was taken up into heaven body and soul.

THE HOPE AND VICTORY OF THE CROSS On the Day of the Assumption, the first reading is from the Book of Revelation. This reading presents the birth of the Messiah from the People of God. The woman is confronted by a large red dragon which represents Satan. The dragon wants to destroy the child. By the birth of the Messiah John does not refer to the nativity but instead to the Cross – the enthronement of Jesus. The death of Jesus, which is his glorification, is also the moment of the assault and defeat of Satan, by dying on the cross, While Jesus has promised that the “gates of Hades” will not prevail against the church, we must also expect that the church will ever be under fire from the dragon until the end.

In this scene God’s People are taken up into heaven which is symbolic of the Resurrection. Today we celebrate the time when Mary was taken up into heaven as a result of her role in salvation history. While we continue to experience the effects of sin and the power of evil in our world, we know that through the death of Jesus and our faith in his death and resurrection, we will be taken up into eternal life as was Mary.

THE VISITATION AND THE MAGNIFICAT In the Visitation, Mary visits Elizabeth as both are pregnant. Mary greets Elizabeth and John the Baptist leaps in Elizabeth’s womb. This scene shows that even in Elizabeth’s womb, John experiences the presence of Jesus who is the Savior. Elizabeth cries out, “Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb (Luke 1:42)!” “Blessed are you who believed that what was spoken to you by the Lord would be fulfilled (Luke 1:46).” Elizabeth says that Mary is blessed because God chose her to be the Mother of the Savior and because she had faith in that word and constantly lived out the word of Jesus.

Mary’s response is to praise God. Mary prays, “My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord; my spirit rejoices in God my Savior for he has looked with favor on his lowly servant (Luke 1:46-48).” Mary praises God for the ways in which God has mercy on her and on all of those who fear him in every age. This includes what God is doing for Israel in the birth of the Messiah. In the Magnificat Mary shows herself to be the humble servant of God whose life is a constant yes to God. Mary cooperates with the work of God’s grace in her life.

THE HOLINESS OF THE HUMAN PERSON Pope Pius XII proclaimed the teaching of the Assumption in the *Munificentimuss Deus* shortly after the Second World War. Some 75 million people died in World War II including many who died as a result of deliberate genocide, massacres, mass bombings and starvation. The Pope spoke a word of hope to a devastated world by writing about the dignity of the body and the eternal life which awaits us in heaven.

Pope Pius XII wrote in *Munificentimuss Deus* “Finally it is our hope that belief in Mary’s bodily Assumption into heaven will make our belief in our own resurrection stronger and render it more effective.”

This feast is a reminder that if we are faithful to the will of God we will experience a resurrection like that of Jesus Christ. Christ will hand the kingdom to the Father and then all those who belong to Christ will receive eternal life. Christ must destroy the powers which hold the living captive and this includes Death. This Feast reminds us that death is not God’s last word. Our faith in God and in the death and resurrection of Christ gives us hope that one day we will experience the fullness of eternal life.

INTERCESSION TO MARY Mary is not just passively waiting for us to join her in heaven. Mary wants to help us in our own struggle to reach heaven. We need only to call out to her for help. Mary is also our model of faith. May we attain heaven through faith in God and with the help of her intercession. May we pray for the intercession of Mary as we journey to join her in eternal life.

O Most Holy Virgin

Most Holy Virgin, who pleased our Lord and became his mother, Virgin Immaculate in your body and soul, in your faith and love, at this solemn jubilee of the promulgation of the dogma which proclaimed you to the entire world as conceived without sin, look kindly on us unfortunate ones who implore your powerful protection.

The infernal serpent, upon whom the primeval curse was laid, continues, alas, to attack and tempt the hapless children of Eve. Ah! Do you, our blessed Mother, our Queen and Advocate, who at the first moment of your conception did crush the enemy's head, do you gather together our prayers and we beseech you (our hearts one with yours) present them before God's throne, that we may never allow ourselves to be caught in the snares laid for us, but that we may reach the portal of salvation, and that the Church and Christian society may once more chant the hymn of deliverance, of victory and of peace.

THE DESTINY OF ALL MORTAL FLESH

The celebration of today's feast on a Sunday is unusual on our Roman Catholic calendar. Our observance of the Lord's Day is held in such high esteem that few other feasts replace it. Occasionally there is a feast—usually of one of the saints—in which the saving power of God in Christ is so uniquely focused that the Roman rite deems it worthy of celebration on the Lord's Day. Today is such a feast. Yet some are surprised at the brevity of the dogma in its entirety: "We pronounce, declare and define it to be a divinely revealed dogma: that the Immaculate Mother of God, the ever Virgin Mary having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul to heavenly glory." The Roman Catholic Church never defined any specifics or particulars about the event itself. It is not in the scriptures. There are no verifiable eyewitness accounts. At its core, the dogma reveals in Mary the destiny of all mortal flesh, and reinforces our creedal belief in resurrection of the body. This feast strengthens our faith, defined last week in Hebrews as the realization of things hoped for.

We find, in Mary, that realization of what we all hope for, what Paul today affirms: "In Christ shall all be brought to life" (1 Corinthians 15:22). Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

FEAST OF FAITH The Shape of the Eucharistic Prayer

Our Eucharistic Prayers originated in the traditional Jewish meal prayers known as *berakah*, which were prayers of thanksgiving used at meals. Over the centuries, the Christian thanksgiving, or Eucharist, gradually took shape. While in the East the Eucharistic Prayers (called *anaphora*) took many forms, in the Roman Church there was for many centuries just one Eucharistic Prayer, called the Roman Canon (now known as Eucharistic Prayer I). Almost all Eucharistic Prayers include the same basic elements. They begin with thanksgiving and acclamation. Then there is an *epiclesis*, as the priest calls down the Holy Spirit upon the gifts. Then follows the institution narrative and consecration, as the words that Jesus spoke at the Last Supper are repeated. After the consecration, we remember in an explicit way all that Christ has done for us—this is the *anamnesis*, or remembering. The prayer concludes with the offering, the intercessions—prayers for the Church, our leaders, ourselves—and a final doxology of praise. The reforms of the Second Vatican Council enriched our liturgy with additional Eucharistic Prayers, including both ancient texts (Eucharistic Prayer II is based on the most ancient of all existing Eucharistic Prayers) and new compositions. —Corinna Laughlin, Copyright © J.
