

Baby Bottles are still available in the lobby. Please fill the bottles with your spare change, cash, or check made payable to Catholic Charities.



Rooted in hopefulness, the Paulist Fathers trust that the Holy Spirit is not only present in the world but is actively breathing life into all things.

The Feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica – November 9 Reflection:

The customary temple practice of making pilgrims buy the animals for sacrifice from a stock available in the outer temple developed over many years. Because it was the holy Jewish temple, all business must use Jewish money which was worthless anywhere else. The whole system was governed by the Temple authorities. It made good sense to them. Jesus, an outsider from Galilee, was not qualified as a graduate of Jerusalem's religious schools. He makes a huge scene in the middle of our temple scattering coins and driving the sheep and oxen out into the streets. Shaking with anger, the authorities demanded to know how he felt empowered to do this. This Jesus was violent and caused a big disturbance.

What do you suppose his twelve close followers felt during this chaotic event? They didn't seem to join in this action. They remember his dialogue with the authorities probably because their questions were the same. They understood his answer only after the resurrection. Rather than the destruction of the temple, he was saying that God would raise up his body after the crucifixion. As the temple event happened, all were in the dark.

The feast we celebrate today commemorates the Lateran Basilica in Rome, whose pastor is Pope Leo XIV. It is a Roman parish with a community of believers just like our parish. The second reading declares that this community belongs to God. Paul and the apostles were the master builders and many others continue this work right down to the current pastor. This feast says to us "you are the temple of God and the Spirit of God dwells in you." In you, God's grace flows out into the world making salt water fresh, bearing fruit in so many ways.

But we do not stand pat on a never changing, age-old tradition. The human way we do things can change sometime suddenly. Recently this church of ours has felt some harsh tremors. Changes have come to our worship. Divisions crop up. At our center is the living Jesus. Trust him. Charles Mulligan

"At our Nehemiah Action this spring, we boldly asked Mayor Kincannon for a robust, full micro transit system. We didn't get a "yes" that night — but we did not stop. Together, we kept building, researching, and presenting the strongest case possible. And today, we can say with joy: We have a yes!

The Mayor has committed to:

- · Establishing a team to work directly with Justice Knox leaders and VIA.
- · Creating micro transit services that co-mingle with KAT Lift Paratransit.
- · Using VIA technology to run and market the service.
- · Committing \$170,000 this fiscal year and again for the next two years to support an integrated transit study by VIA.

This is not yet the full system we asked for, but it is a tremendous step forward. It means real progress for neighbors who have been stranded, for families needing to get to the doctor, the grocery store, or downtown. It means that transportation in Knoxville is one step closer to being what we know it truly is: not a luxury, but a lifeline." – M.J. Collins, Justice Knox Leader

COP30 November 10-21,2025 From Catholic Climate Covenant

As world leaders prepare for COP30 in Belém, Brazil, Catholics have a unique role — and a sacred duty — to raise our voices for creation and the most vulnerable among us.

Scheduled to take place in the Amazon Rainforest, this annual United Nations climate summit is more than a political gathering; it is a moment of moral and spiritual conversion, echoing the call of Laudato Si' to hear both "the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor."

Pope Francis — and now Pope Leo XIV — remind us that everything is interconnected. The deforestation of the Amazon is not just an environmental issue — it is a human one. It is about Indigenous rights, food security, water access, and global climate stability. It is about environmental justice. And the scope of issues that will be tackled at COP30 goes far beyond the verdant foliage of the Amazon — the challenges tackled at COP30 will impact the whole world, and especially the poor and the marginalized everywhere.

COP30 invites the global community to act with the urgency and integrity that integral ecology demands. As Catholics, we draw from our Social Teaching — upholding the dignity of every person, the common good, and our preferential option for the poor. These values compel us not to treat climate change as an issue "for someone else," but as a moral crisis that impacts all, especially the "least"




Saint Frances Xavier Cabrini (1850-1917)

Burly longshoremen glared at the woman in widow's dress who interrupted their drinking to beg money, in broken English, for her orphanage. The bar exploded in laughter as one man responded by spitting in her face. "That was for me," the woman smiled. "Do you have anything for the children?" Given today's national debate, could it be as much God's sense of humor as God's will for our sanctification that our first "American" saint should be an immigrant and naturalized citizen? Frances Cabrini, adopting the name "Xavier," confided to Pope Leo XIII her longing to follow her Jesuit patron to Asia. But the Pope replied, "Not East—West!" So she and her Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart exchanged exotic dreams of China for the impoverished reality of Italian ghettos across the United States and Central and South America. Before her death, Frances had founded seventy educational, health care, child, and family service institutions. Today, from Siberia to Ethiopia, in sixteen countries, Mother Cabrini's sisters and lay associates embody her practical spirituality: "Let's get to work! We'll have eternity to rest!"

Clean Up Time

Today's Gospel describes the cleansing of the temple. Jesus drives away the animals, overturns the money tables, and chases away those who have made God's house into a marketplace. He had zeal for God's house. It was supposed to be a place of prayer but had become a chaotic, corrupt, worldly space. Jesus was not gentle, but rather quite aggressive, as he cleared out the unholy refuse. In the second reading, Paul reminds us that our bodies are the temple of God. Does Jesus need to cleanse that temple? If I believe that my body is the temple of the Holy Spirit, what does that look like? It is easier to describe the opposite - what it would be like if I didn't consider my body a temple. I would eat food that was unhealthy, indulge in activities that violate God's law and harm my mind and body, and believe that my body and maybe my life were nothing special. I might be easily persuaded to follow the ways of the world. I might doubt that what I do with my body matters to God.

I have been there. I didn't always consider my body a temple of the Holy Spirit. I used to focus on money, use rationalizations to excuse my failures and sins, and indulge in excessive food and alcohol. Surely Jesus wanted to clean out all the refuse that I had invited in. The temple of my body was like the temple Jesus cleansed in Jerusalem.

On the other hand, if I believed that my body was a temple of the Holy Spirit, I would believe that I mattered more. I would recognize that my body and soul were fearfully and wonderfully made. As I welcomed God into my home, I might hold my head a little higher. If God thinks I am so special, maybe I should think so, too. I would believe that I was blessed.

We teach children that church is a special place. It is God's temple. When I go to church, I wear different clothes. I am a little quieter. Hopefully, my conversations are charitable and my thoughts are more focused on God. I treat the church building differently than other places. God is calling me to treat my body in a special way because it is a temple for Him.

This is a profound but simple truth, one that I haven't fully embraced. My body is the temple of the Holy Spirit. I pray for the zeal of Jesus to cleanse my temple. I pray that I can be more forceful in casting out the unholy and self-serving characters I have invited in.

The Jews asked Jesus, "What sign can you show us for doing this?" They wanted to know what authority He had to kick out those who had permission to be in the temple from the powers that be. Who has authority over my body? It is me. I must choose to use that authority to cleanse the unholy and to treat my body as the beautiful temple of the Holy Spirit, believing that one day I will be raised to eternal life with Jesus.


