

Pastor's Notes: Quandary (Part 2) May 31, 2020

The following is the second part of Fr. Carter's letter to parishioners that was begun in last weekend's bulletin:

It is right and legitimate to arrive at the answer to the quandary of the present crisis by saying that I will stay at home. It is just and legitimate to consider your own health, the health of others, and most especially the vulnerable among us, when arriving at this decision. No one should ever be required to go against their conscience, nor should anyone be judged for making this decision, even in a heroic way, knowing that their fast from the spiritual goods the Church provides will be prolonged. It can and should even be considered heroic, if done in the right spirit.

On the other hand, those who have other needs beyond that of the body and have a spiritual longing that would transcend more earthly considerations - even those which may affect others - may choose to come to the public celebration of Mass and the other sacraments that the Church has an obligation to offer to the faithful. This may mean the assumption of a certain amount of risk, and this risk should not be taken in a cavalier manner. To simply come to Mass heedless of the risk one is taking for oneself and for those with whom they may come into contact could be a cause of sin. However, with appropriate precautions and keeping in mind the legitimate recommendations of civil and ecclesial authority, such as the sanitary measures that we are called to take upon ourselves, they may still approach, in good conscience, the saving sacraments. I would note that also, being at Mass confers a certain amount of grace and is a spiritual solace to the hungry soul. To be close to our Lord on Calvary in a very real way is not to be disparaged or considered perpetually dispensable.

I would also note that being present at Mass does not require the reception of Holy Communion. Perhaps one good that can come from this present crisis is an awareness of the fallacy that has crept into Catholic life that fulfilling one's obligation to go to Mass has been conflated erroneously with the obligation to receive Holy Communion. These are two distinct obligations. Under normal circumstances, every mature, baptized Catholic Christian is obliged to be present for the Holy Sacrifice every Sunday and holy day but is only obliged to receive Holy Communion once a year. Associated with this once-a-year Communion is the obligation also to confess one's grave sins before approaching Communion. For more information on how to understand that during this crisis, read what the Apostolic Penitentiary put out. (A link is posted on the home page of our parish website.)

For reasons of this proper distinction, I would also mention that beyond the acceptance of a certain amount of risk in coming to the public celebration of Mass, one would take a further measured risk in presenting oneself for Holy Communion, as it brings you into closer proximity to another in a very intimate way, the likes of which are discouraged by the current recommendations of social distancing. Each individual must evaluate for him or herself the individual good that coming to Mass and going to Communion entails for them, and it must be weighed in light of the common good, keeping in mind the legitimate dispensations offered to us and the recommendations of spiritual communion and the offering of the live-streamed Masses that one can participate in from home. Having explained all these things may not have alleviated the quandary for all.

However, the same quandary is not afforded to the priest. For me, it is very clear where my duty lies. If a person legitimately presents him or herself for the saving sacraments, the supreme law that I follow of salvation of souls prevents me from shirking my responsibility for material considerations. I think of the image of the Good Shepherd that Jesus speaks to us in the Gospel, where he juxtaposes the Good Shepherd who lays down his life for his sheep, as opposed to the hireling who, at the sight of the wolf, flees. (John 10:11-16) I see a beautiful incarnation of this in the life of the Servant of God, Fr. Patrick Ryan, who - when all others fled the City of Chattanooga in 1878 rather than face the Yellow Fever epidemic - stayed and ministered heroically to those most affected by this disease, heedless of the personal cost, even to laying down his life as a martyr of charity. I believe it to be a great example of what a Good Shepherd ought to be, and what every priest is called to do, should the faithful call upon him, having discerned their own need. That is why we will be offering the public celebration of Mass and we will be offering Holy Communion – because the individual good of souls requires it, and because the supreme law of salvation of souls demands it of me. We will, of course, follow all the recommended guidelines and regulations, weighing in the balance the common good along with the individual good. It will not resolve all quandaries, nor will it be perfect, as hindsight might reveal. But it is the best we can do for now, knowing that no one is held to the impossible.

I know this has been a very long message, but I feel I needed to work out in my mind what I'm sure you are working out in your own. I hope it has been helpful and I pray for the day when this present disease, which is the motivating factor for our quandary, will cease.

Following Bishop Stika's decree,

- The Sunday Mass obligation is currently suspended. We continue to livestream our Sunday Masses.
- If you have had symptoms of illness recently or have been exposed to someone confirmed to have COVID-19, please postpone your visit.
- Visitors over 5 years of age must bring and wear a mask or face covering of any sort and keep 6 feet apart from others.
- We must abide by the capacity limits established by the Bishop.
 Please arrive a few minutes early, and an usher will seat you.
 Overflow seating will be offered in Varallo Parish Hall, where the Mass is simulcast.
- Please refrain from physical greetings. The Sign of Peace, Presentation of Gifts, and holding hands at the Our Father will be omitted.
- Holy Communion will be offered in the hand only, after Mass. Please remove your mask and use hand sanitizer, then replace your mask. All who cannot physically receive are encouraged to make a spiritual Communion. **Prohibition of receiving on the tongue is temporary** and the Bishop has indicated it will be lifted as soon as possible.
- Weekday Masses offer ample spacing as an alternative to Sunday. All are encouraged to discern precautions suitable to their circumstances.

USHERS and CLEANERS NEEDED

We need volunteers to help us abide by the health measures to be offer public Masses according to the Bishop's decree. In particular, we are going to need extra ushers and a volunteer cleaning crew after each weekend Mass. If you are willing to help, please contact the parish office to be added to the list, and we will contact you with more information.
