My Two Cents by Fr. Don Braukmann

October 9, 2016

Our next prayer gathering at the local Planned Parenthood office will be next Saturday, October 15th from 10-11am. Join your neighbors in standing up and speaking through our presence and silence in defense of the most basic human right there isí the right to life!

Christmas, yes Christmas, is around the corner and I want to offer a different approach to Christmas gift giving this year. Consider giving less PRESENTS and more PRESENCE this holiday season! Going to a movie or watching one as a family at home, playing board games or offering gift cards of service (from taking out the garbage for a month to doing the dishes without being asked!) to family and loved ones. Cut down the stress of the season by putting Christ back into it. Take the time to actually read the entire message of the Christmas cards received and schedule shopping and other events well ahead of time. As a priest, it is hard to watch as families gather over the holidays so totally stressed out from all the preparation, they begin to long for the whole thing to be over! The mad dash people put themselves (and their children) through to get from one place to another leaves people exhausted and, to be blunt, grumpy! I especially feel for young families who try to keep parents and in-laws happy by squeezing in an appearance (but no real visiting) at all the places they are expected to appear. I am grateful my parents pulled the plug on that chaos long long agoi .actually 50 years ago when my first sibling got married! To this day celebrate Christmas as a family another weekend during the õSeason of Christmasö so my siblings could be with their in-laws or begin Christmas traditions of their own in their own homes. There are 66 of us when we gather and so we long ago ended gift giving and started owhite Elephantö giftingí getting rid of items we really dongt want. Makes for a lot of fun, saves a ton of money, and the stress disappears. We have time to just be together without all the expectations crammed into our schedule. So, I pray each of us does a little soul searching and considers what Christmas will look like this year for our families. May we not say on December 26th, õløm glad itøs over!ö when what we are celebrating is our salvation; GOD COMING TO EARTH!

I tried to watch the vice-presidential debate this past week and lasted 27 minutes. I am a political junkie but the political discourse in this country has been reduced to name calling and mudslinging. I may have to write in my sister and on the ballot this time around! However, we cannot walk away from our responsibility to know the issues and where the candidates stand on them. Lives are depending on usí literally. Those of us who live in the 7th Congressional District have the luxury this year of looking more deeply into where candidates for the office stand on all kinds of issues. 



Marriage Banns (c 1067) refers to the public announcement of a proposed marriage. The purpose of the Marriage Banns is to offer the faithful the opportunity to exercise their obligation to reveal to the pastor any impediments to a proposed marriage (c. 1069). The following are impediments to Marriage:

- Holy Orders. Has the groom ever been ordained a deacon or a priest in the Catholic Church?
- Public **perpetual vow** of chastity in a religious institute. Has either the bride or the groom been a member of a religious community?
- Crime. (killing someone's spouse with the view of marrying the surviving spouse)
- **Age.** Will either the pride or the groom be under the age of 14 or 16 respectively, at the time of the wedding? (Civil law states a person needs the consent of the parents if under the age of 18.)
- Antecedent and perpetual impotence. Is the bride or groom incapable of sexual intercourse because of injury or some other medical or psychological condition?
- **Marriage.** Has either the bride or the groom been married previously? Has the previous marriage received a declaration of nullity?
- **Abduction.** Refers to the kidnapping of a person who later becomes engaged to the kidnapper.
- Consanguinity: Blood relationship between persons who descend from a common ancestor in all degrees of the direct line (Father-daughter or Mother-son), and to up to the fourth degree of the collateral line (first cousins). Are the bride and groom related to one another by blood?
- **Affinity** (relationships because of marriage) any degree in the direct line. Are the bride and groom related through marriage?
- **Adoption.** Are the bride and groom related through adoption?
- **Public Propriety.** The impediment arises from an invalid marriage after the establishment of common life or from notorious or public concubinage (cohabitation between a man and a woman without marriage.). It nullifies marriage in the first degree of the direct line between the man and the blood relatives of the woman, and vice versa (c. 1093).
- One Man and One Woman. Sex change or reassignment. Has either the bride or groom lived as the opposite sex or had surgery to physically alter their gender? (c. 1056)

Faithful Citizenship means prayerful, active, and responsible participation in the political process. That includes knowledgeably exercising the right to vote with a well-formed conscience.

Voting is a privilege and an important duty. It is an opportunity for God's faithful to love our neighbors by electing legislators who will hopefully enact policies that protect the weak, strengthen the family, promote the conditions for all to flourish, and ensure that citizens can practice their faith without fear of reprisal.

The responsibility of voting is especially important to Minnesotans this year; our entire state legislature is up for election. At a time when many Catholics feel politically homeless and not represented well by either party, this year's elections provide a special opportunity to work for life and dignity where it matters most—in our own backyard. Minnesota Catholics should not let frustrations with the presidential race prevent them from participating in our many important local elections.

The choices we are to make on Election Day are not always obvious. We must rise above partisanship, self-interest, and emotions to elect candidates who are most likely to work for the common good and govern in a manner consistent with God's providential care for all of creation. We should prepare ourselves by forming our consciences, studying the candidates' positions and character, and turning to God for guidance in prayer.

As you get ready to cast your vote, we encourage you to visit the Minnesota Catholic Conference's election resources center, at MNCatholic.org/election. Here, you'll find a novena to help you prayerfully prepare for election day, resources to help you find out where the candidates stand on the issues, and materials for forming your conscience.

DISCERNING YOUR VOTE

A Resource for Faithful Voting in 2016

The right to vote carries with it a responsibility to form one's conscience and to study and know the issues and candidates. As faithful citizens, we evaluate the character of the candidate, and how he or she will address issues that protect or threaten the dignity of every human life.

There are moral and ethical dimensions to every public policy. But different issues carry different moral weight and urgency. Some involve intrinsically evil acts that can never be approved, such as the intentional destruction of innocent human life. Others involve an obligation to promote human flourishing. The following questions are offered to assist in discerning where the candidates stand on important issues in light of our foundational beliefs.

How will each candidate:

- Ensure full respect for the right of persons and associations to fully participate in society in accord with their basic moral and religious convictions?
- Address the preeminent requirement to protect the weakest in our midst—innocent unborn children—by restricting and bringing to an end the destruction of human life through abortion?
- Reject violent social policies—such as assisted suicide, the destruction of human embryos, and the death penalty—and instead promote alternatives rooted in a consistent ethic of life?
- Help families and children overcome poverty by creating more choice in education; by promoting
 access to economic opportunity and work at just wages; and by ensuring an adequate safety net for
 the vulnerable?
- Achieve comprehensive immigration reform that offers a path to citizenship, treats immigrant workers
 fairly, prevents the separation of families, maintains the integrity of our borders, and addresses the
 factors that compel people to leave their own countries?
- Ensure access to health care while respecting human life, human dignity, and religious freedom in our health care system?
- Promote the natural family, based on the life-long, complementary, and fruitful union of one man and one woman, as the foundational unit of society, and reject policies rooted in a false gender ideology?
- Ensure governmental compliance with moral limits on the use of military force—examining for what purposes it may be used, under what authority, and at what human cost?
- Exercise stewardship over our natural resources in a way that respects God's creation, protects the world's poor and vulnerable, and ensures a sustainable future for our children?
- Protect the basic political and civil liberties of citizens in a manner consistent with public safety and the common good?
