I asked for gift cards to go directly to our sisters in need and again you all put your Faith in action and brought over \$4000 worth of gift cards for your sisters in Christ. These gifts cards when directly into the hands of our sisters whos need where great. Then I said let's take up a collection to donate to Catholic Charities that we can present to Bishop Dewane at the banquet. You all showed just how strong and compassionate we are here in Florida. The donation of over \$9000.00 was given to the bishop. I cannot begin to tell you all how proud I am to say that I am a member of the council of catholic women. You did it!

When I presented the check to Bishop Dewane at banquet, as I was speaking, I got very emotional because I was looking out at all these incredible women that are my sisters in Christ, that had done so many wonderful things for those in need. Roof gone, only 2 rooms in the house left with windows. 5 feet of water in the home. She had packed a suitcase for a trip that was canceled because of the hurricane. She sat with me and said, it's all okay Tammy, I had a suitcase with some outfits and 2 dresses, and I wouldn't have missed this chance to be with my CCW sisters, and it will be okay because we still have 2 rooms left in our home. What faith, strength, and perseverance. CCW women are simply the most amazing women on earth.

NCCW VOCATION PURSE CLUB UPDATE Sheila S. Hopkins, Chair NCCW DAST DRESIDENT/FCCW DAST PRESIDENT

Since it's inception with the signing of a covenantal agreement with the National Fund for Catholic Religious Vocations (NFCRV) in August 2016, NCCW has collected and sent \$129,202 to NFCRV. Restricted to women, the funding is available to religious orders who have women wanting to enter but cannot due to personal debt.

Forty-one (41) grants to forty (40) women have been awarded. Twenty-eight (28) remain in vowed life while twelve (12) have discerned out.

An order sends a potential candidate to NFCRV who sets up a loan for her debt. If a woman decides religious life is not for her, she assumes the remaining debt but does not have to pay back what has been paid for her.

I got to see old friends from conferences past and meet new ones.

In November we held our Remembrance Tree Ceremony at St. Vincent dePaul Regional Seminary. Our old scroll with our deceased loved ones' names was removed by Fr. Clem

Hammerschmitt and burned and the new one was buried with the help of Bishop Barbarito and me. The mass with the seminarians and all the priests was so uplifting, and this year we were welcomed back to lunch with the "boys".

December saw our well anticipated Take a Sister to Brunch at St. Matthew Catholic Church. At this yearly tradition we honor those religious sisters who have done so much around our Diocese. The delight on their faces is a joy to see. This year, they were treated with an extra gift, a prayer shawl knitted by the St. Matthew Knitting and Crocheting Club. Diocese of Venice Josephine Weiss. President

Since my last report in September 2022, I mentioned that we are supposed to hold our second of two Priest Appreciation dinner event in October 2022 at Our Lady of Light Parish in Fort Myers. Unfortunately, we had to cancel that event because of Hurricane Ian.

Some CCW affiliations cancelled their events in October. By November, a lot of them got together again. Despite the damages left by the hurricane in our respective areas, the ladies of our CCW affiliations are strong in spirit. With their deep Catholic faith and love of the Lord, they continued with their service and spiritual works in their respective councils.

In November 2022, St. Therese CCW held their annual Veterans Mass and reception for veterans. For their fundraising, they held a bake sale on the weekend before Thanksgiving, sold raffle tickets for their Basket of Cheers. In December 2022, they put together a Christmas gift bags for the homebound of their Parish. In January 2023, they collected, with the participation of the parishioners, blankets and warm clothing and donated them to several charitable organizations in their community which included Catholic Charities; they also held a membership recruitment Sunday in January.

Members of Saint Ann CCW in Naples collaborated with Catholic Charities and Saint Ann School to provide ready-to-prepare meals for 30 local families for Thanksgiving. The council has also welcomed school parents to pray the rosary every Friday after school drop-off and before Mass.

Our Lady of Lourdes CCW helped their community as OLOL had been designated as a FEMA site immediately following Hurricane Ian and the Diocese of Venice needed volunteers with food distribution. Their membership helped when they are able, prayed without ceasing. Their OLOL Respect Life Ministry showed up in force at the Planned Parenthood in Sarasota as part of the 40 Days for life. Each Christmas, they reach out to residents of local assisted living and nursing facilities, i.e., the elderly, infirmed and veterans by giving them a wrapped shoebox or gift bag filled with various personal items. Their fundraiser in November raised closed to \$4,000 (to be donated to charity) with 170 attendees.

St. Andrews CCW donated personal care items to be mailed to our troops overseas last November. St. Maximilian Kolbe CCW held their Parish Potluck of Thanksgiving, where the Parish could come together at a social, and talk with each other to heal (after Hurricane Ian). They held their Past Presidents Luncheon at a local restaurant and a Bake and Craft sale on the weekend before Thanksgiving. In January 2023, they will hold a Wine and Cheese Party.

St. Michael CCW in Wauchula held a Guadalupe Festival in the Park, with food tents, bake sale to benefit the Seminarian Fund.

Epiphany Cathedral CCW filled gift bags for 80 residents in neighboring center; contributed \$2,000 worth of bicycles and Food Gift cards to provide a little happiness to migrant workers and families in Arcadia.

Above are some of the highlights of what our CCW affiliations had accomplished. In the diocesan level, the Venice Diocesan CCW continues to pray the rosary every week via phone conference. The affiliations filled approximately 1, 150 Boxes of Joy in November 2022. St. Katharine Drexel CCW filled the most with 805 boxes. We held our Fall Board and General Membership meeting last December and Leadership Training on January 7, 2023. We will hold our Winter Board and General Membership Meeting on February 18, 2023, and we will hold our annual Lenten Retreat on March 18, 2023

The convention team has confirmed great speakers and activities to enrich, engage and educate in Spirituality, Leadership and Service. Bishop Parkes will celebrate Mass on Friday May 5 at 4:30PM, all are welcome. Bishop Parkes will share a meal with us and will be speaking to us at the Bishop's Banquet that evening at 7:00PM. He will share with us an update on our Diocese and his vision for our future. **Leadership**, Ellen Bachman, NCCW Past-President, will share with us a talk on "Group Dynamics". She is a very excited to be sharing this topic with us. **Service**, Kathy Bonner, Co-Creator of the "Women Healing Wounds" an NCCW resource, will share with us how Domestic Violence effects homelessness. Kathy will share a very important, albeit not so fun topic. **Spirituality**, Lynn Kilbride, author of "Tails of the Secret Peacock" will enrich us as she entertains us with her Characters based on the Gifts of the Holy Spirit. Our featured speaker will be Fr. Kyle Bell. He will share with us the closeness we have with Jesus

through the Eucharist. And our **Keynote Speaker**, **Rev. Msgr. Steven Bosso** will present on our beloved Pope John Paul II's last Encyclical, <u>Ecclesia de Eucharistia</u> where he discussed Mary as a "Woman of the Eucharist" throughout her life (cf. n. 53). Msgr. Bosso has a BA and Master of Divinity and has taught at Notre Dame. This will be very educational and will sharpen our spiritual closeness to Jesus as "Women of the Eucharist".

We had a very busy year.

- Eight women attended the Orlando DCCW Leadership Symposium. It is a great training and we always learn so something new.
- Over eighty women attended our summer day of reflection. We hosted the fabulous "Bad Girls of the Bible" by
 Toya Martin of the Orlando Diocesan Council of Catholic Women. It was an amazing spiritual day; well attended
 and very educational. I was surprised to hear many of the ladies saying they had never heard of some of the Bad
 Girls or didn't know some of the parts of the their stories St. Margaret said "well, they didn't teach those things in
 Catholic School".
- Our Diocesan Council had a table in the vendor area at the SpiritFM Women's Conference. We shared CCW with the women that stopped by our table.
- 19 women and Fr. Ted attended the FCCW Conference. We had an amazing time with the women from around the state. Venice Diocese did a wonderful job hosting despite the devastating major hurricane. Many of their women were affected by the hurricane and they still managed to smile and be gracious hosts. It was our pleasure to present our "Call to the 2024 Conference in Tampa Bay. We designed matching t-shirts that we wore during the day, and we each represented something exciting to experience in our area.
- 7 of us attended the NCCW Convention in Minneapolis. As usual, they had great speakers. The speaker on Saturday morning, Yen Fasano, said "Bread if not broken cannot be shared. Our brokenness allows us to go deeper in our relationship. Jesus was broken on the Cross." I will use some of this in our prayer service at our upcoming convention.
- Two of our three Districts had Fall Conferences. Our Lady of Life District had guest speakers from Catholic Charities, Foundations of Life Pregnancy Center. They shared great information. One item they shared was that State Law states that an ultrasound must be performed before an abortion, but it does not say the mother must see that ultrasound or hear the baby's heartbeat. Another interesting piece of information was that breastfeeding can reduce the risk of SIDS. The brain is the only organ not fully formed at birth. The act of breastfeeding and something in breast milk that cannot be replicated helps develop the cerebellum and reduce the risk of SIDS.

St. Mother Theresa said: "God does not want us to be perfect; but he wants us to be faithful."

I pray Our Lady of Good Counsel, patroness of the NCCW, will ask her Divine Son to bless you, your families and our NCCW with Joy and Peace.

Statement on Day of Prayer for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children January 22, 2023

Today marks 50 years since *Roe v. Wade*, the U.S. Supreme Court decision that imposed by judicial "fiat" the most extreme abortion policy in the Western world. It deprived more than 63 million unborn children of their right to life and severely limited the ability of states to mitigate the harms of abortion through legislation.

On June 24, 2022, the U.S. Supreme Court's landmark ruling in *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization* overturned *Roe*, allowing elected representatives at the state level to once again protect women and their children from abortion. This is a fruit of prayer, born of a commitment to justice.

Millions of women and men, children, and families have experienced the heartbreak of abortion over the last five decades. We maintain a profound sense of sorrow and grief for both the tragic loss of unborn children since 1973 and that abortion continues in Florida today. Our ultimate goal is to foster a culture of life in which hearts and minds are changed so that abortion is unthinkable. We remain hopeful as *Dobbs* opens a new chapter in our efforts to engage all people of good will to protect women and children from abortion and empower women and vulnerable families in their times of need.

We applaud the restrictions enacted in the 2022 Florida legislative session to limit abortion to the first 15 weeks of pregnancy. The law mirrors the underlying Mississippi law at issue in *Dobbs*. It was a prudent and beneficial step for Florida as the U.S. Supreme Court considered the case. Our advocacy for the legal protection of life in the womb must continue to make the most of the opportunities presented by *Dobbs*. The legislature must enact further limits on abortion.

The current legal challenge to the 15-week limit provides expectant hope. Like *Roe*, the Florida Supreme Court case wrongfully interpreting a broad right to abortion in the Florida Constitution may soon be overturned.

Additionally, Florida can do more to promote alternatives to abortion, particularly through the network of pro-life pregnancy help centers that assist women and families with young children. United with our fellow bishops across the United States in our support for the *Walking with Moms in Need* initiative, we continue to call on Catholics and people of good will to support and engage in the good work undertaken in these agencies.

We pray that Christ will guide us as we work collectively towards the full legal protection of every human life. May every child conceived be protected in law and welcomed in life.
