World Mission Sunday

Our second collection this weekend is for World Mission Sunday. This collection supports the pastoral and evangelizing programs and needs of nearly 1200 mission dioceses in Africa, Asia, the Pacific Islands, and remote regions of Latin America. Pope Pius XI first instituted Mission Sunday for the whole Church with the first worldwide collection in 1927 in order to help emphasize our universal solidarity in sharing in our common responsibility for evangelizing the world. The urgency of the Church's missionary activity naturally calls for an ever closer missionary cooperation on the part of all her members and at every level. This is an essential goal of the synodal journey that the Church has undertaken, guided by the key words: communion, participation, mission. This journey is certainly not a turning of the Church in upon herself; nor is it a referendum about what we ought to believe and practice, nor a matter of human preferences. Rather, it is a process of setting out on the way and, like the disciples of Emmaus, listening to the risen Lord. For he always comes among us to explain the meaning of the Scriptures and to break bread for us, so that we can, by the power of the Holy Spirit, carry out his mission in the world.

Just as the two disciples of Emmaus told the others what had taken place along the way (cf. Lk 24:35), so too our proclamation will be a joyful telling of Christ the Lord, his life, his passion, his death and resurrection, and the wonders that his love has accomplished in our lives.

So let us set out once more, illumined by our encounter with the risen Lord and prompted by his Spirit. Let us set out again with burning hearts, with our eyes open and our feet in motion. Let us set out to make other hearts burn with the word of God, to open the eyes of others to Jesus in the Eucharist, and to invite everyone to walk together on the path of peace and salvation that God, in Christ, has bestowed upon all humanity.

Our Lady of the Way, Mother of Christ's missionary disciples and Queen of Missions, pray for us!

Almost 3 years ago, a group of parishioners formed a committee to welcome a refugee family. After training from Bridge Refugee Services, we met to decide what role we could play, and prepared to welcome our family. On October 22, 2021, we went to the airport to welcome our family which consisted of 9 people:

the parents and 7 wonderful children.

For 2 years, we worked as a committee to help them integrate into Knoxville society, get social security cards, celebrate birthdays, and help them get to where they needed to be. We also met regularly by Zoom, and sometimes in person to resolve challenges and celebrate with the family.

On Sunday, October 2, 2023, we met for the last time as the Refugee Welcoming Committee to remember, to celebrate the gains they have made, and to become just friends. No more committee, just a group of wonderful friends.

An extra special thing happened on October 10 – Sabura, the mother, got her driver's license. They will always be part of our families, they will always be friends, and we don't need a committee for that.

But other families need the kind of accompaniment that the Turkmens received from our parish from the moment they stepped off the plane. Perhaps that is something you might like to do. If you are unsure, check with Brad and Christine Croisdale, Jim and Carey Chambers, Al Legendre and Be, Charlie and Geri Mulligan, and our friend Laykoon and her husband. It has been and will continue to be one of the best committees we ever belonged to. Now, it is time to pass on the joy to others. Did you know that someone in our parish has had a loved one shot in the line of duty as a police officer?

Did you know that someone in our parish has had a loved one commit suicide because of mental illness?

Did you know that a parishioner watched an elderly person get off a bus and walk on a narrow busy street to get groceries? Fearing for the woman's safety, our good Samaritan approached her, and found out that this woman had to go to a store far from her home. She had to spend several hours on a bus for a round trip when a car would have taken only 10 minutes.

Did you know that a single mom, a niece of one of our parishioners, works at a bank full time making \$35,000 a year and pays \$1800 a month, or \$21,600 yearly, in childcare for her two young children?

These are stories we are hearing at our Justice Knox Listening Sessions right here at our church.

People are struggling and doing the best they can. Yet it isn't enough to keep them safe, healthy, stable, and secure. In Justice Knox, we take on a pressing issue and do extensive research. Currently, we are working on Gun Violence and Homelessness. In the past, we have successfully gotten changes for our police officers with Crisis Intervention Training. At our Nehemiah Action Assembly, Mayor Kincannon, publicly committed to adding a dedicated source of funding for an Affordable Housing Trust Fund of \$50,000,000 over a ten-year period. And Knox County Schools agreed to our ask and are piloting a restorative practices approach to discipline. We were able to get public commitments because people of faith came together and pressed for change.

Of course, we haven't solved all the problems people face, but we have taken serious steps: steps toward changing our community where people can live in a more just, caring society enabling them to reach their God-given potential and dignity. We don't do the very much-needed works of charity such as giving out food or clothing. Rather, we do **justice** work to get to the why of the problem, and find ways to eradicate it.

We ask you to join us in supporting our work by coming to a few meetings throughout the year.

Catholic Response to Climate Change


Pope Francis chose the Feast Day of St. Francis of Assisi to present his Apostolic Exhortation, Laudate Deum (Praise God). The exhortation on the climate crisis, a follow up to his encyclical, Laudato Si' which he wrote eight years ago, was released at the conclusion of the Season of Creation on October 4, and addressed to all people of good will.

In his preface to the address, the Holy Father underlined the U.S. Bishops' expressed concern about climate change, which he said, "goes beyond a merely ecological approach, because our care for one another and our care for the earth are intimately bound together," stressing that "the effects of climate change are borne by the most vulnerable people, whether at home or around the world." In the eight years since the publication of Laudato Si' in 2015, when the Holy Father shared his "heartfelt concerns about the care of our common home," he writes that "our responses have not been adequate while the world in which we live is collapsing and may be near the breaking point."

In Laudate Deum, Pope Francis urges a "pilgrimage of reconciliation: with our home on Earth." According to a report by the Laudato Si' Action Platform Team, Laudate Deum is already "sparking transformative conversations and inspiring real-world action."

At our October 12 CRCC meeting we reflected on the message expressed in Laudate Deum as we celebrated the activities and events planned by our Creation Care teams, which took place in our area during the Season of Creation. One such event at All Saints Church on September 17, was *Everything is Connected*, a powerful presentation on Laudato Si' by Sister Rose Marie Tresp, RSM, Director of Justice Ministries for the Sisters of Mercy of the Americas. For those who may have missed it, we will be presenting it on Zoom this month and next, and will make it available to all who wish to view. We will announce those dates soon.

What's happening at the Synod on Synodality

The topic this week was "communion, mission, and participation." These subjects are a definite priority for a church which hopes to promote dialogue, not only among its own members, but also with other congregations trying to follow the call of the Holy Spirit in today's world.

So, how does that actually happen among the more than 300 members of the Synod? At round tables, the small discussion groups focus on welcoming, inter-religious dialogue, and on ecumenism which synod leaders have characterized as "a pledge to walk with women and men of other faith traditions to justice, peace, and integral ecology."

After discussing those topics for a few days, the agenda of the synod will focus on presenting summary reports taken from each discussion group. Remember that the Synod on Synodality represents the members of our church around the world. Slowly consensus emerges.

Listening to each other, letting what is said ferment within our hearts, and seeking better communion is fundamental to the meaning of what it means to be Roman Catholic today.

After the 11:15 Mass on the first Sunday of Advent, we are planning time to listen to a brief report on the results of the Roman world-wide Synod and then try having our own session.


