

*(In place of Fr. Paul's Letter)***Church in Ukraine stands by suffering people in Kharkiv***By Vatican News staff reporter*

Bishops, priests, and Caritas workers remain in the Ukrainian city that has come under constant bombardment, in order to support those facing the winter season without means. Bishop Vasyl, the Archiepiscopal Exarch of Kharkiv, notes that "surviving in these conditions is very difficult. So many inhabitants have left, and those who remain are only getting by on humanitarian aid." Every Thursday in front of the Greek Catholic Cathedral of St. Nicholas in Kharkiv, a long line of people begins to form in the early morning hours. Here, the local Caritas chapter distributes humanitarian aid to young people, adults, children, and the elderly, who, despite the constant bombing, have remained in their hometown. Among them are also those who had left for the western regions of Ukraine or abroad at the beginning of the war, but then returned after the Russian army was pushed back further east.

In the courtyard of the cathedral, still under reconstruction, Bishop Vasyl Tuchapets, Archiepiscopal Exarch of Kharkiv for the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church, walks among the people. People stop him to thank him for the aid and to wish him a happy birthday as the bishop has just turned 55. He has also remained in Kharkiv since the beginning of the war, despite the fact that it is not his hometown. He comes from the opposite side of the country, from the Lviv region, but has remained with his flock, albeit a relatively small one: some 20 parishes scattered over the territory of the three regions - Kharkiv, Sumy, and Poltava - with 25 priests, three female religious communities (eight nuns in total) and one male religious community (three priests and one friar).

Bishop Vasyl explains that almost the entire territory of the Kharkiv region has been liberated by the military; however, the humanitarian situation remains critical: most factories and businesses are at a standstill, and stores are closed. Surviving in these conditions is very difficult, which is why so many residents have left, and those who have remained manage to get by only thanks to humanitarian aid.

More recently, a lot of people from the former Russian-occupied territories are moving to the capital, because those places are almost completely destroyed, and in the city, they hope to find some help to survive the winter. "They too need warm clothes and blankets, some food, etc.," the bishop says. "There are also many families with children. So many people are asking for medicine. And we are trying to find all these things, which is not easy, because we get very little humanitarian aid lately. Therefore, I ask everyone who can help to send us food items, baby food, winter clothes, and blankets, and medicine." The Kharkiv Exarch also notes that representatives of the Diocese of Como (Italy) recently brought them aid that they collected in their parishes, and also personally helped distribute it to the people. The Church stands by the people in this difficult time of war, tries to help them with what it can, and this is the testimony of our living Christian faith."



A bin for your donated items can be found at the crying room. Thanks for your continue support for these families in need.




Solemn Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament

Spiritual desolation can strengthen us if we listen to God

During his catechesis at the General Audience, Pope Francis says desolation and sadness, though considered to be a negative experience, can teach us important things and strengthen us spiritually, if we know how to traverse it with openness and awareness. Pope Francis said that discernment, which is not primarily a logical procedure, is “based on actions, and actions have an affective connotation which must be acknowledged, because God speaks to the heart.”

Recalling the *Spiritual Exercises* of St. Ignatius of Loyola, Pope Francis said desolation can be defined as “darkness of soul, disturbance in it, movement to things low and earthly, the unquiet of different agitations and temptations, moving to want of confidence, without hope, without love, when one finds oneself all lazy, tepid, sad and as if separated from his Creator and Lord.”

He noted that all of us have experienced desolation in some way but the problem we face is how to interpret it, because desolation has something important to tell us and we risk losing it if we are in a hurry to free ourselves of the feeling of emptiness. He added that inasmuch as we would all like a life that is always joyful, cheerful and fulfilled, this is not always possible and would also not be good for us as “the change from a life oriented towards vice can start from a situation of sadness, of remorse for what one has done.”

Explaining further, Pope Francis said that the word “remorse”, from the etymological viewpoint, means “the conscience that bites (in Italian, *mordere*) that does not permit peace.”

In fact, Alessandro Manzoni in his book “The Betrothed” described remorse as an opportunity to change one’s life in the famous dialogue between Cardinal Federico Borromeo and the Unnamed, who, after a terrible night, presents himself destroyed by the cardinal, who addresses him with surprising words.

Pope Francis also stressed on the importance of learning to “read” sadness, which is mostly considered negatively, but instead, “can be an indispensable alarm bell for life, inviting us to explore richer and more fertile landscapes that transience and escapism do not permit.”

St. Thomas, in the *Summa Theologica*, defines sadness as “a pain of the soul” - like the nerves for the body, it redirects our attention to a possible danger, or a disregarded benefit. Hence, sadness is “indispensable for our health; it protects us from harming ourselves and others” and “would be far more serious and dangerous if we did not feel this,” the Pope said.

Moreover, for those who have the desire to do good, sadness is “an obstacle with which the tempter tries to *discourage* us” and in that case, one must act in a manner exactly contrary to what is suggested, determined to continue what one had set out to do.

The Pope further recalled the Gospels’ reminder that the road to goodness is narrow and uphill, requiring combat and self-conquest. He urged those who wish to serve God not to be led astray by desolation, especially as some people, unfortunately, abandon a life of prayer or choice they have made, driven by desolation, “without first pausing to consider this state of mind, and especially without the help of a guide.”

Pope Francis then pointed to the example of Jesus who repelled temptations with an attitude of firm resolution. Trials assailed him from all sides, but Jesus was determined to do the will of the Father and they failed to hinder his path. In spiritual life, said the Pope, “trial is an important moment” because “when you come to serve the Lord, prepare yourself for trials”

El Papa invita a la oración por la paz de Etiopía y Ucrania

En sus llamamientos, luego de rezar el Ángelus, el Papa Francisco pidió intensificar la oración por las naciones en guerra como Etiopía y Ucrania, y por los países de África afectados por las inundaciones.

El Santo Padre expresó luego de la oración del Ángelus de este domingo su preocupación por las naciones que siguen sufriendo por la violencia y la guerra, como en Etiopía y Ucrania, donde los conflictos acaban con la paz social y las vidas humanas.

“Sigo con inquietud la situación de conflicto que continúa en Etiopía. Una vez más, repito con sincera preocupación que la violencia no resuelve la discordia, sino que sólo aumenta sus trágicas consecuencias”, expresó el Papa.

“Pongan fin al sufrimiento de la población”

Y haciendo un llamado a los responsables políticos, pidió “pongan fin al sufrimiento de la población indefensa y encuentren soluciones equitativas para una paz duradera en todo el país. Que los esfuerzos de las partes por el diálogo y la búsqueda del bien común conduzcan a un camino concreto de reconciliación. Que no falte nuestra oración, nuestra solidaridad y la necesaria ayuda humanitaria para nuestros hermanos etíopes, tan probados”.

También el Pontífice reitera su llamado por la paz en Ucrania, invitando a unirse a la oración que se efectuará este martes 25 de octubre en el Coliseo de Roma: “Un grito por la paz” junto a representantes de iglesias y comunidades cristianas.

“Sigamos rezando”

“Los invito a unirse espiritualmente a esta gran invocación a Dios: la oración es el poder de la paz. Recemos, sigamos rezando por Ucrania, que está tan martirizada”, indicó.

De igual manera, el Santo Padre expresó su tristeza y cercanía por las poblaciones que afectados por las inundaciones en varios países de África: “Rezo por las víctimas y estoy cerca de los millones de desplazados, y deseo un mayor esfuerzo común para prevenir estas calamidades”.
