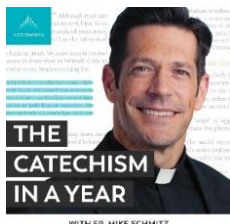

The Story of St. Agnes:

The Lamb of Christ

Virgin and Martyr • Feast day: January 21

St. Agnes, whose name means “lamb,” is a cherished figure in the history of Christianity, celebrated for her unwavering faith and purity. Born in Rome in 291 AD, she came from a wealthy and noble family. Despite her youth, she demonstrated extraordinary courage and devotion to Christ, becoming a model of steadfast faith in the face of persecution.

A Heavenly Spouse

Agnes was renowned for her beauty, and many suitors sought her hand in marriage. However, she refused all offers, declaring that she had consecrated her virginity to Christ. She famously said, *“He is my spouse whom the angels serve, whose beauty the sun and moon admire, and by whose gifts virgins are crowned.”* This declaration angered her suitors, who accused her of being a Christian — a crime punishable by death during the reign of Emperor Diocletian. At just 12 years old, Agnes was brought before a judge who attempted to persuade her to renounce her faith through promises of wealth and threats of torture. She stood firm, saying, *“You may stain your sword with my blood, but you will never be able to profane my body, which is consecrated to Christ.”*

Martyrdom of St. Agnes

When Agnes refused to yield, she was condemned to be exposed in a house of prostitution. However, her purity was miraculously preserved. Tradition holds that any man who attempted to violate her was struck blind, including one bold youth who was later healed through Agnes’s prayers.

Her unwavering faith led to her execution by beheading in 304 AD. Agnes’s body was buried in the catacombs on the Nomentana Way. A basilica, Sant’Agnese fuori le mura, was later



erected over her tomb by the orders of Emperor Constantine’s daughter, Constantina, who had a special devotion to the young saint.

Traditions and Honors

St. Agnes’s feast day is celebrated on January 21. A unique tradition associated with her involves the blessing of two lambs at the Church of St. Agnes in

Rome. These lambs’ wool is woven into pallia, which are ceremonial stoles symbolizing the authority and pastoral mission of archbishops. The pallia are placed on the main altar of St. Peter’s Basilica on the feast of Ss. Peter and Paul and later bestowed upon the archbishops by the pope.

Patronage and Legacy

St. Agnes is the patron saint of young girls, chastity, and victims of sexual assault. Her story has inspired countless works of art, including paintings by Domenichino and sculptures by Giovanni Lorenzo Bernini. She is often depicted with a lamb, symbolizing her name and her pure devotion to Christ, as well as a palm branch, signifying her martyrdom.

Quotes and Reflections

One of St. Agnes’s most powerful quotes is: *“Christ has made my soul beautiful with the jewels of grace and virtue. I belong to Him whom the angels serve.”* These words capture her deep faith and unwavering love for her heavenly spouse.

News from the Roman Catholic Diocese of Burlington

For the Diocese and for the whole world Vermont's Discalced Carmelites

Secreted away off of a dirt road in Lowell, the Carmel of Saint Joseph is easy to miss if one isn't looking for it.

The Discalced Carmelites have had a presence in Vermont since 1946; initially based in Barre, they relocated to their current monastery in Lowell. Today, the Carmelites of Vermont are experiencing a quiet, gradual revival, continuing the mission they began in the state almost 80 years ago.

"The charism of the Discalced Carmelites, first and foremost, is to pray for the Church"

explained Sister Diane of Jesus. "That was the original goal of our founder, Saint Teresa of Avila, and that's the mission we carry out today as well." Visibly, the Discalced Carmelites differ from the ancient Carmelites by either going barefoot or wearing only simple sandals — hence the use of the word "discalced," a portmanteau of the Latin words "dis" (without) and "calceus" (shoe).

"We were actually the first order of nuns in the United States" Sister Diane said. "We first established a community in a town called Port Tobacco, of all things, in Maryland." The order's first community in the fledgling republic was established in 1790; today, there are 60 Carmelite monasteries in the United States, across almost every state.

Life in the monastery follows a rhythm which remains relatively unchanged since the days of the order's founding. The nuns begin each day with Eucharistic Adoration, beginning at 6:30 a.m.; the Liturgy of the Hours, daily Mass, and private prayer and study punctuate the day, with periodic "breaks" for work, until the Great Silence commences in the evening. The monastery's chapel is adorned with icons, written in Byzantine style, which were all created by one of the sisters. "The creation of an icon is itself an act of prayer" explained Sister Marie Susanne of the Eucharist; "There's a very specific process which has to be undertaken, a very specific way it's done ... People think it must be horrible for an artist to limit themselves so severely, but really, it frees the artist to imbue the piece with more meaning. There's nothing accidental in these pieces ... the

position of the hands, the expression of the eyes, even how the head is tilted, it's all designed to teach and tell a story." The other work of note the nuns perform is the weaving of vestments for priests. "We pray for all of the priests of our diocese, and for our bishop" said Sister Diane; "That is our most important work, always. But this physical work is a way we can support them concretely, as well."

The way of Carmel is, by the sisters' own admission, a narrow path; though vocations are once again growing after years of

decline, they make it clear that theirs is not a numbers game. "We never set out to be the biggest or the grandest" Sister Diane said. "We are most comfortable with between, I'd say, five and 10 sisters living here. We have six right now, a tremendous blessing, and a few women discerning." The nuns currently at the Carmel of Saint Joseph came to the order by many paths — some, like Sister Marie Susanne, discerned a calling early and clearly. "I remember one evening, as I was discerning (religious life), I firmly believe I received an interlocution, a voice asked me, 'Is this truly what you want?' I knew in that moment my answer had to be 'Yes.'" Others, such as Sister Diane herself, came the long way around; "I had, from a secular point of view, everything a young woman could ask for. And yet, I couldn't escape the feeling I wasn't where I was supposed to be." The common thread between every nun's story is the sense of a call that could, at a certain point, no longer be denied or avoided. "It's easy to focus on all the things we have to give up" Sister Marie Susanne said. "What I want people to know is what we've gained. We are brides of Christ — nothing can compare to that!"

As the Diocese of Burlington heads into its Year of Vocations, the Discalced Carmelites prepare to continue their mission as they have always done; quiet, even hidden at times, but persistent and efficacious. "In our prayer, in our work, in everything we do," Sister Diane said in conclusion, "we offer everything we have for the diocese and for the whole world."

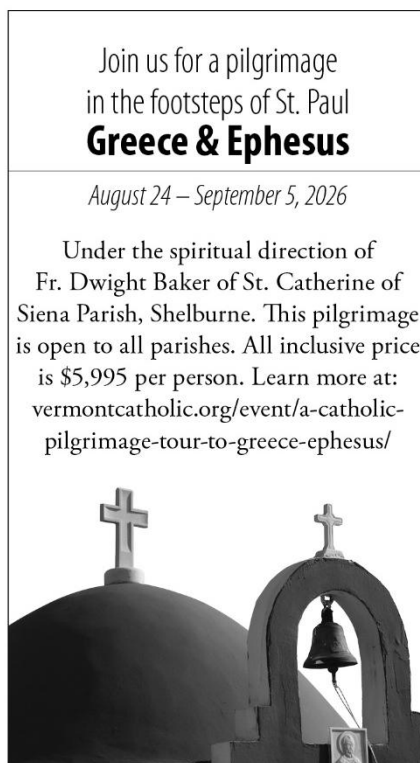
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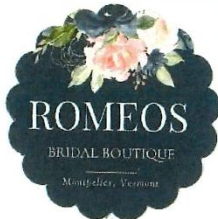
