A pearl of great price for people in the world may mean anything. It could be a luxury car, a mansion, the latest expensive cellphone, a diamond, or a retreat to an expensive paradise island. Many people would really sacrifice a lot to save just to get their own pearl of great price. For us Christians, we know that the Pearl of Great Price is Jesus Christ, no doubt. For unlike the other pearls of great price, the value of this Pearl is eternal. Nothing can pale in comparison with this Pearl!



Once we are possessed by this Pearl, we come to a glorious life eternal where our happiness is never ending, our joy is constant, and our peace is perpetual. We would not ask for anything more. It's perfect with absolutely no absence of anything! If this was indeed the Pearl of Great Price, then why are a lot of people not thrilled by it in contrast to their excitement for the other pearls of great price in the world? It's because following Jesus and adopting everything who He is ultimately lead us to decisions with potential losses on our part. It has its tradeoffs! We might lose our networks of friends, our comforts, opportunities to be rich and famous if we adhered to the Gospel faithfully.

In other words, compared to the other pearls of great price, following Christ and being possessed by Him has a too great of a price to pay. We get fixated on the losses. But, the tradeoff is well worth it! If we weighed in how much we stand to win in the long run if we let go of other pearls of great price (whose value do not last forever anyway) for the Pearl of Great Price, we begin to see that the temporal goods fade incredibly in the light of eternity, and the wealth of the world loses its luster. It's all a matter of having the right perspective on things. Often, we do not stop to really measure how much it's really worth to sacrifice our wealth to live a simple life, to share our excess wealth with institutions that help the hungry and homeless, to use our resources to build others and the Kingdom of God. With the promise of eternal bliss for doing all these that Jesus has commanded us to do, the Pearl of Great Price is no doubt worth the sacrifice!





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## **Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture**

Our culture seems more polarized and divided than ever. Into this wounded situation, our Catholic faith has a healing remedy to offer: the gift of wisdom. When the Lord offers to give King Solomon anything the monarch desires, he requests "an understanding heart" (1 Kings 3:9). In his polarized situation, the King doesn't ask for power to defeat his enemies. He asks for a wise and understanding heart to judge right from wrong. This wisdom is elevated and fulfilled in Jesus who teaches us to bring forth "both the new and the old" (Matthew 13:52).

In our fractured society, we Christians should stop pining for political power to crush our perceived enemies. That often just makes things worse. Rather, it's much more useful to beg for the grace of true wisdom which transcends both sides of the aisle. This places us in a fresh position from which we can help our culture see what is true and good all across the ideological spectrum. Sometimes we'll look like liberals (e.g., in our love for the poor and marginalized) and other times like conservatives (e.g., in our sexual ethics and views on religious freedom). Because this wisdom is free from ideological narrowness, it will help to heal these painful fractures. Lord Jesus, this week, pour into us your healing wisdom.

#### The Falling Action and the Field

In my freshman year of high school, I was fairly miserable at identifying the five essential elements of plot (exposition, rising action, climax, falling action, and resolution).

To this day, the only reason I remember anything about them at all is because my English teacher used episodes of Scooby Doo to illustrate the different elements. Falling action vs. climax is where I got tripped up, the two are similar, and only discernible if you examine them relative to each other.

Every Scooby Doo episode has a big dramatic sequence (the climax) where the ghost/monster/zombie chases The Gang through the haunted mansion. The falling action is what comes immediately after: searching for her glasses that she lost during the chase, Velma bumps into a pulley wheel disguised behind a tapestry and realizes the ghost/monster/zombie is actually the janitor in a costume, hooked up to an elaborate cable system jerry-rigged throughout the mansion. Meddling kids.

I confused the two because, to me, they are both equally dramatic: the chase and the fallout.

It occurs to me that, if you look at the course of salvation history, we are living in the falling action, not the climax. Take the parable of the treasure in the field: we have found the treasure. But we haven't yet bought the field.

I often make the mistake of thinking I am still lost in the climax, searching for the truth. But I know exactly where the truth is.

What I need to be concerned with is this: am I doing what I need to do to buy the field?

## Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

#### **Question:**

Why do priests kiss the altar at the start of Mass?


#### Answer:

Our churches and chapels are filled with symbols. We might think of the more common symbols (like the crucifix, statues, stained-glass windows, vestment color and altar cloths) as well as major symbols (such as the paschal candle and the baptismal font). But there are some things that we can take for granted in our sacred spaces, because unfortunately, they seem to just be part of the building, including three of the main symbols of our liturgy: the ambo (lectern), the chair for the priest celebrant, and the altar.

These three objects are placed in a specially designated area called the sanctuary. They are the places where the Word of God is proclaimed, where the priest prays and presides at the celebration, and where the bread and wine are offered by the priest during the Eucharistic Prayer. Although each of these objects is sacred because of the role they play in our worship, the altar holds a special place. In a document containing the rules and instructions for the Mass — the "General Instruction of the Roman Missal" — we read: "The altar on which the Sacrifice of the Cross is made present under sacramental signs is also the table of the Lord to which the People of God is called together to participate in the Mass, as well as the center of the thanksgiving that is accomplished throughout the Eucharist" (no. 296).

One of the ways that we recognize the importance of the altar is when the priest and deacon kiss the altar at the beginning of Mass. Kissing is an ancient act of devotion. Remember, we also kiss the cross on Good Friday, and the deacon or priest kisses the "Book of the Gospels" after the Gospel is proclaimed. This act of devotion reminds us that the altar is a symbol of Jesus, the "living stone" (see 1 Peter 2:4), the foundation stone of our faith. It is a symbol gesture, but it is a powerful reminder of the One on whom our faith is built and in whose name we gather as the "household of faith" (see Galatians 6:10).
