Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Jesus blesses those who believe even when they can't see what lies hidden beyond the veil of mystery. The Easter story is about people daring to believe in Jesus' resurrection precisely because of what they could not see or find – his body

in the tomb.

In the pre-dawn darkness, Mary Magdalene was making her way to the tomb where Joseph of Arimathea had placed the body of Jesus. She wasn't going there expecting to find an empty tomb. She was going to wash and anoint Jesus' body for burial, according to Jewish custom. Mary found nothing but the stone rolled away and the grave emptied of its precious contents. When she ran to tell Simon Peter and the other disciple, she was thinking his body had been stolen as one final, cruel act of mockery.

The disciple whom Jesus loved *saw and believed*. Who did he see? No one. What did he see? Nothing, just the shroud. He believed even if he did not yet understand.

No one saw the moment when the Lord God raised Jesus from the dead, but the Apostles would soon see Jesus, touch him, and eat with him by the shores of Galilee. They would be strengthened by him and given the Holy Spirit to guide them in the important work that lay ahead of them – that of building the Church. There would be no looking back from that day forward.

The same can happen for us. If we let him, the risen Christ can change our hearts so that we, too, will never be the same again. The risen Lord wishes to draw our eyes and our attention to heaven, that we might seek and think of what is above. Just as God rolled the stone away from the tomb and called his Son to new life, the risen Lord Jesus is seeking to roll the stone away from our tombs as well, calling us forth to live our faith more deeply.

Some people look at a cross and see an interesting geometric shape, a piece of art, or a Roman symbol of torture. For the believer, when we look upon a cross we see love and victory. Worldly people look at an empty tomb and they feel just like it – empty. Witnesses to the Resurrection look at the empty tomb with hearts full of faith, and we believe precisely because of what we can't see inside of it – the body of Jesus.

As we begin our 50-day celebration of Jesus' resurrection, may we be blessed for all that we do not see and still believe.

Sacraments and Sacramentals at Immaculate Heart of Mary

BAPTISM OF INFANTS

Baptisms of infants (younger than 7) are normally scheduled for the 2nd Saturday of the month at 10 am. A baptism preparation class is required for parents and godparents. Godparents must be practicing Catholics in good standing who have received Baptism, First Communion and Confirmation and must present a letter from their own parish stating that they are members and meet the requirements to be a godparent. See the pamphlet "Choosing Godparents" available in the foyer between the church and the hall. Contact Deacon Mike Crowe (240-542-8369, deaconmike@ihmrcc.org) before attending the preparation class.

CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS

Adults who would like to become Catholic or complete their sacraments of initiation (Baptism, Confirmation and First Communion) go through a formation process to prepare them not only for the sacraments, but for life as a disciple of Jesus Christ in this world and as saints in the next. FIRST COMMUNION AND CONFIRMATION OF YOUTH

Children and youth prepare for the sacraments as part of our religious education program on Sunday mornings and Monday evenings. At least two years of preparation are required for each sacrament, but Christian formation should not be seen as simply sacramental preparation. Children can and should be in our program continuously from age 6. Contact the Office of Religious Education.

COMMUNION TO THE SICK

Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion make regular visits to the sick and homebound. Those who are hospitalized and wish to receive communion should make sure they are listed in the hospital records as Catholic and wishing to receive communion. Most hospitals have a group from local parishes distributing communion. For visits at home, contact the parish office.

ANOINTING OF THE SICK

The Anointing of the Sick is administered both to the dying and to those who are gravely ill or are about to undergo a serious operation, for the recovery of their health and for spiritual strength. It may be repeated if the illness worsens or for a different serious illness. Please contact the parish office to arrange for a priest to administer the sacrament

PENANCE/CONFESSION

Penance, confession or reconciliation is available Saturdays from 2:30 to 3:45 pm, as well as on most Thursdays after the 5:30 pm Mass and most Sundays after the 1 pm Mass, or by appointment. On the first Friday of each month, confessions are available after the 9 am and 5:30 pm Masses and on the first Saturday after the 9 am Mass. The Church asks that we receive this sacrament at least once a year, but a greater frequency is highly beneficial. God's mercy is greater than any sin! Come unload the burden of your sins and receive God's mercy.

MARRIAGE

Couples must begin meeting with one of the priests at least **6 months before** the desired date of the wedding and before booking any reception halls or vendors. The date cannot be set until both parties' freedom to marry in the Catholic Church is established. A marriage preparation program, a natural family planning class and several meetings with the priest are part of the process of ensuring that you start off on the most solid ground possible. SACRED ORDERS

While this sacrament doesn't take place at the parish, the initial preparation for it does take place in the parish and in the home: living a truly Catholic life in service to God and neighbor, assisted by the sacraments and prayer. The formal preparation is coordinated by the Archdiocese.

Diaconate: Requires a 5 year part-time formation and discernment period. Contact the pastor and/or Deacon Charles Huber, Director of Formation at the Office of the Permanent Diaconate, 301-853-4582 or HuberC@adw.org. See http://www.adw.org/permanent-deacons/

Priesthood: Requires a 4-8 year full-time formation and discernment period. Contact one of the parish priests and/or the Archdiocesan Vocations Director, Fr. Mark Ivany at 202-636-9020 or dcpriest@adw.org. See http://www.dcpriest.org.

Help in vocations promotion at the parish is needed. Contact Fr. Schad to find out what you can do to encourage more men to discern the possibility of a call to the diaconate or the priesthood.


QUINCEAÑERA

The *Quinceañera* is a 15th birthday blessing and celebration for girls common throughout Mexico and Central America. Girls must be actively practicing their Catholic faith (attending Mass regularly) and have received Confirmation or be actively preparing for Confirmation. Girls wishing to celebrate their *Quinceañera* at Immaculate Heart of Mary should contact the parish office several months ahead of time.

FUNERALS

The Rites of Christian Burial both assist the deceased in their final journey and help the bereaved in their grieving process. Funerals at IHM normally take place sometime between 10 am and 1 pm (never on Sundays). On certain days of the liturgical year, funeral Masses cannot be celebrated. Initial arrangements should be made through the funeral home, who will confirm availability with the parish. Contact the parish office to complete the arrangements (selection of readings, music, etc.). Some people choose to make arrangements for their own funeral with the help of a priest. If you are considering cremation, the Church stresses that the funeral rites take place before cremation. Cremated remains should not be kept at home or scattered, but be treated with dignity, being laid to rest in a consecrated plot or columbarium niche. Easter Sunday The Resurrection of the Lord

Acts 10:34a, 37-43 | Col 3:1-4 or 1 Cor 5:6b-8 | Jn 20:1-9

I love arriving to Mass early when the sacristan is preparing the altar, or even shortly after the prior Mass clears out. This is because I enjoy praying the rosary with fellow parishioners as well as having my choice of seat in the church, but there's also something about the silence, the stillness that permeates the atmosphere during that time. Sitting alone with one's thoughts tends to either disturb or flat-out bore many people, but consider the silence in a new light this Easter Sunday. Mary of Magdala visited Christ's tomb only to find it empty; what was the tomb like after Christ had risen and left? I'd like to think the silence of the sanctuary before Mass is like the silence of the tomb: still, peaceful and, most of all, joyful, for our Savior conquered the grave. In a way, arriving early to a silent church is like Mary arriving to Jesus' tomb and finding it empty. Soon, though, the church is filled with other believers - witnesses to the risen Christ who proclaim his victory over sin and death to share in the Eucharist before going out into the world to serve and make disciples.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

After Mass, many of us are swept up in a dizzying Easter timeline full of brightness and pastels, rushing from Mass to Easter egg hunts to lunch or dinner that may leave kids and adults alike exhausted. But our Easter worship and traditions are important because they mark this day as the most joyful of all celebrations, indeed the greatest event in human history. The Lord Jesus is calling us to new life in him! We take this time to celebrate and reflect on what this means. After his resurrection, Jesus revealed himself over time to his Apostles. But before they saw Jesus and truly understood he had risen from the dead, they experienced great sadness and fear. In the same way for us, we must remember that there is no Easter without the suffering and darkness of Good Friday. St. Paul tells us in the second reading that, in order to celebrate the feast, we must "clear out the old yeast, so that [we] may become a fresh batch of dough." We can't celebrate with "the old yeast, the yeast of malice and wickedness" - we must let Christ purify our hearts and fill them with his Truth.

WITNESS Let the joy of Easter fuel a new resolve to be a witness to the Resurrection. Take Easter week to contemplate Scripture, to let Jesus fill your heart with his light and forgiveness so that you may bear his witness to those you encounter in the days and weeks to come.
