

Reflection on the Liturgy of the Word

READING (LK 23,35-43)

Luke paints the scene of the cross in great detail. The spectators, the people who attend these events, are curious and amused. Closer by, beside the cross, are the authorities who insult him. The soldiers are also nearby and participate in the grievances. In the foreground are the three crucified men. One of them provokes Jesus and challenges him. The other crucified one reproaches his companion and asks Jesus to remember him when he comes as king. This is the atmosphere in which we are invited to meditate and pray on the feast of Jesus Christ, King of the universe.

MEDITATION

This reading, chosen for today, may seem strange. What kind of kingship is that of Christ if we place it in such an environment? It is very difficult to understand kingship in such a humiliating environment. The sign hanging on the cross, "This is the king of the Jews," was a biting irony. But it is from the extreme humiliation and weakness of the cross that Jesus reigns. Unlike all the kings of the earth. Jesus is victorious and the promise made to the good thief is a guarantee of this.

PRAYER

Lord, what a paradox of your reign. Your invitation to serve unconditionally often frightens us. But it is from the cross and not from power that your Kingdom comes. The weakness of your cross is the strength and power of God. Give us your wisdom. May it open the eyes of our hearts to distinguish with clarity the proposals of the world and yours. Those that lead to the liberation and salvation of all.

Saint of the Day Nov. 20

Saint Rose Philippine Duchesne - (Aug. 29, 1769 - Nov. 18, 1852)

Born in Grenoble, France, Rose learned political skills from her father and a love of the poor from her mother. The dominant feature of her temperament was a strong and dauntless will, which became the material—and the battlefield—of her holiness. She

entered the Visitation of Mary convent at 19, and remained despite family opposition. The convent closed, and she began taking care of the poor and sick, opened a school for homeless children, and risked her life helping priests in the underground. They joined the infant Society of the Sacred Heart, whose young superior, Mother Madeleine Sophie Barat, would be her lifelong friend. Rose was a superior and supervisor of the novitiate and a school. But since hearing tales of missionary work in Louisiana as a little girl, her ambition was to go to America and work among the Indians. At 49, she thought this would be her work. She then met one of the many disappointments of her life. The bishop had no place for them to live and work among Native Americans. Instead, he sent her to what she sadly called "the remotest village in the U.S.," St. Charles, Missouri. With characteristic drive and courage, she founded the first free school for girls west of the Mississippi. "In her first decade in America, Mother Duchesne suffered practically every hardship the frontier had to offer, poor lodging, shortages of food, drinking water, fuel and money, forest fires and blazing chimneys, the vagaries of the Missouri climate, cramped living guarters and the privation of all privacy, and the crude manners of children reared in rough surroundings and with only the slightest training in courtesy" Finally at age 72, retired and in poor health, Rose got her lifelong wish. A mission was founded at Sugar Creek, Kansas, among the Potawatomi and she was taken along. Though she could not learn their language, they soon named her "Woman-Who-Prays-Always." While others taught, she prayed. Legend has it that Native American children sneaked behind her as she knelt and sprinkled bits of paper on her habit, and came back hours later to find them undisturbed. Rose Duchesne died in 1852, at the age of 83, and was canonized in 1988.

Volunteer Opportunities





Reflexion sobre la Liturgia de la Palabra

LECTIO (Lc 23, 35-43)

Lucas pinta el escenario de la cruz con todo lujo de detalles. Los espectadores, el pueblo que asiste a estos actos, está curioso y entretenido. Más cerca, al lado de la cruz, están las autoridades que lo insultan. Los soldados también están cerca y participan en los agravios. En primer plano están los tres crucificados. Uno de ellos provoca a Jesús y lo desafía. El otro crucificado recrimina al compañero y pide a Jesús que se acuerde de él cuando venga como rey. Ese es el ambiente en el que se nos invita a meditar y orar en la fiesta de Jesucristo, Rey del universo.

MEDITATIO

Esta lectura, elegida para hoy, puede resultar extraña. ¿Qué tipo de realeza es la de Cristo si la situamos en un ambiente así? Es muy difícil entender la realeza en un entorno tan humillante. El letrero colgado en la cruz, «Este es el rey de los judíos», era una mordaz ironía. Pero justo desde la humillación y debilidad extremas de la cruz es desde donde Jesús reina. Diferente a todos los reyes de la tierra. Jesús sale victorioso y de ello es garantía la promesa hecha al buen ladrón.

ORATIO

Señor, qué paradoja la de tu reinado. La invitación que haces a servir incondicionalmente, muchas veces, nos asusta. Pero es desde la cruz y no desde el poder como llega tu Reino. La flaqueza de tu cruz es la fuerza y el poder de Dios. Danos tu sabiduría. Que ella nos abra los ojos del corazón para distinguir con claridad las propuestas del mundo y las tuyas. Las que llevan a la liberación y salvación de todos.


Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion
