Thoughts on Today's Readings

No matter who we might be, our control over tomorrow's challenges is limited. Paul's Letter to The Romans describes a situation when we have run out of ideas and stand without a clue about how to solve a problem that hangs over us like a storm cloud. "The Spirit intercedes for us with inexpressible groanings." Weeds dominate, no staunch allies to join, no perceived way to change my situation. I don't even know what to pray for. Stand before God, let the groaning of your heart rise up to God and trust his mercy. It is the prayer of Jesus in the garden, the prayer of Mary standing by the cross, the prayer of Peter as he realized how totally he had betrayed Jesus.

Listen carefully to the parables. The weeds that can crowd and push against the wheat will not be removed. Turn to God's good people who stand next to you. They may offer support and give you more room to grow. Remember that help doesn't always come from the powerful ones in this world. The humble sources of shade and solace like the mustard tree might be the close and welcoming signs of God's presence. New yeast in your heart and life may change dryness to joy.

The message this Sunday is not only addressed to those who find themselves in harsh situations, uncertain of what comes next. It is a call to understand the situation of a brother or sister whose life seems to be dominated by weeds rather than wheat. "Get rid of them! Throw the book at them!" Those are today's words of those who asked about pulling up those weeds. Listen to what the master says, "No, if you pull up the weeds, you might uproot the wheat along with them." Care for your brothers and sisters who have lost their way, for they are part of the same community you are. Offering small assistance, what you can do (joining with many others you may not even see) provides the hospitality one needs to change. One good person, one generous act may be the yeast our community needs.

Whoever has ears ought to hear.



Many of you know that Justice Knox is a local collaboration of faith congregations throughout Knoxville and Knox County doing justice work. What you may not know is that Justice Knox is affiliated with the DART organization. DART is made up of 31 grassroots interfaith organizations in ten states uniting clergy and lay leaders to work for justice. Here are the four core values upon which DART is built.

• We believe in the scriptural story of justice.

Across faith traditions, scripture lays out a story of abundance, love, hope, promise and community. In this story, loving God and your neighbor and yourself gives life meaning. We believe fighting for justice is fundamental to our identity as people of faith.

We stand over and against the "cult of money".

The cult of money uses consumer culture to promote stories of scarcity, hate, fear, despair and individualism.

• We need the power of organized people to win justice (Nehemiah 5).

Through direct action, organized people from a cross section of faith traditions publicly hold decision-makers accountable on justice issues that affect their communities. We support one another in this struggle for justice.

• We embrace high standards and rigorous accountability because our task is so important.

We conduct evaluations to achieve understanding, not to assign blame. Each of us celebrates when another succeeds. We embrace pragmatic solutions. We are in this work for the long haul.

Catholic Response to Climate Change

The 2023 Laudato Si' and the U.S. Catholic Church national conference, which has been taking place virtually on selected evenings in June and July, continues with the last session of the Vatican's Laudato Si' Action Platform "Response to the Cry of the Earth" on July 25. The conference will conclude with a closing celebration on July 27th to honor Laudato Si' champions in the U.S. Sessions include Spanish language interpretation.

Season of Creation Events and Activities

The Catholic Response to Climate Change Committee of East Tennessee is planning events and activities for the Season of Creation (September 1 through October 4, the Feast Day of St. Francis of Assisi). On Sunday afternoon, September 17, CRCC will host an event at All Saints Catholic Church. The event, which is scheduled from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m., will include a presentation by Sister Rose Marie, who is a Catholic Climate Covenant Ambassador, and who understands that issues about the environment and climate change will continue to affect all of the other issues with which the Sisters of Mercy are concerned, especially immigration and racism. Sister Rose Marie will lead a discussion with the audience about the Church's teaching on creation care and climate change, and demonstrate how this issue affects much more than just natural ecology, and how Catholics working together can impact climate change and protect our common home and its inhabitants.

During the Season of Creation, several area churches will be celebrating Masses with the theme of reverence for God's gift of creation, and Catholics from all parishes are invited to all. Father Peter Iorio, pastor of Our Lady of Fatima in Alcoa, will preside at an outdoor Mass (weather permitting) on the Feast Day of St. Francis. Dates for other Masses and activities during the Season of Creation will be announced in August.

Advocacy Opportunity

A new proposal from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to cut climate pollution from dirty power plants sets the first ever limits on most power plant carbon pollution. The proposal would keep the electric system reliable and economical, and would spur industry adoption of cleaner power generation resources, resulting in less harmful air pollution.

The EPA is currently taking public comments on the proposed rules, which have yet to be finalized. There is strong public support for regulating carbon pollution, and it is important that the EPA hear from as many people as possible to ensure that the rules are strong enough to drive down harmful pollution from power plants. The proposed limits on carbon pollution from power plants would improve public health and protect our environment, giving us invaluable tools in securing a stable climate for ourselves and future generations.

The EPA's proposed standard will:

- Slash carbon pollution by 617 million metric tons from 2028 to 2042;
- Provide up to \$85 billion in net climate and public health benefits through 2042;
- Avoid 1,300 premature deaths, 800 hospital and ER visits, more than 300,000 asthma attacks, 38,000 school absences, and 66,000 lost work days in 2030 alone.

We need the EPA to protect us from dirty power plants. They must listen to scientists' warnings about the urgent need for climate action, public calls for strong climate action, and the voices of those living near power plants. EPA must finalize the strongest possible Cut Climate Pollution Plan by early next year.


