

MISSION STATEMENT

"We, the community of St. Gregory Barbarigo, are called forth in Baptism to follow the mission of Jesus to teach, to love, and to serve."

This week once again the first reading complements and explains to the gospel. The gospel is about Jesus curing a leper. The first reading is about what the Law had to say about how to treat a leper. It gives us a context or background that enhances our understanding of what Jesus was doing. This is typical of how the first and third readings are related, especially during Ordinary Time.

When those of us born before the Vatican II Council grew up, Mass was different. It was in Latin, the priest's back was to us most of the time, there was only communion on the tongue (no distribution of the Precious Blood) as we knelt at communion rails, no Extraordinary Ministers to help, Eucharistic Prayer was the only Eucharistic Prayer we had, and the Gregorian Chant was beautiful. Not only were the readings in Latin, but there was just ONE year of readings, and there were only TWO readings per Mass (including the gospel), even on Sundays. As a result, we heard much less scripture in the Liturgy. In my experience, we were discouraged from reading scripture on our own lest we fall into erroneous interpretations of scripture.

After Vatican II the current rite came into being. We now celebrate in the vernacular (the language of the culture) so that all people can understand. This made Catholicism less "strange" to non-Catholics; it was meant to enhance participation of the faithful as well as make Mass more accessible to non-Catholics and those who did not understand Latin. The change was meant to enhance Ecumenical dialogue, the exchange of ideas, theology, and worship between Protestants and Catholics. There was a sense of transcendence in the old rite, since not all understood Latin and only the priest handled consecrated hosts. But there was less participation and it took more effort to understand what we did.

The aspect I would like to reflect on with you today is the change in the amount of scripture that is presented. In a common effort to expose the faithful to more scripture and to do it in a more systematic manner, Biblical and Liturgical scholars gave their opinions on which scriptures in the Old and New Testaments should I) necessarily be read, 2) are desirable to be read, 3) could be read or not read, 4) could or should be omitted. This was an effort undertaken by both Catholic and some Protestant churches in an effort to come up with a common lectionary – the three year cycle of Sunday readings that we have now. In those days the thought of sharing a common lectionary with our "enemies" was revolutionary. But it happened because of the vision of our leaders and a common desire to come closer together as Christians. As a result, we share this lectionary with Episcopalians, Lutherans, Methodists, and some others. From the Catholic perspective, we now read much more scripture over the course of the three years. For example, Year A is dedicated to the gospel of Matthew, Year B to Mark, Year C to Luke. The Gospel of John is worked into Christmas and Easter times, as well as to supplement Mark's Gospel since it is so short. For those who attend daily Mass, there is a two year cycle, I & II, which has the same gospel each year but contains further exposure to parts of the New and Old Testament – last week (5th week, year II) was passages from the Book of Kings, this coming week (6th week, year II) the passages are taken from the Letter of James.

Not only do we hear MORE scripture, but in the Sunday readings, especially in Ordinary time, the passages are arranged so that the first reading (usually from the Old Testament) connects to and gives background on the Gospel. This way of arranging the lectionary allows us to put the teaching of Christ into a Biblical (often Old Testament) context, to develop a more scriptural spirituality; it demands that we understand more about the Bible and salvation history, and it helps us to learn to interpret God's Word better. It also shows us how the two Testaments are connected. Hopefully, it will help us to discern better what the Lord is asking of us today, here and now as we immerse ourselves in what God has done in salvation history. The question often asked by current commentators on the Gospel passages is: "How would a first century Jew understand what Christ said?" More often than not, the first reading provides a hint of what a "first century Jew" would have known.

The emphasis on learning more about the Bible has spawned a huge number of Bible studies, group reading, podcasts, presentations on specific books of the Bible or chapters of a gospel. I am delighted to see that our parish have "caught the fever" to learn more and more about the Bible, especially to pray with the Bible texts. The increase of small groups studying the Bible is a good sign that you are doing this. Helpful presentations like "Bible in a Year" by Fr. Mike Schmitz, or even his more recent "Catechism in a Year", as well as the many offerings by FORMED.ORG, Matthew Kelley's Dynamic Catholic, or Ascension Press are among those resources. I love that you are active in acquiring this knowledge. I also perceive that you are understanding my preaching more as your knowledge of the scriptures and of salvation history grows. It is a key dimension in our pursuit of holiness together as we learn to put our pilgrimage towards heaven into the context of salvation history articulated in the Bible.

Keep up the good work! It is a joy to be your pastor!




Groups are Forming Now!


