



Excerpts from the Lectionary for Mass ©2001, 1998, 1970 CCD.

Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time – Year B

Today's Gospel, Mark 10:46-52, tells us the story about Bartimaeus, a blind man, trying to get Jesus' attention to ask Him to heal him.

Sitting by the roadside begging, Bartimaeus received pity of travelers going by, however, not many were touched or affected by his presence. Being blind and relied on the mercy of others, Bartimaeus was absorbed into the crowd and had no acquaintances. While being forgotten by everyone, he did not lose hope. On that special day, on His way to Jerusalem Jesus took the same road where Bartimaeus sat. The blind man seized the opportunity and cried out aloud: "Jesus, son of David, have pity on me." (Mk 10:48)

Instead of assisting him, the crowd rebuked him, telling him to be quiet.

Why did they ask him to be quiet?

They asked him to be quiet because he was disturbing their peace and interrupting Jesus' discourse.

When the crowd tried to silence the blind man, Bartimaeus was unafraid and kept crying out louder. His persistence was rewarded. Hearing his cry Jesus stopped and asked him: "What do you want me to do for you?" (Mk 10:51)

The blind man wanted nothing else but gaining eyesight. "Master, I want to see." (Mk 10:51)

Jesus told him, "Go your way; your faith has saved you." Immediately he received his sight and followed him on the way. (Mk 10:52)

To meditate on today's Gospel further, let us ask ourselves:

We all have sight but do we truly see and understand?

If Our Lord Jesus comes to each one of us and asks us this question: "What do you want me to do for you?" What is your answer?

Training Disciples to Make Disciples

A 5 week training for leaders of small-group faith communities

Monday nights on Zoom $1/7-8:30~\mathrm{pm}$ 1/3 Oct. 25th - Nov. 22nd.

"Anyone who has truly experienced God's saving love does not need much time or lengthy training to go out and proclaim that love. Every Christian is a missionary to the extent that he or she has encountered the love of God in Christ Jesus: we no longer say that we are 'disciples' and 'missionaries', but rather that we are always 'missionary disciples.""

Why this Training?

As we continue the work of Renew My Church across the Archdiocese, we've identified a pressing need for missionary disciples who are equipped to accompany others along the path of discipleship. The next phase of the BNR rollout seeks to establish a network of small communities within the parish where individuals can gather together to grow in faith and deepen their experience of Christ and the Church. The intentional, systematic formation of missionary disciples is vital to the BNR process and the long-term sustainability of parish renewal.

What is the Goal?

This course will help parish lay leaders acquire the knowledge, skills, and attitudes to accompany others into a life of discipleship, specifically through small-group faith communities. To "equip the holy ones for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ" (Eph 4:12)

Who is it for?

This 5-week training is for individuals who are feeling called to step up and lead others into relationship with Jesus. It is both for those who are newer to discipleship, as well as for existing parish ministry leaders who desire to imbue their ministries with the spirit of renewal and missionary discipleship.

What are the topics?

- Recognizing your call.
- Understanding your story
- Sharing your story
- Attitudes for accompaniment
- Tools for facilitating group discussion

Sunday Spiritual Nourishment "Why We Do What We Do?"

Part 3

I—Actions speak louder than words!

"We are creatures of body as well as spirit, so our prayer is not confined to our minds and hearts. It is expressed by our bodies as well. When our bodies are engaged in our prayer, we pray with our whole person. Using our entire being in prayer helps us to pray with greater attentiveness." – Praying With Body, Mind and Voice – United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB)

II—Gestures:

Sign of the Cross—the holiest of all signs.

Genuflecting, a "half-kneel," is the gesture of homage, worship, honor, reverence, respect, willing obedience, prayer, and petition supplication, that we make to the presence of Christ in the Blessed Sacrament. A genuflection is made by bending the right knee to touch the ground. When we genuflect, we face towards the tabernacle or the altar. We always genuflect when coming into the church before going into our seat and when we leave the church.

Bowing is a gesture of reverence. We recognize the altar as a symbol of Christ, and so we stop and bow to it whenever we pass in front of it. This gesture signifies our profound respect and gratitude to Christ. There are three kind of bows:

- 1. Simple bow of the head that we use at the name of Jesus, at the name of Mary, and the name of the Father
- 2. Medium bow of the head and shoulders—used by monks in monasteries to greet another monk to honor the presence of Christ in their brothers.
- 3. Profound bow—bending the entire body at the waist, touching the knees with the palms of the hand.

Striking (beating) the breast—a sign of repentance, of humility, as in the parable of the Pharisee and the tax collector in the Gospel of Luke (Luke 18:9-14). This expresses our sorrow, our unworthiness, and our extreme humility. The gesture of striking the breast, made carefully and with full awareness, can communicate to ourselves and to others more than mere words can say, that we recognize our sinfulness, and publicly declare our sorrow for our sins.

As St. Benedict said, "We know that our prayers will not be heard on account of many words, but because of purity of heart, compunction, and tears."

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ.

Today we are reminded in two ways to be persistent missionary disciples of Jesus Christ. In his message for World Mission Sunday, the Holy Father encourages us, "As Christians, we cannot keep the Lord to ourselves: the Church's evangelizing mission finds outward fulfilment in the transformation of our world and in the care of creation." At the same time, with the opening of the Synodal Process around the world, Pope Francis invites the entire Church to reflect on a theme that is decisive for its life and mission: "It is precisely this path of synodality which God expects of the Church of the third millennium" (Address for the ceremony commemorating the 50th anniversary of the institution of the Synod of Bishops, 17 October 2015).

We celebrate World Mission Sunday with the Universal Church on October 24, offering prayer and reflection on our mission to proclaim the gospel to all the nations. The collection taken this day supports over 1,000 mission dioceses through the Society for the Propagation of the Faith. These local churches are the poorest in the world and yet they joyfully share the Lord and provide hope amidst struggles in Africa, Asia and remote areas of Latin America and the Pacific Islands. The collection also provides for mission dioceses in the Middle East, Northeast Africa. India and Eastern Europe through the Catholic Near East Welfare Association.

Also, during this time, The Church of God is convoked in Synod. Today, the Archdiocese of Chicago is celebrating the opening of the process for the XVI Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops, in October 2023. The theme of this synod is "For a Synodal Church: Communion, Participation, and Mission" and so is intimately tied to our celebration of World Mission.

This global pandemic has highlighted the peripheries of our world and the importance of widening our circles to reach out to neighbors both nearby and far away. Let this celebration of World Mission Sunday and the opening of the Synodal Process be an opportunity for pause and prayerful solidarity with our sisters and brothers in faith around the world. May we give thanks for their witness and recommit ourselves to our own call to be missionary disciples. With every wish, I remain.
