Entering the Desert of Lent

The first line of the Gospel reading, for the first Sunday of Lent this year, comes from Matthew 4:1. It states, "At that time Jesus was led by the Spirit into the desert." For Christians, the desert is mentioned and referenced year after year when Lent rolls around. Not only does the season begin with Jesus going out into the desert, but in a similar manner, each of us as followers of Christ is called to embrace our own desert experience.

For virtually all of us, being directed to a desert is not a path we willingly want to partake. It is a task we would prefer to avoid and it is definitely not an exercise we yearn to repeat.

My third-grade teacher, Mrs. Nelson, taught me the following trick to correctly differentiate and spell the words desert and dessert. Desert has one 's' because you only want to visit there once, whereas dessert has two because you want to revisit it over and over.

So why then, would the Catholic Church focus on a desert? Why would it stress this particular symbol as somewhere we should allegorically go to visit? Of all the images that could be emphasized, what is it about a barren land, with minimal rainfall, that could possibly connect us to Lent?

Perhaps it is more about what is not present in the desert, than what it actually contains. For a desert is a place where things are stripped away. The climate uncovers and exposes thus revealing the bare essence and the heart of the matter. Masks are discarded and non-essentials are disposed of. Pilgrims journeying through a desert cling to just what is truly necessary.

From this desert perspective, the three pillars of Lent which are prayer, fasting and almsgiving, become more relevant and pertinent.

Prayer involves us turning our hearts and minds more completely towards God. It is surrendering our independence, and openly embracing our dependence on the divine. As we swelter in the desert heat, we realize we cannot survive on our own. When we are praying with a burning passion, we admit we do not want to go through life without our Lord.

Fasting requires self-discipline and self-control. It is going without the things we think we want, so we can better rely on the things we actually need. As we face dehydration in the bleak desert land, we come to understand what we physically thirst for. When we are spiritually fasting from our vices and shortcomings, we embrace the bread and wine of Jesus that we desperately hunger for.

Almsgiving entails sharing our blessings with others. It is giving our treasures to someone in need, and it is giving of ourselves to everyone. As we walk in the desolate desert sand, we witness that the land seems devoid of life. When we are giving to help neighbors and strangers alike, we become servants who bring the lifeforce of the Holy Spirit to humanity.

Maybe as we stare out at the figurative desert this Lent, we can enter into it with our eyes wide open. We can view it more clearly as a metaphor of how it invites us to change and conversion. Perhaps we can imitate the example of Jesus, and permit ourselves to be led into the desert as equally enthusiastically as we go back again for that second dessert.

Parish Community Center February update

In our last update, we reported that we received four bids for the project in December and narrowed them to two companies. Since then, the campaign leadership team has done its due diligence in asking for value engineering reductions in



costs, as well as met with both contractors and spoken with a prior customer of each company. The team has chosen D.E.R. Development Company as the winning bid. They are a third generation, family-owned construction company with over 75 years of service to the tri-state area. They pride themselves on their years of experience, as well as being able to self-perform many project tasks that are normally subbed out with their team of experienced contractors. The projected start date is April 10th and estimated completion date is April of 2024.

As you will recall, our original cost estimate was \$4.2M. We met our pledge goal back in 2021 and since then have garnered new pledges in the amount of \$300,000 for a total of nearly \$4.5M in pledges. D.E.R.'s bid in combination with the contingency, Archdiocesan assessment and estimated loan interest came in at \$4,686,554, which includes the increase in material cost and inflation over the last 18 months. Finance Council and Pastoral Council have both approved respective motions to move forward with the new project costs.

We are beyond grateful to report that half of our donors have completed their pledges and so we have \$2.5M in-hand. This means we will not have to take a loan for some time, and will lead to less interest charges. It also gives the team a chance to reach out to parishioners who have not made a pledge, in hopes of gaining new pledges to cover the close to \$200,000 shortfall. It is also our hope that current donors might consider advancing their pledges by a month, a quarter, or whatever is feasible in order to collect funds sooner and end up with an even smaller loan amount/interest. If you haven't made a pledge to this important project, now is a good time to join us in the journey.

We cannot thank you enough for your prayers, your pledges, your patience and your love for this great parish. What an exciting year this will be as we complete this long-awaited addition to our campus.

The blessing of Easter baskets

Why are families taking baskets of food into the Day Chapel? It is a tradition in Eastern Europe to bless the Easter food before it is prepared for Easter dinner. In earlier times, meat and dairy products were excluded from the daily diet during the entire season of Lent. As the end of the strict fast approached, people showed their joy and gratitude by taking their food to church to be blessed and eaten after the Easter Liturgy.

This tradition celebrates the joy of the resurrection as the Easter meal breaks six weeks of Lenten fasting, and the foods represent fare abstained from during Lent. St. Columban will once again celebrate this tradition on Holy Saturday, April 8th at 1:00 p.m. in the Day Chapel. Families who wish to participate in the basket blessing are invited to bring samplings of foods they will eat on Easter Day in a basket (baked goods, bread, eggs, ham). Come and have your Easter food blessed!

Parish visioning survey

Two years ago St. Columban completed a three-year parish Vision: *In 2021 we will be more actively living our faith, in family, in parish, in community.* The three priorities for the 2018-2021 Vision work were:



- Youth and young adult engagement
- Journeys to deeper faith
- A vibrant, faith-based school

As we were launching the Vision in 2018, parishioners were invited to take the **Disciple Maker Index (DMI) Survey** to reflect on their own spiritual growth and discipleship and identify the ways in which the parish effectively supports that growth. The three Vision teams used the results of this survey to help form their goals and objectives. DMI is conducted by the Catholic Leadership Institute, a non-profit Catholic apostolate that does leadership training and development nationally and internationally.

Parishes in the Archdiocese are taking the survey this month, and in our case, we will gain additional insights as we compare our 2023 results to those of 2018.
