LIGHT IN THE DARKNESS: TAKING TIME OUT FOR A SUFFERING WORLD



(MONDAY, 31 AUGUST-7.00PM)

On the eve of spring, the

Victorian Council of Churches invites all Christians to unite in prayer for our world. As the last light of the last day of winter fades on Monday 31 August, all are encouraged to stand in their front garden, spend some time in silence and light a candle to remember all those who have lost their lives to the Coronavirus or to violence this year.

Then, as the first night of spring begins, look to the future with prayer and hope. Let us move from the cold and the dark into warmth and light together.

SYMBOLS AND IMAGES

Keys are a symbol of authority. Jesus says to Peter, 'I will give you the keys to the kingdom of heaven.' Jesus entrusts his authority to Peter, and thus to successive popes and to the church. This authority must always be used with wisdom and compassion, and with it comes great responsibility. The crossed keys are part of the emblem of the papacy.

SHARING THE TRADITION

A closer look at the Scripture of the day, to see how it makes more explicit God's word to us through the teachings of Jesus Christ

The Pope is the Bishop of Rome, a city traditionally associated with Peter's evangelisating mission. This gospel text is the one that is traditionally used as the basis for the Catholic Church's teaching on the primacy of the Pope in guiding and unifying the church, although he is assisted in this task by all the bishops. There have been 266 popes from Peter to the present pontiff, Francis. The Pope's voice is an especially privileged one in the church. This does not mean that everything the Pope says or does is without error. What he teaches must be taken with seriousness because of the office he holds. There are only rare occasions when the Pope speaks solemnly and with full authority on any particular matter. At other times he is expressing the teachings of the church and offering an 'authoritative' guide to the faithful.

- Explain the structure of the church and how the Pope, bishops, priests and laity function together for the good of the whole.
- especially the two statements about Mary that have been made infallibly: the Immaculate Conception—that Mary was conceived and born without original sin (noting that many people confuse this with the virgin birth of Jesus); and the Assumption—that Mary was not subject to normal corruption after death but was taken to heaven, body and soul. Enquire how people feel about and understand papal infallibility.

DID YOU KNOW

Points of interest and Catholic lore

- Caesarea Philippi is north of the region of Galilee. It was given to Herod the Great by Augustus Caesar, and Herod built a white stone temple there, dedicating it to his patron. After Herod's death, it passed into the hands of his son, Philip, who built his capital here—hence the name, Caesarea Philippi.
- * The great stone temple built by Herod was at the natural spring that is the source of the Jordan River. The temple was dedicated to the Roman god of nature, Pan. The cave of Pan is housed in a high natural edifice of rock, and it was here that Jesus reputedly told Peter that he, too, would be a rock on which the church is built—not dedicated to a pagan god

GOD'S LOVE IS ETERNAL


In today's first reading we hear God speak in a way that we will hear in a new way, later, in the Gospel. God promises to replace an inadequate master of the palace of God's king with someone in whom God will invest true authority. With the authority of the keys, what this servant opens will stay open; what he shuts will stay shut. To the family of God, he will give stability and honour.

In the Gospel Jesus asks his disciples about who they say he is. Simon Peter's answer, 'You are the Christ, the Son of the living God', leads Jesus to speak to Peter in the way God spoke about Eliakim in Isaiah's prophecy. Peter will be the rock of stability on which Jesus will build his house of faith.

However, the authority of the keys given to Peter will far exceed that of Eliakim. Not merely earthly things but things in heaven will be bound or loosed on Peter's word. Such is the God Jesus makes known to us, who allows human beings such intimacy with God.

Paul has been pondering the mystery of God's salvific action for Jews and Gentiles in history. To-day he concludes this reflection with a great hymn of praise to God's wisdom. Paul draws on the wealth of his Jewish heritage for ideas and poetry to create a great Christian exclamation of praise to God.

The Psalm also celebrates what God is like. For God's kindness, especially to the lowly, we sing, 'Lord, your love is eternal.'



FIRST READING: Is 22:19-23

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

Thus says the Lord of hosts to Shebna, the master of the palace: I dismiss you from your office, I remove you from your post, and the same day I call on my servant Eliakim son of Hilkiah. I invest him with your robe, gird him with your sash, entrust him with your authority; and he shall be a father to the inhabitants of Jerusalem and to the House of Judah. I place the key of the House of David on his shoulder; should he open, no one shall close, should he close, no one shall open. I drive him like a peg into a firm place; he will become a throne of glory for his father's house.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

When Jesus came to the region of Caesarea Philippi he put this question to his disciples, 'Who do people say the Son of Man is?' And they said, 'Some say he is John the Baptist, some Elijah, and others Jeremiah or one of the prophets.' 'But you,' he said 'who do you say I am?' Then Simon Peter spoke up, 'You are the Christ,' he said, 'the Son of the living God.' Jesus replied, 'Simon son of Jonah, you are a happy man! Because it was not flesh and blood that revealed this to you but my Father in heaven. So I now say to you: You are Peter and on this rock I will build my Church. And the gates of the underworld can never hold out against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven: whatever you bind on earth shall be considered bound in heaven; whatever you loose on earth shall be considered loosed in heaven.' Then he gave the disciples strict orders not to tell anyone that he was the Christ.
