Dear Friends in Christ,

As we are about to begin the penitential season of Lent, it is a good time to (re) introduce a version of the Penitential Act at the beginning of Mass that is rarely used. We are very familiar with the first form, the *Confiteor* ("I confess to Almighty

God..."), and with the third, in which the deacon, priest or cantor incorporates a series of three statements (known as "tropes") about Christ with the phrases of the Kyrie: "Lord, have mercy", "Christ, have mercy" and "Lord, have mercy".

The second option is not used too often, probably because the translation that was used before 2012 made it easy to confuse with the third option. But that is now changed, and it is a shame to not make a fuller use of the richness of the liturgy available to us. At this parish, we used this second option during Lent in the Year of Mercy (2016), but have not used it since.

I think it appropriate to re-introduce it this Lent, and then continue using it from time to time thereafter, so we don't forget it and new parishioners get to learn it. I realize that at first it will be a little confusing and perhaps annoying but think of it as a Lenten penance if you have to. I am confident that we will get accustomed to it quickly; it only requires each of us to learn two short phrases.

As you would have experienced before Mass this weekend, the musicians will coach us before Mass for a couple of weeks, but also know that it is in the *JourneySongs* (green) hymnal at #142, and I reproduce it below for your convenience. We'll begin using it after Ash Wednesday, when the Penitential Act is replaced by the distribution of Ashes.

The Priest invites the faithful to make the Penitential Act: Brethren (brothers and sisters), let us acknowledge our sins, and so prepare ourselves to celebrate the sacred mysteries.

The Priest then says:
Have mercy on us, O Lord.
The people reply:
For we have sinned against you.

The Priest:
Show us, O Lord, your mercy.
The people:
And grant us your salvation.

The absolution by the Priest follows: May almighty God have mercy on us, forgive us our sins, and bring us to everlasting life. The people reply: **Amen.**

The *Kyrie* then follows (since we'll be in Lent, it will be the Greek chant *Kyrie eleision*).

ASHES (from *Sacred Signs* by Fr. Romano Guardini, 1927)

On the edge of the woods grows a larkspur. Its glorious blue blossom rising on its bending stalk from among the dark green curiously-shaped leaves fills the air with color. A passerby picks the flower, loses interest in it and throws it into the fire, and in a short moment all that is left of that splendid show is a thin streak of grey ash.

What fire does in an instant, time is always doing to everything that lives. The delicate fern, the stout mullein, the rooted oak, butterflies, darting swallows, nimble squirrels, heavy oxen, all of them, equally, sooner or later, by accident, disease, hunger, cold—all these clear-cut forms, all this flourishing life, turns to a little ash, a handful of dry dust, which every breeze scatters this way and that. All this brilliant color, all this sensitive, breathing life, falls into pale, feeble, dead earth, and less than earth, into ashes. It is the same with ourselves. We look into an opened grave and shiver: a few bones, a handful of ashgrey dust.

Remember, Man, you are dust and to dust you shall return.

Ashes signify man's overthrow by time. Our own swift passage, ours and not someone else's, ours, mine. When at the beginning of Lent the priest takes the burnt residue of the green branches of the last Palm Sunday and inscribes with it on my forehead the sign of the cross, it is to remind me of my death: *Memento homo quia pulvis est et in pulverem reverteris*. [Remember, Man, you are dust and to dust you shall return].

Everything turns to ashes, everything whatever. This house I live in, these clothes I am wearing, my household stuff, my money, my fields, meadows, woods, the dog that follows me, my horse in his stall, this hand I am writing with, these eyes that read what I write, all the rest of my body, people I have loved, people I have hated, or been afraid of, whatever was great in my eyes upon earth, whatever small and contemptible, all without exception will fall back into dust.

SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

FASTING AND ABSTINENCE FROM MEAT

The Basics:

Fasting: no more than one full meal on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday (for those 18 to 60).

Abstinence: no meat on Ash Wednesday and Fridays (for those 14 and older).

Fuller Explanation:

In commemoration of Christ's suffering and death, all Fridays throughout the year are days of penance, except if a Solemnity should happen to fall on a particular Friday. The Church's tradition and law is that we abstain from eating meat on Fridays as a communal form of penance that the entire Church performs together. Abstaining from eating meat is required on Fridays of Lent and encouraged on other Fridays. In the United States, we may substitute another equivalent penance on Fridays outside Lent, but some form of penance is still to be done on all Fridays. We also abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday. The rule on abstinence from meat applies to Catholics and catechumens (those preparing to enter the Church) aged 14 or older. Meat is defined as flesh from mammals and birds.

In addition to abstinence, fasting is required on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday and encouraged on Holy Saturday, to honor the suffering and death of the Lord Jesus, and to prepare ourselves to share more fully and to celebrate more readily his Resurrection. The fasting requirement applies to Catholics and catechumens between the ages of 18 and 60. For these purposes, fasting is defined as eating no more than one full meal that day. Two smaller meals are allowed if necessary to maintain strength according to one's needs, but eating solid foods between meals is not permitted. There are legitimate exceptions for the seriously ill and for those who might endanger their own or someone else's health (for example, diabetics, pregnant women, truck drivers, pilots, surgeons, etc.).

These, of course, are a bare minimum form of penance. The Church encourages us, for our own spiritual development and purification, to take up other penitential practices on Fridays and during Lent. Some choose to fast more frequently or abstain from other foods or activities. Some choose to take up additional spiritual and charitable practices (Stations of the Cross, Divine Mercy chaplet, service to the poor, etc.).

We ought to take up these penitential practices, not out of grudging obedience, but wholeheartedly, as a sign of our sorrow for our sins and the sins of others, as a sharing in Christ's supreme sacrifice, and as a purification in preparation for the celebration of the Resurrection at Easter, and for our own resurrection into eternal life.



Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Lv 13:1-2, 44-46 | 1 Cor 10:31—11:1 | Mk 1:40-45



The leper in today's Gospel was not only severely ill, but he was also barred from practicing his faith. Because he was considered unclean, he could not enter the temple to worship. It is no wonder he did everything in his power to find Jesus and beg him for healing. And heal him Jesus did, both body and soul. According to commentary on this passage from the USCCB, "In curing the leper, Jesus assumes that the priests will reinstate the cured man into the religious community." It seems to me that this Gospel is about faith, and about love. The leper had great faith that Jesus could heal him, and the great love of Jesus for this man moved Jesus to go against mosaic law by touching and healing him. When we read the Scriptures we are reminded over and over again how much God loves us. Let us allow this knowledge to sink into our hearts and change us. When we begin to reflect God's love to those around us, we will find that our lives are filled with his peace. Give it a try: Love as Jesus loves.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

The Gospel is about Jesus' love, and it's also about great faith. Faith is a theological virtue that involves believing in God and everything he has said and revealed. It is a free gift from God, and with the help of his grace, faith is the foundation of our personal and communal relationship with our Triune God. As God's children baptized into the Body of Christ, we can root everything we do in faith so that all of our actions point to God and to building his kingdom. How do we do this? It's hard to say it much better than Paul does in his letter to the Corinthians today: "Whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do everything for the glory of God."

ACCOMPANY How do we love as Jesus loves? Accompany another. Perhaps there is someone in our lives with whom we can walk alongside on their journey of faith. It need not be intimidating; as Christian disciples we already possess the tools we need to accompany: listen, love, share and pray.
