Dear Friends in Christ,

As we continue our Lenten journey with its many disciplines, we all need a little encouragement and support. How often does our initial enthusiasm for resolutions run out of steam? For the first few days it knows no bounds. We are full of

excitement, and then slowly it wanes, and we grind to a halt. This is all the more true when we realize that those resolutions demand change and self-denial.

Today's Gospel, then, is a good reminder of the true purpose of Lent. It is a reminder that, as disciples, we have ultimately one goal: to strengthen our relationship with Christ so we might come to share in his eternal glory. It's a Gospel that both encourages and keeps us focused: By recalling the Transfiguration, we glimpse that glory, the same glory that is offered to us if we are steadfast in our lives of faith.

And in our striving to be steadfast, aren't we all just a little bit like Peter at times? He is eager, loyal, headstrong, and opinionated. He is also wise, and at the same time prone to misunderstanding. The Transfiguration event demonstrates Peter's lack of understanding. For him, this glimpse of Christ's glory was an opportunity for celebration, just as the Jewish feast of Tabernacles celebrated the glorious presence of God as he traveled with his people through the desert. He wanted to pause all that was going on, and build booths for all to revel in what he'd seen. Yet what Peter thinks is good is the glory itself, which he is quite ready to embrace and celebrate, but he has not yet come to grasp the suffering that must precede it.

We can all sympathize with Peter because we also have to learn that true discipleship is not about comfort or security, but about embracing the mystery of Christ crucified and risen. Discipleship is about hearing, again and again, those words: *This is my beloved Son ... listen to him.*

Today, as we begin the second week of Lent, we learn again that the Transfiguration is only a preview of Christ's glory; another mountain has yet to be climbed. Jesus has to be transformed and clothed in the naked pain of Calvary before he puts on the eternal glory of his resurrection. It is a glimpse of hope, however, meant to fortify us on our journey to Calvary with Christ. May this hope be our guide and our sustenance.

Second Sunday of Lent

Gn 12:1-4a | 2 Tm 1:8b-10 | Mt 17:1-9




As we enter the second week of Lent, today's readings encourage us to place our trust in God when we are dealing with hardship or uncertainty. Last week, we heard about how Jesus resisted the devil's temptations in the desert, trusting in the Father. This week, we follow Peter, James and John up the mountain, where Jesus "was transfigured before them; his face shone like the sun and his clothes became white as light." Jesus had told his followers he would suffer and die. The Transfiguration gave them a foretaste of Christ's glorious coming (CCC 554-56). As we continue on our Lenten journeys, we, too, can place our trust in the Lord. Though we may experience hardships and perhaps even doubts, the Transfiguration reminds us that Jesus has gone before us and prepared a place for us. As Pope Francis reminds us, "by his Transfiguration [Jesus] invites us to gaze at him. And looking at Jesus purifies our eyes and prepares them for eternal life, for the vision of heaven" (Homily, March 2014).

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

We Catholics like to pray out loud. Whether we're singing the "Holy, Holy" with gusto or quietly reciting the rosary, most of us can say with confidence, "we have a prayer for that." And, of course, prayer is one of the three pillars of Lent (along with fasting and almsgiving). Today's account of the Transfiguration instructs us pretty clearly to listen. As Jesus is transfigured, the disciples hear a voice from the cloud: "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased; *listen to him.*" As we enter the second week of Lent, many of us have chosen something to "give up" or done something more proactive. Either way, today's readings remind us to enter this penitential season with open hearts – and open ears. We can listen to Jesus by studying Scripture, being especially attentive to the Sunday homily, or quietly soaking in his presence through eucharistic adoration.

PRAY Try driving with the radio off this week. Use the time to pray and "listen" to Jesus.



EXAMINATION OF CONSCIENCE

Recall your sins. Calmly ask yourself how you may have violated God's Commandments.

- When was my last good Confession? Did I receive Communion or other sacraments in the state of mortal sin? Did I intentionally fail to confess some mortal sin in my previous Confession? Do I try to go to sacramental confession with a certain regularity? Do I pray every day? Do I envy other people, their possessions, their accomplishments, their manner of dress, their wealth, or their apparent "good life"? Do I spend in excess or needlessly?
- Did I willfully and seriously doubt my faith or objective moral truths? Did I put myself in danger of losing my faith through readings hostile to Catholic teachings or involvement in non-Catholic sects? Did I engage in superstitious practices: palmreading, fortune telling, Ouija boards, Tarot cards, or consult a medium who claims the ability to contact the dead?
- Did I take the name of God in vain? Did I curse, or take a false oath? Do I swear needlessly?
- Did I miss Mass on Sundays or holy days of obligation through my own fault, without any serious reason? Did I keep fast and abstinence on the prescribed days?
- Did I disobey my parents and lawful superiors in important matters? Am I lazy or careless in fulfilling my duties and responsibilities at school, work, or at home? Do I make good use of my time? Do I allow myself to be distracted at school or work with my smart phone or other electronic device(s)? Do I take items from school or work (steal)? Am I careless with equipment or items entrusted to me?
- Did I hate, bear resentment toward, or quarrel with anyone, or desire revenge? Did I refuse to forgive? Was I selfish in how I treated others, especially my spouse, my children, my brothers and sisters, my relatives, or my friends? Did I cause physical injury or even death? Did I eat or drink to excess? Did I take illicit drugs or misuse prescription or over-the-counter drugs? Did I endorse, vote for, or exercise my political rights in view of furthering the cause of abortion?
- Did I willfully look at pornographic images or watch immoral movies? Did I read immoral books or magazines? Did I engage in impure jokes or conversations? Did I willfully entertain impure thoughts or feelings? Did I commit impure acts, alone or with others? Did I have sexual relations outside of marriage with the opposite sex or the same sex? Did I take contraceptive or abortifacient pills or use other artificial means in order to prevent conception?
- Did I steal or damage another's property? Have I made reparation for the damages done? Have I been dishonest in my business relations? Did I waste time at work or otherwise misrepresent the actual time for which I am owed money?
- Did I tell lies? Did I sin by calumny, or detraction telling the unknown grave faults of others without necessity, even if they are true? Did I judge others rashly? Have I tried to make restitution for the bad reputation I caused?

If you later remember other serious sins, mention them in your next Confession.

BEFORE CONFESSION

Be truly sorry for your sins. We should feel motivated to go to Confession by feeling sorrow for having offended God who loves us, and whom we should love. However, it is acceptable to go to Confession out of fear of punishment, as long as you humbly repent of your sins and resolve not to commit them again.

This does not mean that a promise never to fall again into sin is necessary. A resolution to try to avoid the near occasions of sin suffices for true repentance. God's grace in cooperation with the intention to rectify your life will give you the strength to resist and overcome temptation in the future.

DURING CONFESSION

- You can begin your confession by making the sign of the cross and greeting the priest: "Bless me father, for I have sinned."
- The priest may give a few words of encouragement or read from Scripture. You may continue with the time since your last confession: "My last confession was... (how many weeks, months or years approximately)." It may also be helpful to mention your state in life ("I am married/single/widowed/divorced/a single parent/a priest/etc."), especially if it is relevant to the sins you are confessing.
- Say the sins that you remember. Start with the one that is most difficult to say, after this it will be easier to mention the rest. If you received general absolution (very rare), tell this and the sins forgiven then to the priest.
- If you do not know how to confess, feel uneasy or ashamed, simply ask the priest to help you. Simply answer the questions without hiding anything out of shame or fear. You are confessing to God himself, who is represented by the priest. Place your trust in God: he is your merciful Father and wants to forgive you. Have a firm resolution to avoid that sin (those sins) in the future, with the grace of God.
- If you do not remember any serious sins, be sure to confess at least some of your venial sins, adding at the end: "I am sorry for these and all the sins of my past life, especially for. . . (mention in general any past sin, especially those that are habitual and for which you are particularly sorry, for example, all my sins against charity, purity, etc.)."
- The priest may give you spiritual advice and assign you some form of penance. Make your act of contrition (see next page).
- Listen to the words of the absolution attentively. At the end answer: "Amen." Be willing to do the penance as soon as possible. This penance will diminish the temporal punishment due to sins already forgiven.

AFTER CONFESSION

Give thanks to God for forgiving you again. If you recall some serious sin that you forgot to tell, know that it has been forgiven with the others, but be sure to confess it in your next Confession. Guard against the temptation to sin, and later expecting God's forgiveness; presuming upon God's mercy is tempting God.

ACTS OF CONTRITION

The following Acts of Contrition appear in the new *Order of Penance* that is to be implemented between Ash Wednesday and Divine Mercy Sunday (the Second Sunday of Easter) 2023. Similar versions, although perhaps slightly differently translated, were included in the previous version of the liturgical book for confession (called the *Rite of Penance*). Any of these versions may be used in the sacrament, and in private prayer, or you may use your own words to express your sorrow and remorse. We publish them because most people will not have seen most of them,

O my God,
I am sorry and repent
with all my heart
for all the wrong I have done
and for the good
I have failed to do,
because by sinning
I have offended you,
who are all good and worthy
to be loved above all things.

I firmly resolve, with the help of your grace, to do penance, to sin no more, and to avoid the occasions of sin.

Through the merits of the Passion of our Savior Jesus Christ, Lord, have mercy. Amen.
