A family therapist once said: "It is important for every family to get its saints out of heaven and its sinners out of hell." Among the many ways we can understand this quote, we can take it as a suggestion that it does no good to either idealize or demonize our families. So often when we speak of family life, there is this erroneous impression that every Christian family ought to be holy patterned after the Holy Family. That is far from the truth. We all have flaws and every family, including the Holy Family, has its share of its own challenges.

The quote is a call not to perfection but to faith in God. With God's grace we can acknowledge that everyone has both good and bad qualities, and that it is important to focus on the positive aspects of people while acknowledging their shortcomings. Families can work together to provide support by creating a positive and supportive environment that fosters growth, development, and well-being. Family members may not be the same as regards being sinners or saints, but at the end of the day, they are still family. No matter what myriad of challenges that families experience, the joy of this Feast we are celebrating is that Jesus enters into the messiness that can be found in every family, enabling us to overcome the challenges we face in our families. Will that make our families perfect? Of course not, but it does inspire us to persevere in faith and believe everything and everybody can be transformed in Christ.

It is the last day of 2023. In a few hours, another year will pass. For many, 2023 has been a good year. For others, it may have been bad. When we choose to have Jesus as our anchor, however, we can overcome whatever difficulties that might come our way. As we welcome the New Year, may we ask the Lord for the grace of faithfulness. If we walk with Jesus daily, there will not be any bad years.

Monday, January 1, is the Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God. It is not a holy day of obligation for 2024. Nonetheless, I invite everyone to come to the 8:30 am morning Mass not only to honor Mary, but also to thank God for all the blessings we received this year that is about to end, and to ask for his continued blessings for this new year that is to come. May you all have a grace-filled new year!



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Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

I remember the first time my older sister asked me if I wanted to hold her newborn son. Terrified, I told her I didn't think it was a good idea. My résumé had nothing to suggest I would be a qualified baby holder. But she warmly told me, "I'll help you hold him." It struck me that she is baby's mother. She is the one who decides who is qualified to hold him. I took him in my arms and soon I began to feel comfortable with that tiny little warm cooing creature in my arms, and soon I no longer feared holding him. Now, twenty-seven nieces and nephews later, holding a newborn child is one of the great joys of my life.

Do we sometimes think that Jesus is given only to the highly qualified, special religious people? In the Gospel of Luke today we hear about the presentation of the Lord in the temple. The newborn son of God is passed around like a baton in a relay race, not guarded like a precious jewel or a breakable china dish. We can see him going from the arms of Mary to Joseph, then to the priest performing the ceremony, then to Simeon the old man, then to Anna the old widow. Each one receiving him and then handing him to the next. A tidal wave of joy and thanksgiving follows wherever he is placed.

Believe me, you are qualified to hold Jesus in your arms. How can I say that with such confidence? Because the mother decides who is qualified. The Blessed Virgin, embodied in the Church, holds him out to you and me. She rejoices to place him in our arms to hold, and to hand him on, too.

The Sword and the Family

In the first few weeks of parenthood, the tears flowed fast and freely, and with very little provocation.

Sometimes I wept because it was getting dark out, and sometimes because the sun was coming up. Sometimes I wept because the days were so unbearably long. Sometimes I wept because they were so cruelly short and slipped past so quickly, bearing away with them forever these inaugural moments of my daughter's life — moments I knew I would long for on my deathbed.

So, the inclusion of the Presentation of Christ in the Joyful Mysteries of the Rosary has always struck me. The Blessed Mother, just a few weeks after giving birth, standing at the holy temple: Is she tired? Is she emotional? Is she frightened? Is she happy? We cannot know for sure, but if she is anything like most of the postpartum women I know, she is all four. But she stands there dutifully, offering her baby to the Lord, and this is what she is told, "A sword shall pierce your heart."

Joyful? I would have snatched the baby back, called the police and sobbed for a week.

But Mary knows that Simeon speaks the truth, and she cannot receive God's will with anything less than joy, even if it means a pierced heart.

Family means love, but love means — what, exactly? Pleasure, fulfillment, contentment? Yes, but so much more, too. Love means you have much to lose.

How full is family life with these beautiful moments which, on the surface, look and feel painful — but hold within them the opportunity to be like Mary, to bow our heads and once again say "Yes, Lord."

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

What are the servant songs of Isaiah? How do they relate to Jesus' life and ministry?

Answer:

The four servant songs (Isaiah 42:1-4, 49:1-6, 50:4-9, and 52:13—53:12) are strategically placed in Second Isaiah to offer hope and consolation to a suffering Israel during its Babylonian Exile.

Israel had been defeated by the Babylonians, who destroyed their temple, killed the last of the kings in David's lineage, exiled them from their land, and transported them to Babylon. This is the context in which Second Isaiah composes his powerfully poetic book of hope and consolation. A significant part of that message is the portrait of God's servant, who is called to be a source of hope and encouragement for the people.

Each of the four poems emphasizes God's choice and election of the servant. The last poem stresses the suffering and rejection of God's servant, along with his eventual death. Isaiah is certain that God will use the servant's innocent suffering as a way to redeem and remove the guilt and sin of others. Thus, the servant becomes a source of salvation for himself and for others.

Who is this servant? Many suggest that Isaiah was referring to Israel herself, as she underwent exilic suffering which would ultimately prove to be redemptive. Jesus' followers, including those for whom Mark wrote his Gospel, understood Jesus' ministry in terms of Isaiah's suffering servant whose innocent suffering and death became the means of salvation for all.







Financial Report

FINANCIAL REPORT FISCAL YEAR JULY 2022 – JUNE, 2023

The balance sheet of St. Joseph of Cupertino as of June 30, 2023, has a total current asset of \$3,002,493.37. The parish's total fixed assets are \$401,035.88. The total (current and fixed) assets of the parish are \$3,403,529.25; this is 4.32% less than the previous year. The parish's total current liability was \$29,309.53 which is 26.25% less than the previous year. The total liabilities and equity of the parish are \$3,403,529.25 which is 4.32% less than the previous year.

A few major key highlights from St. Joseph of Cupertino Church Profit and Loss Statement 2023 include:

- **Income**: The church had a total income of \$1,108,707.63, which was 10.35% higher than the budgeted amount of \$1,004,704.04. The actual total income was 110.35% of the budget, the actual income far exceeded the budget.
- Expenses: The church had a total expense of \$1,295,258.86, which was 19.84% higher than the budgeted amount of \$1,080,853.66. The major planned expense for this fiscal year was the replacement sound system. The weekly collections and the small grant received from the Catholic Community Foundation, and the ADA rebate helped pay for the sound system replacement. Going into the next year, the biggest anticipated expense will be the replacement of the Air Conditioning systems of the rectory. All three of the AC units are in need of replacement. Each AC unit has an estimated replacement cost of \$20,000, and therefore the total replacement costs for all three units is approximately \$60,000.

Net Income: The net operating loss for this year was \$186,551.23, and the budgeted loss amount was \$76,149.62. The net operating loss was 244.98% higher than the budget. Therefore, the parish spent far more than the parish earned from donations and all other fundraising activities. The losses were further increased when the other income and expenses were factored in. These expenses included unrealized income/losses from investments, the various exchange accounts, and subsidies to the school. After these other income and expenses were factored in, the total net loss was \$188,595.32.


