World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation

The origins of the day go back to Ecumenical Patriarch Dimitrios who proclaimed September 1 as "Creation Day" for the Orthodox in 1989, followed by other Christian European Churches in 2001, and by Pope Francis in 2015.

Our 5:05pm Daily Mass on Friday, September 1 will be offered for the Care of Creation.

Thoughts on Today's Readings

The disciples report to Jesus what people say about him: "He is like John the Baptist come back to life...or Elijah come back down to earth." They were trying to find someone in the past similar to Jesus. Peter saw him as defining the future: "You are the anointed one of God. God's reign on this earth begins with you!"

Then Jesus says those famous words that Catholics use to mark the beginning of the role of the Pope: "You are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church, and the gates of the netherworld will not prevail against it."

Let's speak of the present day. What do you hear people saying about Pope Francis? Is he like Pope John or Pope John Paul II? I think most people would say no. Pope John convened the Second Vatican Council. Pope John Paul II was a staunch hero, calling all believers to hear and follow the teachings of the church fearlessly.

What about Pope Francis? I believe we cannot find anyone in the past to which we can compare him. He calls us to turn our attention to the needs of all peoples as we walk into the future. I will give three examples of his actions and words leading us into the future:

- 1. Wars disrupt millions of lives all over the globe. Wars in Afghanistan, Syria, Ukraine, Sudan, Somalia all force people to flee. Drug wars and gangs ravage Mexico and Guatemala. Since the beginning, Francis has not let us forget to welcome the stranger.
- 2. The agonies of nature call us to have compassionate restraint in our treatment of the earth.
- 3. Finally, he convenes all peoples of the earth to the synod in Rome to listen to one another and chart a path together to the future.

Today, God's reign on earth calls for a new way.



Social Concerns Committee's New Projects for the Coming Year

Opportunities!: We are putting together a booklet of ways you can get involved and use your talents to help others in Knox County. Insight and Awareness Conversations: A weekly feature of our parish is an article or video on topics pertinent to our Catholic faith. Promoting Justice Knox among Catholic Parishes: St. John XXIII is the only Catholic parish involved in Justice Knox among 25 member congregations. We are hoping to meet on January 16th with our Catholic brothers and sisters from other Knox Country parishes to inform them about Justice Knox and present a Justice Knox issue being addressed this year. In Lexington and Louisville Kentucky, many Catholic parishes are involved a group like this, so we will invite their leaders to attend, sharing why Catholic parishes are involved there. Watch for information in December and January, and we will be counting on you to help us spread the word in the Catholic Community of Knoxville.

John Dear Book tour: Noted author Fr. John Dear, SJ is doing a speaking tour on his forthcoming Orbis book: "The Gospel of Peace: A Commentary on Matthew, Mark and Luke from the Perspective of Nonviolence." We are looking forward to partnering with other churches to bring Fr. Dear to Knoxville to speak on his book pointing out Jesus' practice and teachings of nonviolence.

As you can see, we have a lot planned and we need your help. Our committee is open to new ideas and would welcome your presence. We meet for 90 minutes on the third Sunday of the month. Most of us would agree that our church offers many ways to walk with God. We have very meaningful liturgies with beautiful music, the sacraments, Bible studies, discussion groups to develop our faith, etc. We also are committed to merciful, charitable works. We support and volunteer with the Ladies of Charity, fill pantries with food, donate money to the Pregnancy Help Center and contribute money to various worthwhile organizations each week in special collections. We visit the sick and imprisoned, take in refugees, and assist immigrants. These are just some of the things we do.

God also requires us to do justice. What is justice? Here is a quote from the late great South African Bishop Desmond Tutu that gives insight into what justice is: "There comes a time when we must stop just pulling people out of the river. We need to go upstream and find out why they are falling in." That is what Justice Knox tries to do. We listen to people's stories and then go "upstream" to see why people are so adversely affected. Some members do research and find best practices. Then, we present these to officials and ask for changes to better the lives of those in the river.

We have had successes with affordable housing, crisis intervention training, and restorative practices in the schools. But there is so much more to do. Our community still reels from gun violence, homelessness, and mental health issues. There are pockets of citizens that keep being pulled down river. We, as people of faith, can make changes if we have the will. Justice Knox is a way to join with other faith congregations to do justice for all of God's people. There are many different ways to join in the work of Justice Knox that can fit your busy life. We invite you to join us.

First Fridays Devotions

In the late 17th century, St. Margaret Mary Alacoque, who had experienced a childhood filled with illness and a difficult home life, decided to reject the possibility of marriage. Instead, she joined the Order of the Visitation nuns. She had a rocky start in her vocation but eventually found her rhythm in the monastery where she lived. Then, she started having visions.

These visions were of Jesus, asking her to spread the word about devotions to his Sacred Heart. As Catholics, we understand this to mean the entire mystery of Christ and everything about Jesus: Son of God, Savior, part of the Trinity, and our salvation. The Church celebrates the Sacred Heart of Jesus on the Friday following the second Sunday after Pentecost. As you may have guessed from that oddly specific dating, Fridays are an important part of the Sacred Heart devotion and Sister Margaret Mary's vision.

In her visions, Jesus asked her to share his promises of good things that could happen if we could spread this devotion. This was a time when most people received the Eucharist only rarely, and it created new interest in both the sacraments of Eucharist and Reconciliation.



Many parishes offer First Friday observances. In order to fully participate, on the First Friday of each month, attend Mass, receive Communion, and go to confession. That's it!

If you're finding prayer life a little flat, trying new devotions may be enough to help yourself out of that slump. First Fridays may be the first step to a renewed and refreshed spirit!


