Our Catholic teaching is that we proclaim our belief in Jesus and it will affect our lives, we will live differently, we will help those that are imprisoned be free, (Do not let the word prison limit your understanding) People are and can be imprisoned by thoughts, fears, and actions of othersí we can free them just by listening or spending time with them.

We also are called to feed the hungry. (Do let the word hunger denote only food) Some people hunger for companionship, understanding, knowledge. It is up to us to feed others, one of my favorite expressions is: do not count the sheepí feed themí

We are called to cloth the naked. This could also be a call to stop abortions, neglect of children, the rampant use of pornography, lustful abuse of the other person; can you believe there is human trafficking in Minnesota?

We are called to be a people who cry out against injusticeí Too often we underestimate the power of a touch, a smile, a kind word, a listening ear, an honest compliment, or the smallest act of caring, all of which have the potential to turn a life around. People come into our lives for a reason, a season, or a lifetime! Embrace all equally.



Year of Mercy Hymn

During this season of Lent, we will have a very cool opportunity to learn a new song that was commissioned solely for the Year of Mercy. When Pope Francis declared a Year of Mercy, he desired the entire world celebrate, not just Rome. For this purpose the Vatican commissioned a piece of music to be sung in every diocese and parish. Paul Inwood, an American composer (Center of My Life), was chosen to write the hymn. Pope Francis gave the text to be used; "Misericordes Sicut Pater" (Be merciful like the Father). The refrain is in Latin so as to have a common language connecting all the Catholics throughout the world singing in one voice, and the verses are in the local language of the parish. Inwood intended the song to sound like the contemplative meditations of Taize (Jesus, Remember Me). We will begin this new song in Lent, incorporating only the refrain while we transfer the Eucharist from the altar to the tabernacle after communion. May you have a Blessed Year of Mercy!

ST. JEROME EMILIANI

DATES: 1481 – 2/6/1537

FEAST DAY: FEBRUARY 8TH

PATRON OF THE ORPHANED AND THE ABANDONED

"Jerome Emiliani lay chained in the dark dirty dungeon. Only a short time before he had been a military commander for Venice in charge of a fortress. He didn't care much about God because he didn't need him -- he had his own strength and the strength of his soldiers and weapons. When Venice's enemies, the League of Cambrai, captured the fortress, he was dragged off and imprisoned. There in the dungeon, Jerome decided to get rid of the chains that bound him. He let go of his worldly attachments and embraced God.

When he finally was able to escape, he hung his metal chains in the nearby church of Treviso -- in gratitude not only for being freed from physical prison but from his spiritual dungeon as well.

After a short time as mayor of Treviso he returned to his home in Venice where he studied for the priesthood. The war may have been over but it was followed by the famine and plague war's devastation often brought. Thousands suffered in his beloved city. Jerome devoted himself to service again -- this time, not to the military but the poor and suffering around him. He felt a special call to help the orphans who had no one to care for them. All the loved ones who would have protected them and comforted them had been taken by sickness or starvation. He would become their parent, their family.

Using his own money, he rented a house for the orphans, fed them, clothed them, and educated them. Part of his education was to give them the first known catechetical teaching by question and answer. But his constant devotion to the suffering put him in danger too and he fell ill from the plague himself. When he recovered, he had the ideal excuse to back away, but instead his illness seemed to take the last links of the chain from his soul. Once again he interpreted his suffering to be a sign of how little the ambitions of the world mattered.

He committed his whole life and all he owned to helping others. He founded orphanages in other cities, a hospital, and a shelter for prostitutes. This grew into a congregation of priests and brothers that was named after the place where they had a house: the Clerks Regular of Somascha. Although they spent time educating other young people, their primary work was always Jerome's first love -- helping orphans.

His final chains fell away when he again fell ill while taking care of the sick. He died in 1537 at the age of 56."

THE SOCIETY OF ST. VINCENT DE PAUL ST. PHILIP'S CONFERENCE

The Vincentian Family is a worldwide, living reality. Countless persons live and breathe the spirit, tradition, and spirituality of "the Apostle of Charity and Father of the Poor, Saint Vincent de Paul. The Society of St. Vincent de Paul is one branch of this colossal Vincentian Family Tree. At the parish level, conferences are formed and we have formed the St. Philip's Conference in order to serve those in need in our parish and community.



St. Vincent founded three organizations, the first in 1617: the Confraternities of Charity, known in the United States as the Ladies of Charity. Under its current title as the International Association of Charities, it continues its mission of serving the poor. In 1625 St. Vincent founded the Congregation of the Mission, usually referred to as the CMs or Vincentian priests, a community of priests and brothers whose special purpose was to evangelize the poor in rural areas and help in the formation and education of priests. St. Louise de Marillac and St. Vincent de Paul co-founded the third organization, the Daughters of Charity in 1633. Its primary purpose was to honor Christ by serving him corporally and spiritually in the persons of the poor, the sick, the imprisoned, the young, and others in need.

Frederic Ozanam was born in Milan, Italy in 1813 and at the age of three his family moved to Lyon, France. At the age of 7 he nearly died of typhus. His parents had already faced the death of 8 of their children. At the age of 18, Frederic went to Paris to attend the Sorbonne, the University of Paris, to pursue a law degree. The post-revolutionary Paris was not merely anti-Catholic, it was openly hostile against anything Catholic or Christian. He joined a student organization and during a heated verbal exchange a student challenged Ozanam and his friends: "We agree that at one time your Church was a great Church and was a great source of good. But what is your Church doing now? What is she doing for the poor? Show us your works and we will believe you." Ozanam accepted the challenge and on April 23, 1833, Frederic Ozanam and six students gathered and Ozanam's words moved all present: "We must do what is agreeable to God. Therefore, we must do what our Lord Jesus Christ did when preaching the gospel. Let us go to the poor!" And so, the Society of St. Vincent de Paul was born.

Our Conference will be doing just that, going to the poor and we invite you to join us as we meet twice a month, the first and third Thursday from 6:30 to 8:00 pm. We are meeting at this time to grow spiritually as Vincentians, to have the right heart to serve, and to study the Vincentian way. In March we will receive training to begin doing home visits. Join us on our journey as we prepare our hearts to follow in St. Vincent de Paul's and Blessed Frederic Ozanam's footsteps and go to the poor!




