

### FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Old Cathedral Parishioners and Visitors:

As we near the end of another Church year, our readings seem to have a rather gloomy edge to them. Malachi uses the image of burning stubble to describe what would befall those who refuse to walk in the way of the Lord; Paul is somewhat on edge as he realizes that some of the Thessalonians are struggling and falling back into old habits. Even Jesus seems sorrowful as he speaks about the last days.

Luke was a great storyteller, and his Gospel was written for a mostly Gentile community of Christians who were suffering greatly under the persecution of the early Church. In addition, the loss of the temple in 70 A.D. struck at the very heart of their faith, especially for those of Jewish ethnicity. If the temple was gone, many asked, how could they be sure that God was still present among his people? Indeed, like many successive generations, they wondered where God was in the face of these struggles and persecution.

It's an emotion that even today rings true. At times, it seems that dark forces are pitting one section of society against another. Where is God in all of this? Sadly,

conflict and division have always been part of the human condition. Even Jesus predicted the ongoing nature of human strife: *Nation will rise against nation*, he says, and there will be earthquakes, famines, plagues, persecution, and family quarrels.

Yet times of difficulty are also opportunities to witness to who we are in Christ. In the midst of life's turmoil, we who know the beauty of a relationship with Christ have the opportunity to stand up for our faith and proclaim that we live by the standard of Christ.


As Christians, we cannot allow the dark forces to have their way. The world needs the Gospel more than ever! It needs believers to witness to forgiveness and the pursuit of peace, the beauty of each and every life, the hope of new life in Christ.

Nor can we fall into the trap of thinking that we have no responsibility for others. On the contrary, we are reminded by the readings today to work hard for the benefit of the community, otherwise, we cannot expect to share in its bread. In our lives, we must let honesty, truthfulness, and fidelity mark our daily experience. Each day will have its troubles, but these can be overcome if we do as Christ did – show mercy, share our bread, seek peace, and welcome the stranger.

So yes, the Gospel is sobering, but no one passage of Scripture stands alone. Each passage must be read in the overall context of what Scripture seeks to share – the ultimate triumph of Christ. Our faith is in him, our identity is found in him, and our destiny has been secured by him.

Gratitude for spiritual thanksgiving

We quickly sense that something is missing in the rhythm of our personal life if we go without the Eucharist





Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Thanksgiving is a great national holiday! Something would be missing in the rhythm of our national life — and we would soon sense it — if we didn't pause for this time of refreshment, gratitude and being together. The holiday helps us savor the deeper meaning of life.

Honestly, telling the world the good news about the Eucharist isn't much harder than the opening statement I just made! In fact, the parallel is just about as perfect as it gets.

Eucharist, after all, means "thanksgiving." Something is missing in the rhythm of our personal life if we go without it, and we soon sense that something is missing. When people don't find meaning in their relationship with God, they go searching for it elsewhere. The Eucharist plugs us into the deeper meaning of our lives.

Let's pause on this point for a moment:

People's search for meaning comes out sideways if it's not met head-on — that is, if it doesn't find its way to God as the true source of meaning. We'll be seeing a lot of that "coming out sideways" in the coming days — like elaborate Christmas displays and frenzied shopping that actually have nothing to do with the meaning of Christmas. (Have you seen the inflatable Christmas T-Rex?)

How do we respond to that search for meaning? Making fun of it is tempting. But it isn't a very effective strategy for evangelization. People are really looking for something.

Living at a deeper level is certainly essential. But our example alone is not enough. We also have to proclaim something deeper: we have to give an invitation, in words, just as we do with every other invitation. And it's not complex: "Hey, I've found that 'spiritual thanksgiving' is a really important part of my life. Maybe you could give it a try."

Speaking of which, here are two things I'm tremendously grateful for this year.

First, I'm grateful for all that's been built here in the Archdiocese of St. Louis over the last 200 years. Perhaps those who grow up here can take it for granted. But for anyone, like me, who comes from the outside, the history and the depth of what the Church has built here is amazing. Yes, we're in the midst of making some changes. But even as we make those changes, I'm aware of the riches we've inherited, and I'm grateful for it.

Second, I'm grateful to be with you, here, now, as we carry out the All Things New task together. It's not by accident, but in God's providence, that we find ourselves together at this time in history. Each of you, and all of this Church together, is God's gift to me at this time in my life and ministry. I feel deeply blessed, and I'm deeply grateful.
