





Our Devotion for November is for the holy souls in Purgatory

Back in the Middle Ages, many Catholics began observing special devotions around a particular theme each month — the Holy Name of Jesus in January, for instance. Today, many families are reviving this practice as part of the way they observe the liturgical calendar at home. By practicing monthly devotions, the core values of the faith will become more alive within your family. The beauty of monthly devotions is that there is no set way to celebrate. So, be creative, make it fun, and adapt your celebration to your own family.

Here are some ways to celebrate the popular devotion for November, the holy souls in purgatory.

Talking with kids about the holy souls in purgatory

Sin is real. When we sin, we are taught to go to confession, repent and strive to avoid sin in the future. God, in his bountiful mercy, forgives us. Yet at the same time, our relationship with God is not fully healed simply because we ask him to forgive us. The Church teaches that a stain is left on our soul and that this stain must be fully erased before we are to enter heaven.

For example, let's say you purposefully ate your little sister's cookie without asking her. Your sister is sad; she cries. You apologize to her and she forgives you. This doesn't change the fact that you still ate the cookie. Your parents ask you to "make things right" with your sister. And so, you bake a dozen cookies just for your sister. You have made a genuine effort to make amends with your sister; your relationship is on its way to being restored.

We know that we cannot enter the kingdom of heaven unless our souls are pure. This means that any sins which have not been "made right" in God's eye must be reconciled. Purgatory is a place, a sort of rest stop, where we wait for our souls to be purified. The souls in purgatory cannot pray their way out. Instead, these souls rely on you and I, the living, to pray for them. By remembering the dead, praying for them and offering sacrifices on their behalf, these souls are able to enter the kingdom of heaven more quickly.

Learn about God's infinite mercy.

St. Padre Pio of Pietrelcina was an Italian priest who live from 1887-1968. He was canonized by St. John Paul II in 2002. In 1918, St. Padre Pio began to receive the stigmata, which are the wounds Christ received. These wounds would cause St. Padre Pio much pain and suffering. He received the stigmata for 50 years.

the holy souls in Purgatory...

St. Padre Pio quickly became a popular pastor. Hundreds of thousands of people made pilgrimages simply to be present during a Mass said by him. But God had even more work for the saint to do.

As Mary has taught us, many souls are lost to hell while many others remain in purgatory. God desperately wants us to be purified and united with him in heaven. God chose to use St. Padre Pio as an intercessor for those souls in purgatory. St. Padre Pio received many visions and, at times, was even able to converse with the souls in purgatory. Often, these souls would ask him to say a Mass for them, that God might grant them passage unto heaven. St. Padre Pio frequently reported seeing souls freed during the Mass offering.

St. Padre Pio was a very humble person. He felt so much sorrow for the souls in purgatory, that he often prayed through the entire night. The sacrifices that he endured show us his love and desire to serve God and to build His kingdom.

Charity

Help the church to grow within your own community.

There are countless ways that you can pray and sacrifice for the souls in purgatory. Have a family brainstorming session and come up with a plan that works for your family. Here are some ideas to get you started:

- Attend a daily Mass
- Recite the divine mercy chaplet
- Pray the rosary
- Pray at a cemetery
- Volunteer in your community
- Fast/abstain from foods
- Give up electronics
- Refrain from eating out at a restaurant
- Drink only water

What can your family commit too? Remember that extra prayers and sacrifices should be realistic, yet not easy. For families with children in a large age-range, consider an age-based and personalized plan.

BEHOLD ~ LOOK REVELATION ~ SEE ~ VISIONS



'HERE IS A THREAD OF *VISION* running through our readings on this Solemn Feast Day of All Saints. The first reading from Saint John's Apocalypse tells of visions he was given, in which 144,000 from the tribes of the sons of Israel, and a great multitude of saints are in the throne room of heaven.

Our Responsorial Psalm sings to the Lord of a "people that longs to **see**" his face. In our second reading from the First Letter of Saint John, he writes that we are now rightly called children of God, but what we will be has not yet been revealed. When it is revealed, we shall *see* him as he is. And finally, in Matthew's Gospel Jesus teaches his disciples the Beatitudes. He expresses that the pure of heart will **see** God.

This idea of seeing God is known as the **Beatific Vi**sion. Scripture tells us no man can see God's face and live. Think of Moses asking God to see his face, and God tells him he cannot, but so he can see God in passing, he positions Moses so that God can place his hand over Moses's face until he has passed, and then Moses can see the backside of God (see Exodus 33:20-23).


And yet, as Christians we have this great hope, based on John's letter that not only shall we see God as he is, but we will also be like him! If you took my advice a few weeks ago and watched the video on YouTube, How *Great Is Our God*, you will have been given great evidence

and imagery to contemplate the greatness—the vastness—of God as seen through his created universe. This is something Father Pilon has been talking about lately as well when he talks about googling images from the Hubbell and other space telescopes to see the marvels that surround us. If such beauty has been created by the very essence of beauty Himself, then on this feast of All Saints just contemplate that heavenly vision in which we place our hope in this life.

Indeed many saints have gone on before us and are in heaven even now. We may even know someone who has made it, and won the race and achieved the heavenly reward. Ponder on what the face of Love incarnate must look like. The image below is based on the image of the Shroud of Turin. It may well be a close facsimile of the face of Jesus of Nazareth. Jesus, whom we killed by our sins. Jesus, who forgave us those same sins and chose to suffer and die in our place. In the novel Le Misérables the protagonist Jean Valjean says that "to love another person is to see the face of God."



Not all saints, however, are in heaven at this moment. There are those whom we know as the Holy (or Poor) Souls in Purgatory. Those saints agonize in their purgation because while they cannot see God and be in his presence, they are aware that that is to be their ultimate destiny. They are in agony because there is nothing they themselves can do to further their position as far as going to heaven. It is only through our prayers and the prayers of the saints already in heaven that these soon-to-be heavenly beings can achieve that beatific vision. This is to be our focus always, but especially in the month of November. We are strongly encouraged to remember the holy souls in purgatory in our prayers.

Hamily Catechesis Corner

FLASH FORWARD TO THE FLASH FLOOD

ENESIS 6:5 AND FOLLOWING stays with story of mankind's sinfulness and depravity; When the Lord saw how great the wickedness of human beings was on earth, and how every desire that their heart conceived was always nothing but evil, the Lord regretted making human beings on the earth and his heart was grieved. So the Lord said: I will wipe out from the earth the human beings I have created, and not only the human beings, but also the animals and the crawling things and the birds of the air, for I regret I made them. But Noah found favor with the Lord.

God then followed up with Noah by warning him that because the earth was so corrupt and full of lawlessness, he would destroy all he had created—except for Noah and his family. He then gave Noah specifications regarding the building of an ark that would carry him and his family safely through the flood waters. The Lord established a covenant with Noah and had him gather one male and one female of every animal, all living creatures and bring them on the ark. This, along with his wife, his sons and their wives and all boarded the ark as the rain began to fall.

And so the rains began to fall, and a heavy rainfall continued for forty days and forty nights until the whole earth, including the highest mountains, was submerged under the floodwaters. The scriptures tell us that everything on dry land with the breath of life in its nostrils died. The Lord wiped out every being on earth: human beings and animals, the crawling things and the birds of the air; all were wiped out from the earth. Only Noah and those with him in the ark were left.

Noah's clan and the ark, filled with all of the animals, drifted without destination on these floodwaters. Over the course of one hundred and fifty days the water swelled on the earth.

God then sent a wind across the earth until the waters began to subside and receded, settling the ark on the top of Mount Ararat. At the end of forty days Noah opened the hatch and released a raven. It flew back and forth until the waters dried off from the earth. Then he released a dove to see if the waters had lessened on the earth. But the dove could find no place to perch, and it returned to him in the ark, for there was water over all the earth.

After seven more days' wait he released the dove again. This time the dove returned in the evening with an olive leaf in its bill. This told Noah that the waters had finally diminished on the earth.

ADELANTE A LA INUNDACIÓN REPENTINA

ENESIS 6:5 Y SIGUIENTES permanece con la historia de la pecaminosidad y depravación de la humanidad; Cuando el Señor vio cuán grande era la maldad de los seres humanos en la tierra, y cómo cada deseo que su corazón concibió no era más que maldad, el Señor lamentó haber hecho seres humanos en la tierra y su corazón se entristeció. Entonces el Señor dijo: Borraré de la tierra a los seres humanos que he creado, y no solo a los seres humanos, sino también a los animales, los reptiles y las aves del cielo, porque lamento haberlos creado. Pero Noé halló gracia ante el Señor.

Entonces Dios siguió con Noé advirtiéndole que debido a que la tierra estaba tan corrupta y llena de anarquía, destruiría todo lo que había creado, excepto Noé y su familia. Luego le dio a Noé especificaciones sobre la construcción de un arca que lo llevaría a él y a su familia a salvo a través de las aguas del diluvio. El Señor estableció un pacto con Noé y le pidió que reuniera un macho y una hembra de cada animal, todos los seres vivientes, y los llevara al arca. Este, junto con su esposa, sus hijos y sus esposas y todos abordaron el arca cuando la lluvia comenzó a caer.

Y así comenzaron a caer las lluvias, y una fuerte lluvia continuó durante cuarenta días y cuarenta noches hasta que toda la tierra, incluidas las montañas más altas, se sumergió bajo las aguas de la inundación. Las escrituras nos dicen que todo en tierra firme con aliento de vida en la nariz murió. El Señor acabó con todos los seres de la tierra: los seres humanos y los animales, los reptiles y las aves del cielo; Todos fueron borrados de la tierra. Solo quedaron Noé y los que estaban con él en el arca.

El clan de Noé y el arca, llenos de todos los animales, fueron a la deriva sin destino en estas inundaciones. En el transcurso de ciento cincuenta días, el agua se hinchó sobre la tierra.

Entonces Dios envió un viento a través de la tierra hasta que las aguas comenzaron a disminuir y retrocedieron, colocando el arca en la cima del monte Ararat. Al cabo de cuarenta días, Noé abrió la escotilla y soltó un cuervo. Voló de un lado a otro hasta que las aguas se secaron de la tierra. Luego soltó una paloma para ver si las aguas habían disminuido en la tierra. Pero la paloma no pudo encontrar un lugar para posarse, y volvió a él en el arca, porque había agua sobre toda la tierra.

Después de esperar siete días más, volvió a soltar la paloma. Esta vez la paloma regresó por la tarde con una hoja de olivo en su pico. Esto le dijo a Noé que las aguas finalmente habían disminuido en la tierra.

» What are the symbols of faith? «
These excerpts are from the Compendium of the CCC.

† What are the symbols of faith?

The symbols of faith are composite formulas, also called "professions of faith" or "Creeds," with which the Church from her very beginning has set forth synthetically and handed on her own faith in a language that is normative and common to all the faithful.

Further reading CCC ¶ [185-188, 192, 197]

† What are the most ancient symbols (professions) of faith? The most ancient symbols of faith are the baptismal creeds. Because baptism is conferred "in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit" (Matthew 28:19), the truths of faith professed at Baptism are articulated in reference to the three Persons of the Most Holy Trinity.

† What are the most important symbols of the faith?

They are the *Apostles' Creed* which is the ancient baptismal symbol of the Church of Rome and the *Nicene-Constantinopolitan Creed* which stems from the first two ecumenical Councils, that of Nicea (325 A.D.) and that of Constantinople (381 A.D.) and which even to this day are common to all the great Churches of the East and the West.




