TWIG SUNDAY-2/3 OCTOBER 2021

This year, TWIG will support Flamme D'Amour (Flame of Divine Love), a small non-government orphanage in Keshero, DR Congo. The orphanage cares for vulnerable children and others affected by the many wars in the Eastern Congo region. The facility is located close to the Rwanda border in the region of Goma.

Currently the orphanage houses 96 children, but cares for a further 69. Of these children, 113 are primary school age and 52 secondary students.

Since 2016 the Pallottine community (Fr Ralph's Order), has supported the orphanage with regular donations, primarily for food. These donations are insufficient to provide the nutritional needs of the children, but it helps.

For a number of years, the children of a Perth Pallottine Parish, have raised money in their "Kids for Kids" project. These funds have enabled the orphanage to acquire goats, chickens and rabbits, and with careful management are providing the children with much needed protein.

In 2020, Sister Alvera (the orphanage founder) wrote – "The program operates without a potential donor for its support, which is why we are asking for the support and assistance from the various partners and men of good faith so that in the end, the children feel loved and surrounded remember who educates the child builds his future."

'TAKE THE WAY OF THE GOSPEL'

THE VISION FOR MELBOURNE ARCHDIOCESE AS ARTICULATED BY ARCHBISHOP PETER COMMENSOLI

What is 'Take the Way of the Gospel'? We are being called — lay people and clergy together — to a renewed sense of our missionary purpose. Exploring and dreaming a missionary way forward lies at the heart of our baptismal call to live out the Gospel. Over the years, our lay people and clergy have identified the need to find new and fresh ways to proclaim the Gospel to our local communities. One aspect of this call to renewal is to attend to the manner in which parishes are arranged and function so that they bring renewed and ongoing life for God's people.

Archbishop Peter A Comensoli states 'The Way of the Gospel – the path of missionary discipleship – has always been adapted by every generation to fit the local circumstances. How this is arranged has varied according to time and place. Now is our time; here is our place ... Our parishes will remain at the heart of the gathering of God's people locally, but we need to adapt the way we resource our local communities, including the placement of clergy, catechists and other lay leaders, to form Missions that comprise a family of faith communities.'

In this context, what exactly is a "Mission"? Embarking on Missions is not about changing our core mission of sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ, but about the ways in which we do this that are relevant to our place and time, and with good planning for the future. We are not the parishes of 40 years ago – and we need to be courageous and creative in our thinking around how to embrace the challenges and opportunities that today's landscape presents us with.


The formation of Missions provides us with a process to work together in becoming more missionary. There are three main aims of missions:

- 1. Effectiveness in sharing the Gospel
- 2. Vibrancy, vitality, viability
- 3. Equitable sharing of resources

This is the start of a long-term journey for our local Church in Melbourne. In this early stage, Parishes are invited to begin a conversation within their community, which will be a starting point for discernment and conversation. Eventually we will participate in a Mission where our Parish and others in the local area will collaborate to form a plan that will achieve the objectives more effectively. Within this group we will be encouraged to develop innovative and creative ideas as we discern and work together to plan how we might share our gifts and resources for mission across parishes.

As this conversation continues, I will be calling on representatives of our parish to join workshops with the aim of exploring ideas and suggestions on how this 'Mission' model can be actualized in our area.

SYMBOLS AND IMAGES

In Mark's Gospel, the supreme moment of triumph for Jesus is not the resurrection but rather when Christ suffers and dies on the cross. The cross represents Christ's unconditional response to God and therefore is his triumph. What a surprise it is to find that an instrument of torture and death can become such a powerful symbol of life and love. The true identity and mission of Jesus are only made clear on the cross. We cannot understand who Jesus is and why he came apart from the cross.



God is not only the origin of love, but in Jesus Christ he calls us to imitate his own way of loving: "As I have loved you, that you also love one another" (*John 13:34*). To the extent to which Christians live this love, they become credible disciples of Christ to the world.

SEASON OF CREATION

After Jesus spoke of a future involving personal suffering and political rejection Peter remonstrated with him. Jesus in turn rebuked Peter, explaining that such thinking was not of God. Much of the import of this short exchange seems to hinge on the openness of Jesus' assertions. Peter reacted not only to what Jesus said but the way he said it. Jesus' warnings were not given in secret but declared openly.

It is rather understandable that Peter was worried. Perhaps he thought that Jesus would attract unwanted attention from the authorities, or that his gloomy talk would put off potential followers. Either way, Jesus was having none of it. The truth, however dangerous or unpopular, should not be hidden.

Hearing this Gospel during the Season of Creation we might contemplate what truths get hushed up today. Do we encourage our leaders to speak openly about pollution and climate change, or do we collude in their silences? Does our society condemn or condone littering? Are our parishes in environmental denial, or models of sustainability and ecological responsibility? Ultimately, facing even the darkest future with hopeful action is a key part of Jesus' message. Christ's followers are called to bear their share of the cross and face tomorrow's problems today.



The Season of Creation spans five weeks between the World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation (September 1) and the Feast Day of St. Francis of Assisi (October 4).

For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things." Jesus called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it."
