THIRTY SECOND SUNDAY OF THE YEAR: C:

"RESURRECTION OF THE DEAD"

(2 Mac: 7: 1-2, 9-14; 2 Thess: 2: 16 to 3:5; Lk: 20: 27-38)

Dear friends in Jesus Christ,

I am very happy to see you all through this homily. The Holy mother Church invites you and me to reflect on "**RESURRECTION OF THE DEAD**". Today's first reading is from the second book of Maccabees. This passage assures us that faith in God dispels all fears in us. We become strong and courageous even to die for Him only to be raised to an everlasting life with Him. The readiness of the seven Jewish brothers to die rather than violate one of God's laws is a source of great inspiration for everyone who has faith in eternal life.

The second reading is from the second letter of St. Paul to the Thessalonians. In this passage, Apostle Paul prays for God's grace so that the Thessalonian Christians (we too) may be able to remain steadfast in faith. God is the source of all comfort and strength. We who follow Jesus will do well in living and proclaiming His word and remaining united with the Lord in faith.

"Life after death"

Today's Gospel reading is from St. Luke. In this passage we have an interesting conversation between the Sadducees and Jesus regarding the resurrection of the dead. They did not believe in resurrection because for them the consequences of life after death were rather ridiculous and meaningless. Some questions like where would one put all those thousands of people who die every day in the next world? How would one rectify all those messed up human relationships which took place in the present life? So they cleverly crafted this story of a poor widow who was married to seven brothers (one after the other) and then finally she too died without having children from any of those marriages. The question was what would happen to this poor woman and her seven husbands at resurrection?

Jesus simply overlooked their silly question and told them that their understanding of the resurrection was totally absurd. He told them about Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and Moses- all of them commanded great respect and reverence in the Jewish community. These men of God did not die for nothing. God is not a God of the dead but of the living.

It is pertinent to note that in the month of November we remember our dead and pray for them because we believe that there is life after death. It is the same too with resurrection of the dead. "What is sown is perishable but what is raised is imperishable."(1 Cor: 15: 42.)

Jesus, The Bread Of Life

Jesus made some fundamental statements that puzzled and even offended some of his followers. For instance, Jesus startled them by saying that he is "living bread," (Jn. 6:48) and if any man eat of this bread, he shall live forever, (Jn. 6:50). Jesus then told them that the bread that he will give them is his flesh, which he will give for the life of the world (John 6:51). When his disciples heard this, they immediately began questioning what Jesus meant, asking: "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?" (Jn. 6:52) They probably thought either they misunderstood, or that Jesus was speaking only "symbolically", not literally. Jesus then began to clarify his statement, but to the surprise of everyone he did not say, "this is only symbolic". Rather he said, "Truly, truly, I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of man and drink his blood, you have no life in you," (Jn. 6:53).

You can imagine how these words must have confused his disciples. But Jesus didn't stop there, he drove the message home more emphatically: "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood, has eternal life; and I will raise him up at the last day," (Jn. 6:54) The disciples were asking each other what Jesus really meant when he said to eat his flesh and drink his blood. And yet Jesus continued even further: "He that eats my flesh, and drinks my blood, dwells in me and I in him" Jn.6:56

And almost unbelievably, Jesus continues on: "As the living Father has sent me, and I live because of the Father, so he that eats me, shall live because of me" (Jn. 6:57). Jesus doesn't seem to be leaving any wiggle-room in what he is saying. How perplexed and confused the disciples must have been to hear all this. How the disciples responded is probably the understatement of the year; because many of them said that, "his words were difficult to hear, and who can accept them?" (Jn. 6:62; Matthew 6:53-60). When Jesus heard them murmuring, he said to them: "Does this trouble you?" (Jn. 6:61). "And from that time, many of his disciples went back and walked no more with Jesus;" (Jn. 6:66)

Then Jesus asked his twelve apostles, "Will you also go away?" And Simon Peter answered him: "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life; and we believe and are sure that you are the Christ, the Son of the living God;" (Jn. 6:67-69). Libraries are full of books explaining the meaning of John chapter six, known as Christ's "Bread of Life Discourse". In order to understand, it is necessary to unpack it line upon line, precept upon precept, with patience and an open heart. One way to begin unpacking John chapter six is to remember something else Jesus said, "Lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the world," (Matthew 28:20).

As believers, we all know that Jesus is with us. We have felt his presence in prayer, when reading scripture and during Mass. But, by looking a little deeper into the idea of Jesus being with us always, keep in mind the Trinitarian nature of God. God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit. God is Three, God is One, (Matt. 28:19-20) They each have their own special characteristics, and yet are indivisible. The characteristic of the Father is that he is the Creator. The characteristic of Jesus is that he is God made flesh. The characteristic of the Holy Spirit is that he is Spirit. From previous generations he is called the Holy Ghost.

When Jesus walked through the locked door of the upper room after his resurrection, the disciples were fright-ened, thinking they had seen a "ghost". But Jesus corrected them by saying to look at his hands and feet, and to: "Handle me and see, for a ghost doesn't have flesh and bone as you see that I have." (Luke 24:38-39). (As an aside, Jesus doesn't say, "There are no such things as ghosts". HE said "it is I do not be afraid). He also ate and had wine with them as proof that he was a human being; (Lk. 24:30-32) He has a resurrection Body which we all long for.

So, although God is three-person's-in-one, there is a distinction between the Holy Spirit and Christ, in that Christ is flesh and bone, while the Holy Spirit is Spirit. So, when we say that "Jesus" is with us, what we really mean is that the Holy Spirit is with us, because of the lack of physicality during our encounter. Jesus is physical, incarnate and God made flesh, while the Holy Ghost is Spirit. So how can it be possible for Jesus to say, "Lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the world", if he is not on earth, but rather, physically in heaven? The Holy Spirit is here on earth, as well as everywhere, in heaven and on earth; but Jesus, being physical, is he on earth at this time? When we say, "Jesus is with me", wouldn't it be more accurate to say, "the Spirit of Jesus is with me"?

The Eucharist is Emmanuel. At the Last Supper, which was a Passover meal, Jesus broke the bread, gave thanks and gave it to his disciples, saying: "This is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me." Likewise, he raised the cup of wine, "this is the new testament in my blood, which is shed for you." Luke 22:20. That's where the eating of Christ's flesh and the drinking of his blood comes into play. Jesus is present with us, physically in the Holy Eucharist. The host (bread) is physical, the wine is physical, and together they are transformed into the real Body and the real Blood of Christ, at the altar during consecration at Mass. Jesus literally is taken into our own body, and changes us forever. Therefore, through the Eucharist, we fulfill John chapter six, when we absolutely with complete faith, eat Christ's body and drink his blood.

He is perfectly and truly with us to the end of the world. This is how Christ is able to be with every human being who comes to the altar, and receives the Holy Eucharist, from the time of the Last Supper up to his Second Coming. He is with everyone, who, wherever they are, acknowledge his presence at the alter and receive him sacramentally. The earth is a giant altar where Christ's real body and blood are continually being offered up to God in a perpetual re-enactment / memorial of his sacrifice on the cross. Jesus truly is the bread of life. "Taste and see the goodness of the Lord".

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


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
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
