## NOVEMBER 27 & 28, 2021



Dear Friends in Christ,

On this first day of Advent, today's readings have a theme of preparation. The prophet Jeremiah speaks for the Lord, telling the Israelites of the days that are coming when the Lord will fulfill the promise [he] made to the house of Israel

and Judah. This promise was one that said he would bring forth a savior, born of the house of David. Saint Paul tells the Thessalonians that they should conduct themselves in a way pleasing to God and to be blameless in holiness before our God and Father at the coming of the Lord Jesus with all his holy ones. And finally, in Luke's Gospel, Jesus vividly describes what it will be like when the Son of Man comes with power and great glory. He tells his disciples to be vigilant at all times and to be ready to stand before him in judgment.

It is fitting that the Scriptures speak of being prepared, for that is a state of being we ought to maintain – at least spiritually. We know Christ will come again, we just do not know when. And so as we begin our Advent time in anticipation of celebrating the anniversary of Christ's birth, we also "wait in joyful hope for the coming [again] of our Savior."

Each year, on this first Sunday of Advent, the universal Church begins a new liturgical year. We examine, once again and still, the fullness of the Paschal Mystery in all its facets. The Paschal Mystery refers to Christ's passion, death, resurrection, and glorious Ascension, i.e., the means by which he accomplished our salvation. But our liturgical year is so much more than an annual history lesson on the life of Christ. It is an opportunity to immerse ourselves into all that Jesus did and taught, and to relate it to our own redemption – here and now in 2021. For "by dying, he has destroyed our death, and by rising, restored our life" (Preface, Easter I).

This Paschal Mystery is at the heart of every liturgy – we celebrate what God has already done for us and we anticipate the fullness of the Kingdom to come. It is in the Lord's Prayer, as we say, "thy Kingdom come, thy will be done." It is in the creed we profess, "he will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead." During the Eucharistic Prayer, we assert "[w]e proclaim your Death, O Lord, and profess your resurrection until you come again." And we have sung, or recited, or heard others do so, that wonderful verse from the Book of Revelation: Holy, holy, holy is the Lord God Almighty, who was, and is, and is to come (Rev 4:8).

As we begin Advent we welcome the opportunity to grow in faith and in conformity to Christ. May our preparation for the celebration of his birth, and his awaited second coming, be one that draws us ever more into the Paschal Mystery, and enables us to be *blameless in holiness before our God and Father*.

ONLINE GIVING UPGRADE As announced last weekend, our online giving system received a major upgrade this past week. Those with recurring gifts had their accounts transferred to the new system, but will need to reset their passwords. By the time you read this, those with recurring gifts should have received an message to the e-mail address on file, as a reminder of which address was used. Please log in and check that your recurring gifts were transferred properly to the new system. Your giving history did NOT transfer, so you will see your programmed gifts and any gifts made since Tuesday. Everyone's full giving history (going back to 2015) is available through the my.ihmrcc.org website. Those who had previously given only "one-time gifts" and had not set up any recurring gifts did NOT have their information transferred and will need to set up their accounts again. If you have an envelope number, please be sure to enter it when setting up the account. The new system includes some new ways to set up and mange online giving: you can now text GIVE to 301-3272-IHM (301-327-2446) or download our new app at app.ihmrcc.org (the app is still being developed, but the giving, video and contact us sections are working).





# First Sunday of Advent

Jer 33:14-16 | 1 Thes 3:12-4:2 | Lk 21:25-28,34-36



As the days grow shorter and darker, I am especially ready for Advent wreaths and nativity sets; sparkling lights and singing angels. More than ever, I eagerly anticipate the joyful celebration of Christ's birth. But today's readings for the first Sunday of Advent point us to the end of time, when Jesus returns in glory. Wait a minute, what? I don't want to think about the dismay and fright that Jesus foretells in the Gospel, I want to think about shepherds and holy nights. We really can't do one without the other, however, and the underlying message of the readings is one of hope and reassurance: Our God keeps his promises. He is faithful to the covenants he makes. He loves us so much; he offers us new beginnings. Our God became one of us, died to save us, and will give us the strength to be ready to greet him when he comes again. "Stand erect and raise your heads because your redemption is at hand," Jesus says. Pray that our preparation for Christ's birth will make us all the more ready for his return.

#### **GO EVANGELIZE**

### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

We are a society and culture that focuses a lot on the outward signs of preparation, and there is a lot of pressure to make it all perfect. Pinterest boards, social media groups, magazine photos, clothing catalogs: all show perfectly dressed people with perfectly adorable dogs standing in front of exquisitely perfect Christmas trees, on perfectly unblemished snow. But perfection on the exterior is not the Christian goal. Our interior preparation - how we make ourselves ready for Christ now, and at the end of time - is the focus of Advent. It is an opportunity for repentance, and a joyful new beginning in our relationship with God. It is a time to recommit ourselves to the covenant he made with us, and the psalm and the second reading offer assistance in doing so. Make time each day to dive in and explore what Scripture reveals about "conducting yourselves to please God."

**PRAY** Pray the psalm from the first Sunday of Advent each morning. Ask God to open your heart to ways you can be more just. He will teach you, guide you, and strengthen your heart so that you can stand upright to face whatever challenges come your way.

Your ways, O LORD, make known to me; teach me your paths, Guide me in your truth and teach me, for you are God my savior, and for you I wait all the day.
