NOVEMBER 9 - HOLY SAVIOUR'S FEAST DAY

What a year it has been!

This weekend we would have had our biennial Holy Saviour Community Festival on Saturday. Today, we would be gathering for our special Parish Feast Day Mass. Whether you are here in church this weekend or watching mass online, we are reminded again that Christ Jesus, our Holy Saviour, is at the heart of who we are and what we do. May it be always so!

Happy Parish Feast Day!

The Dedication of the Basilica of Saint Saviour. The palace of the Lateran on the Caelian Hill belonged to Fausta, the wife of Constantine. The Emperor, after his conversion, gave it to the Pope as his private residence, and founded there the church of the Lateran which became the Cathedral of Rome and the mother of all the churches of the world. On November 9, AD 324, Pope St Sylvester consecrated it under the name of Basilica of St Saviour. This was the first public consecration of a church. A long time after, under Lucius II, in the 12th century, it was dedicated to St John the Baptist, whose name had been given to the adjoining baptistry. Wherefore it bears nowadays the title of St John Lateran.

In this basilica and the adjoining palace were held, from the 4th to the 16th centuries, more than twenty-five councils, five of which were ecumenical. Holy Orders were conferred there, penitents were reconciled, catechumens were baptised on Easter Day, and as neophytes they came there in procession during the whole octave.

The Station is held at St John Lateran on the first Sunday in Lent, Palm Sunday, Rogation Tuesday, Maundy Thursday, Easter Eve, Saturday in Albis, and on the eve of Pentecost.

The Church was rebuilt and consecrated anew by Benedict XIII, in 1726, and the commemoration of this consecration was fixed, as that of the first church on November 9.

DID YOU KNOW?

Points of interest and Catholic lore

- * A solemn procession from the house of the bride's father to the house of the bridegroom was an important part of the Jewish wedding ceremony. These bridesmaids are a 'guard of honour' to greet the groom on his return with his bride. Sometimes problems with the marriage contract or the unhurried exchange of gifts between families led to long delays in their return.
- * Jesus referred to himself as a bridegroom (Mark 2:19-20), and the church is sometimes referred to as the bride of Christ.

EXPLORING THE WORD

As the public ministry of Jesus draws to a close, Matthew introduces the themes of delay and the need to be ready for the second coming of Christ. Matthew's community were living in the 'in-between' times. Christ's victory over death through his resurrection had begun a new phase in history, but it was not yet complete. Completion would only come with his return in glory.

We again hear the familiar imagery of the messianic banquet or wedding feast to which all are invited. But only those who live with an attitude of openness and readiness will come into the great hall.

This parable speaks strongly of the need to live in the present with an eye to the future. We cannot live only for the 'now' with no thought for our ultimate goal, nor can we ignore the sufferings and responsibilities of the present and set our hearts only on heaven.

How well do you balance the spiritual and practical realities of life?

In what ways are you ready for Christ's coming in baptism?

Five of them were foolish and five of them were sensible: the foolish ones did take their lamps, but they brought no oil, whereas the sensible ones took flasks of oil as well as their lamps. The bridegroom was late, and they all grew drowsy and fell asleep. But at midnight there was a cry, "The bridegroom is here! Go out and meet him." At this, all those bridesmaids woke up and trimmed their lamps, and the foolish ones said to the sensible ones, "Give us some of your oil: our lamps are going out." But they replied, "There may not be enough for us and for you; you had better go to those who sell it and buy some for yourselves." They had gone off to buy it when the bridegroom arrived. Those who were ready went in with him to the wedding hall and the door was closed. The other bridesmaids arrived later. "Lord, Lord," they said, "open the door for us." But he replied, "I tell you solemnly, I do not know you." So stay awake, because you do not know either the day or the hour.
