

Sunday Scripture Speaks...October 4, 2020: Am I in compliance with the Gospel's best practices?



Stories, analogies and similes stick well with students and fetch phenomenal results in their learning process. Students grasp better in understanding scientific theories or formulas when explained using an analogy or a story. As a continuation of the parable of two sons, and their relationship to listen and act on

the Word of God, Jesus enunciates the parable of the owner of the vineyard. This parable is striking for its emphasis on the action that is required to spread the nature of God's Kingdom. The context and the social location sheds more light to understand this parable in relation to what Jesus points towards his eventual passion, death and resurrection. With an allusion to the vineyard, Jesus calls for active engagement through planting, hedging, digging, building, leasing, and harvesting. This shows how God is actively present in our lives, constantly calling us to bear fruit and be productive. In response to God's active care for us as the owner of the vineyard, we are invited to welcome and embrace the Word that He sends us. This is where rubber meets the road. If I am lost in my world with my agendas and priorities, two things could happen: I become insensitive and non-responsive to God's active calling, or I become passively aggressive. Both of these approaches are contrary to the Gospel. As Jesus concludes, 'the Kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that will produce its fruits.' In the corporate world of business and work, the employers make sure that their employees are productive to the highest possible extent, aiming to maximize the result and achieve gross profits. In the same manner, such productivity and fruitfulness comes only from living a purposeful life of the Gospel, and only through my compliance with the Gospel's best practices. Am I in compliance with the Gospel's best practices?





Twenty-seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

Today's first reading, psalm, and Gospel concentrate heavily on vineyards. For those of us who don't drink wine or have never set foot in a vineyard, these scriptures may seem inaccessible. But if we consider the tremendous importance of wine to the ancient world, we hear the scriptures asking us to make a life-ordeath decision. Choosing death means forsaking our relationship with God and taking upon ourselves all the anxiety of faithlessness. Choosing life means paying attention to the kingdom of God on earth, striving to pursue "whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is gracious." Today's vineyard metaphors invite us to identify our highest priority in life and tend to it. If we ask, God will help us order our lives correctly so we are free to cultivate our vineyards in love.

CONNECTED TO TRADITION

The Church presents today's Old Testament and Gospel readings together, as a pair. We delight in the symmetry between the two passages. Jesus, who is the Word of God, knows the Hebrew scriptures by heart and intends for his parable to echo Isaiah. As Jesus begins speaking, he summons the words of Isaiah, knowing his learned audience of chief priests and elders will feel comfortable with a familiar scripture passage. These scholars recognize immediately that Jesus is referring to a prophetic passage about sin, about the chosen people's tendency to turn away from God and grow "wild."

AMAZED BY INNOVATION

Jesus adds a new twist to Isaiah's well-known words, adding a new character, the landowner's very own son. Adding this innovation shows that Jesus confirms the prophet's warning that God longs for "his cherished plant" to grow according to the divine plan. The narrative twist also allows Jesus to reveal the fullness of God's plan in a way his audience can understand. Like a master teacher, Jesus respects the knowledge and faithfulness of the chief priests and elders, and then builds on what they know. By adding the landowner's son to the parable of the vineyard, Jesus gently expresses his own mission as the Son of God. Matthew's Gospel often depicts the chief priests and elders as oppositional; they worry that Jesus will abolish the law and foment rebellion. As the Lord said earlier in Matthew's Gospel, however, "Do not think that I have come to abolish the law or the prophets. I have come not to abolish but to fulfill" (Matthew 5:17).

Vigésimo Séptimo Domingo del Tiempo Ordinario

La primera lectura, el salmo y el evangelio de hoy se concentran principalmente en los viñedos. Para aquellos de nosotros que no bebemos vino o nunca hemos puesto un pie en un viñedo, estas escrituras pueden parecer inaccesibles. Pero si consideramos la tremenda importancia del vino para el mundo antiguo, escuchamos las escrituras pidiéndonos que tomemos una decisión de vida o muerte. Elegir la muerte significa abandonar nuestra relación con Dios y asumir toda la ansiedad de la infidelidad. Elegir la vida significa prestar atención al reino de Dios en la tierra, esforzarse por perseguir "todo lo que es verdadero, todo lo que es honorable, todo lo que es justo, todo lo que es puro, todo lo que es hermoso, todo lo que es misericordioso". Las metáforas de los viñedos de hoy nos invitan a identificar nuestra máxima prioridad en la vida y a atenderla. Si lo pedimos, Dios nos ayudará a ordenar nuestras vidas correctamente para que seamos libres de cultivar nuestras viñas con amor.

CONECTÁNDOSE A LA TRADICIÓN

La Iglesia presenta a la lectura del Antiguo Testamento y del Evangelio juntas, como un par. Nos alegramos con la simetría entre los dos pasajes. Jesús, que es la Palabra de Dios, conoce de memoria las Escrituras hebreas y pretende que su parábola haga eco a Isaías. Cuando Jesús empieza a hablar invoca las palabras de Isaías, sabiendo que su audiencia son los principales sacerdotes y ancianos que son conocedores de las Escrituras y su interpretación, estarían familiarizados con ese pasaje de las Escrituras. Por eso reconocen inmediatamente que Jesús se refería a un pasaje profético sobre el pecado, sobre la tendencia del pueblo elegido de alejarse de Dios y volverse "salvaje".

SORPRENDIÉNDOSE POR LA INNOVACIÓN

Jesús añade un nuevo giro a las palabras muy conocidas de Isaías, añade un nuevo personaje, el propio hijo del dueño de las tierras. Al añadir esta innovación muestra que Jesús confirma la advertencia del profeta, que Dios anhela que "su preciada planta" crezca según el plan divino. El giro narrativo también permite a Jesús revelar la plenitud del plan de Dios en una forma que su audiencia pueda entender. Como un maestro, Jesús respeta el conocimiento y la fidelidad de los principales sacerdotes y ancianos, y luego construye sobre lo que saben ellos. Al añadir al hijo del dueño de las tierras a la parábola de la viña, Jesús expresa gentilmente su propia misión como el Hijo de Dios.

SAINT FAUSTINA KOWALSKA

October (August 25, 1905 – October 5, 1938) Saint Faustina's name is forever linked to the annual feast of the Divine Mercy,



the Divine Mercy chaplet, and the Divine Mercy prayer recited each day at 3 p.m. by many people. Born in what is now west-central Poland, Helena Kowalska was the third of 10 children. She worked as a housekeeper in three cities before joining the Congregation of the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy in 1925. She worked as a cook, gardener and porter in three of their houses. In addition to carrying out her work faithfully, generously serving the needs of the sisters and the local people, Sister Faustina also had a deep interior life. This included receiving revelations from the Lord Jesus, messages that she recorded in her diary at the request of Christ and of her confessors. "I do not want to punish aching mankind," he once told Saint Faustina, "but I desire to heal it, pressing it to my merciful heart." The two rays emanating from Christ's heart, she said, represent the blood and water poured out after Jesus' death. Sister Maria Faustina died of tuberculosis in Krakow, Poland, on October 5, 1938.

Pope John Paul II beatified her in 1993, and canonized her seven years later.
