## Theme: "The Power of Humble Prayer"

Dear beloved Parishioners,

In this weekend's Gospel, Jesus gives us a powerful contrast: A Pharisee who prays by praising himself, and a tax collector who simply says, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner."

Jesus tells us: It's the tax collector—the humble one—who goes home justified.



The first reading from Sirach echoes this truth: "The prayer of the lowly pierces the clouds."

God hears the cries of those who come before Him sincerely, with no masks, no boasting—just trust.

St. Paul, in the second reading, gives us a beautiful testimony. As he nears the end of his life, he looks back and says, "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith." Paul wasn't perfect—but he was faithful. And in his trials, he learned humility. He says, "Everyone desert-ed me... but the Lord stood by me."

That's the heart of this Sunday's message:

- ♦ God doesn't need perfect people.
- ♦ He wants real hearts, open to grace.
- He honors the quiet, persistent faith of those who keep turning back to Him—again and again.

So, whether you feel like the Pharisee today—or the tax collector—know this: **God** already sees you. He already loves you. Come to Him with honesty, and He will lift you up.

This coming week, may we pray less like the self-assured Pharisee and more like the humble tax collector, saying simply: "God, be merciful to me... a sinner who still believes."
