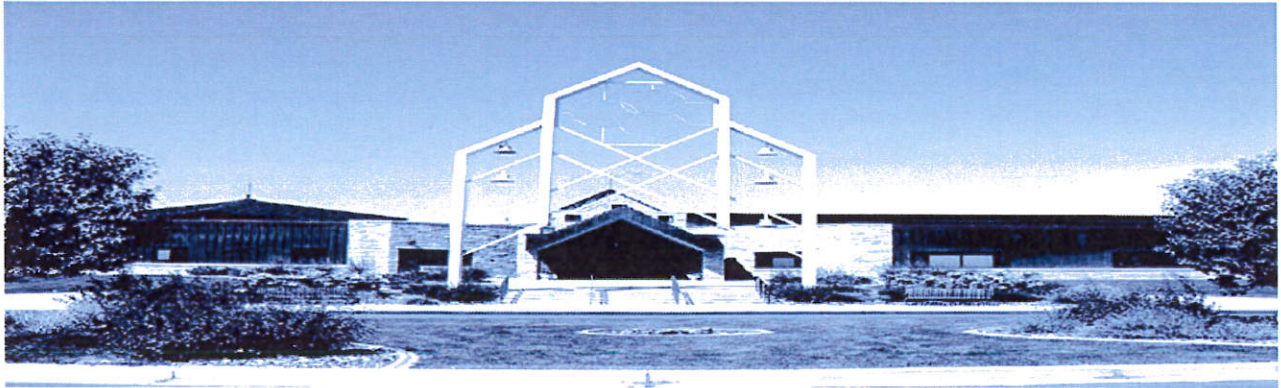

we are also following **GOVERNOR MANDATED regulations for Face Coverings.**

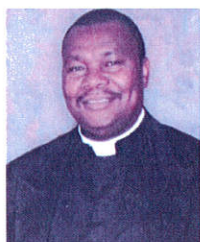

We are in the New Covenant

Introduction: Fellow Pilgrims, the love of God has gathered us together into this church today. May our worship bring Him honor and assure our salvation. Our reflection today is taken from Jeremiah 31:31-34; Hebrew 5:7-9; and John 12:20-33. These biblical spots teach that a grain of wheat must be sown into the earth, dies and decays so that it may produce much living wheat stalks. This dying should be borne in obedience to God's will and his commands of love and forgiveness written in our renewed clean heart and steadfast spirit.

The Contexts: The Gospel according to St. John is divided according to tradition into two parts; part one John 1:1-12:1-19, deals with the ministry and miracles of Jesus. Part 2, John 12:19-21:125 deals with the Passion, Death and the Resurrection of the Lord. John did not record the ascension of Jesus. The gospel reading of today cuts through both parts: 'for we would like to see Jesus whom when HE is lifted up, in obedience to the Father, will draw everyone to Himself'. Likewise, the writings of the prophet Jeremiah combines the history, biography and prophecy of Israel. Jeremiah's prophecy ran between 628 BC during the reign of King Josiah and went beyond the destruction and exile around 587 BC. It contains the records of his faith journey and that of Israel. He witnessed Israel's infidelity, abominable pollution of the temple of God and how they spurned the Lord's covenant; 2Chronicles 36:14. In his lifetime, because of their transgression Israel was humiliated severally by the nations. The highest insult was their defeat, destruction and exile to Babylon. They lost the promise land, the temple of God's glory and their king. Such was the situation when Jeremiah proclaimed his pre-Christian gospel of the "new covenant": his message of hope and renewal needed then more than anytime.

The Message: Children of God, we are the people of the new covenant of God's love and forgiveness. His loving mercy is carved into our hearts and flows in our bloods. We are also the messengers of this new covenant. The new covenant of the Old Time is fulfilled in Christ Jesus. He is the face of the Father, the Way, the Truth and the Life. Jesus is the Word who reveal God to us. He is God's hand extended to us sinner. He is our consolation in moments of trial, fear and tribulations. He has invited all to the will of the Father. Every Friday of Lent, we are reminded that the vocation of Jesus is *via crucis*. The same is the truth of our journey to the Father. We have to deny the self every day, take up crosses and follow Him, seeking Him in the challenges of our daily lives. JESUS IS THE NEW COVENANT. He is the source of eternal salvation for all who obey Him. He will lead them to the Father's glory.

"Amen."

Well that's simple, why would I waste your time talking about one word when I could've included it last week?

Welllll! It is the last word of our Creed. Not only that, it is the last word of the *Bible*. Plus, all throughout the New Testament, the Hebrew word concludes a whooooo buncha prayers.

So, do you know what Amen means? It really is a simple word with a simple meaning "Amen – So be it." Like commanding your prayer to BE. Updated Information of
Coronavirus at IHM

As of March 15, 2021 IHM will be following the latest COVID-19 restrictions. We are allowed 175 person capacity at mass while maintaining **6 feet Social Distancing**. We are asking that the **Governor Mandated** wearing of Face Coverings over the nose and mouth upon entering and moving throughout the building be followed. They can only be removed while sitting and maintaining 6 ft. diameter of social distancing between individuals or family groups. Masks must be worn while singing. Any groups at IHM are still limited to 10 or fewer people and must be at least 6 feet apart from each other. Please practice personal hygiene and be respectful of your fellow parishioners. More from the Pope's Message: "In these times of trouble, when everything seems fragile and uncertain, it may appear challenging to speak of hope. Yet Lent is precisely the season of hope, when we turn back to God who patiently continues to care for his creation which we have often mistreated. falls to the ground and dies...*

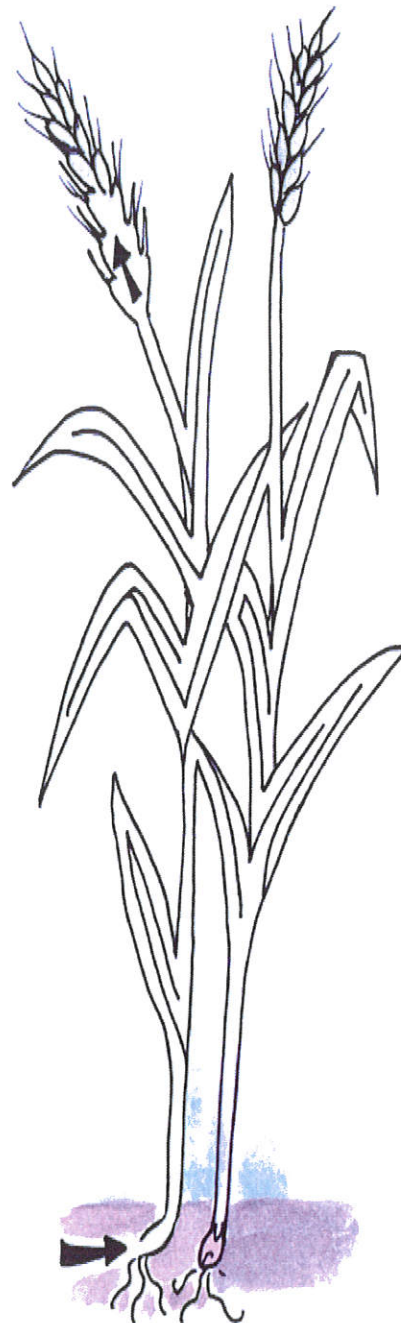
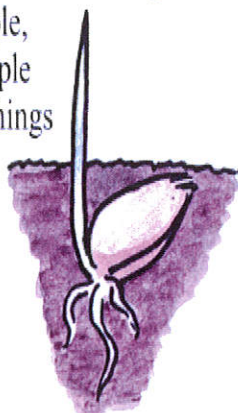

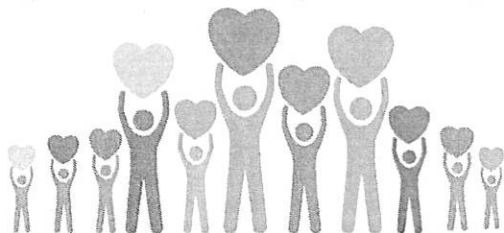
In today's Gospel reading Jesus says, "Unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains alone; but if it dies, it bears much fruit."

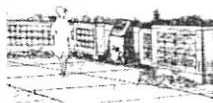
