

## THE ACACIA TREE

The Acacia Tree, native of Africa, is mentioned in the Bible in the Book of Exodus and the Book of Isaiah. The wood of the tree was used to build the Ark of the Covenant. It is mentioned in Isaiah as a sign of the Messianic restoration in Israel.

The Acacia Tree has deep roots and survives through drought, dryness and famine. It is a strong tree which provides shelter for wild animals from the scorching heat of the sun. It also provides food and nourishment.

Since biblical times, the Acacia Tree has been a symbol of stability and resilience. The tree is still found in many areas of African and has become a symbol for that land and our Office of Black Catholics.




## **MISSION STATEMENT**
