Our Chrismon Tree

In 1957, Frances Kipps Spencer from Danville, Virginia wanted to decorate the Christmas tree in her church to reflect the Christian faith. She came up with the idea of using symbols and monograms of Christ and made decorations using only the colors of white and gold, symbolic of purity, perfection, majesty and glory. White lights were added to signify Christ our Light, who has come into our world. And so the tradition of the Chrismon tree was begun.

Every year, we at St. John XXIII place our decorated Chrismon tree next to the altar. It stands in full glory symbolizing Christ who is our Light in the darkness. Throughout the years, it has been filled with decorations made by parishioners of all ages. We hope this tree will add to the true meaning of Christmas that you experience in your hearts and homes this season.

What's the connection between angels and royal seats?

And so, with Angels and Archangels, with Thrones and Dominions, and with all the hosts and Powers of heaven, we sing the hymn of your glory, as without end we acclaim: Holy, holy, holy...

Right after praying over the gifts and before we sing the "Holy, holy," leading into the Eucharistic Prayer, you might have heard the prayer above in italics. It's called the *Preface of Advent* and invites our prayer to mingle with the angels'.

Angels have a large role in Advent: appearing to Mary and Elizabeth, Zechariah getting silenced for talking back to an angel, and appearing to Joseph in a dream. Angels are very active leading up to Jesus' birth.

But what do we really know about them?

We know very little despite spending centuries thinking, exploring, and asking questions about angels. We get the word from the Greek *angelos* which was used to translate the Hebrew word *mal'akh* meaning "messenger of Jehovah."

Angels, as we interact with them, serve mainly in that purpose.

St. Thomas Aquinas spent a great deal of time trying to understand angels and, within his metaphysical understanding of the world, discovered that if his system was to be consistent, each individual angel had to be its own species, as different from each other as we are from giraffes and bears, perhaps.

Aquinas envisioned nine main categories of angels arrayed in three groups of three called *choirs*. You have probably heard these names before in different liturgical contexts, and this is where they come from. The top level of angels are made up of *Seraphim*, *Cherubim*, and *Thrones*. The second group consists of *Dominions*, *Virtues*, and *Powers*. Finally, we have *Principalities* and the types we're most familiar with: *Archangels* and *Angels*. Humanity has only interacted with the two lowest orders of angels.


This might have something to do with the first thing most angels say: "Don't be afraid," an odd greeting unless angels are absolutely terrifying! Orders of angels that are closer to God could be so shocking in appearance that we humans wouldn't know how to react.

Siblings All, Sign of the Times

During this past year the Social Concerns Committee read as a group the new book by Cardinal Michael Czerny and Christian Barone entitled *Siblings all, Sign of the Times.*The Social Teaching of Pope Francis. We read a chapter a month and spent the first 20 minutes of each meeting discussing the chapter as a group.

Siblings All refers to Pope Francis' 2021 Encyclical Letter entitled *Fratelli Tutti*, which translates "Siblings All". It begins with a forward by Pope Francis himself reminding us that caring for our Mother Earth and building a society of solidarity are not only not foreign to our faith but rather concrete realizations of it.

Cardinal Czerny and Christian Barone highlight the continuity of Francis affirming the Second Vatican Council. What stood out to us was not only how the speeches and documents merit attention but that we need to focus even more on actions that correspond to the words. Francis' concrete signs and actions illuminate the words he has addressed to us, not only for Catholics but for everyone including non believers.Remember his visit to the migrants landing in Lampedusa? His meeting with the women released from the prostitution racket with the help of the Comunità Papa Giovanni XXIII? His stop in Thailand to be close to the children who are victims of sex tourism?and on and on we "see" his words put into action.

In one chapter we read about the criterion for reading the "signs of the times" which we must practice to join the one pilgrimage toward the God who created us all. They list 5 criteria including the preferential option for the poor and care for creation.

The book offered so much to think and pray about that a 20-minute discussion was never enough as you might imagine.

If, this Christmas, you are gifted with a Barnes and Noble card or another gift card, look for this great book. It will keep you reading all year and give you enough to ponder for a lifetime.



A Good News Update

In February of 2018, Therese Kapinga and her two beautiful children landed at McGhee Tyson Airport from Namibia, Africa as refugees. The Refugee Welcoming Committee at John XXIII was there to welcome them about midnight. So much has changed and happened to them in between. Last Monday, December 11th, Therese went to Nashville with Carey and Jim Chambers to have her citizenship interview. She passed making Shakiena and Emmanuel citizens along with her. In fact she did so well that Jim and Carey who decided to walk while they waited for what was to be about 2 hours were called back in 20 minutes. There is one more step to make it official and in a few weeks they will be invited to the Naturalization Ceremony to receive the Naturalization certificate. But the hard part is over and now it is just procedure. We welcome them as citizens and are honored to have been part of their journey.


