

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Surprisingly, today's feast has architectural origins. Several feasts on our calendar come from two ancient customs: building churches over the burial places of great saints, and annual celebrations of the anniversary of dedication of the churches. In the Vatican, St. Peter's Basilica stands on the site of earlier churches built over the burial place of St. Peter. Outside the walls of the ancient Roman city, St. Paul's stands where the apostle is believed to be buried. Even today, it is a long hike between the great churches, but in the fourth century, the people of Rome would go in procession with the bishop after Mass at St. Peter's, all the way to St. Paul's for another liturgy on this day. Peter and Paul are amazingly different figures: the rough-and-ready fisherman and the intellectual, tireless founder of small Christian communities springing up wherever he paused on his journeys. Peter was the companion of Jesus in his ministry, and Paul was transformed by the Risen Christ. Even though they labored separately, all Christians today trace their roots to their ministry. Many churches include statues or windows of both saints, traditionally placed a good distance apart, perhaps a reminder of that long yearly hike in the Roman sun!

A NOTE FROM YOUR PASTOR

Dear Parishioners,

On Saturdays, the parish priests will be hearing confessions. We will be in the church at the usual times: 3:30 - 5:00 p.m. and 7:30 - 8:30 p.m. While we are in the pandemic, we cannot use the confessionals. It has been pointed out that each person who comes into the closet-size room would breathe whatever the last 10 people had exhaled.

So, we are going to try this protocol for the Sacrament of Reconciliation in the more open air at the sanctuary of the church:

- Everyone needs to wear a mask in the church.
- One priest will sit in front of St. Mary’s altar.
- The other priest will sit in front of St. Joseph’s altar.
- The penitents will wait in two lines in the center aisle (which is seven feet wide).
- For good physical distancing, the penitents may either sit or stand at an open pew.
- When the line moves, the penitents would advance to the next open pew.

I think this will work. It may be the procedure for quite a while. When public services were suspended, I thought we would be back to normal liturgies by now. It seemed like it would be just a couple months before the confessionals could be reopened. Now, it is clear that for the foreseeable future, special precautions must be taken to stop the spread of the virus.
