

CHRIST TAKES AWAY OUR FEARS AND DOUBTS AND FREES US

Of all the human emotions, fear is one of the most common. From time to time, we're all gripped by fear. This fear can be very real and even Make us freeze-up and not act as we should. When Jesus appeared in the midst of the disciples as they listened to the disciples who had encountered Jesus on the road to Emmaus, they were gripped by

The risen Christ came into their midst and offered the disciples peace and reassurance. To hear about Jesus appearing after His resurrection is one thing. Actually seeing Him with one's own eyes is way different. The evangelist John doesn't hold back when he describes their fear – they could barely believe it. They saw Jesus, but at first thought it must be a ghost or a hallucination.

Yet, fear won't have the last word. Jesus won't permit it. He reassures the disciples of His real presence by inviting them to examine His hands, and to touch his body, proving He has real flesh and bones that no ghost could have. Then, He ask for food and eats – something no ghost could ever do. But more than just dispelling the disciples' fear, Jesus' presence serves more purpose: it proves His resurrection; it helps the disciples understand the fulfilled Scriptures; and it helps to prepare the disciples for their upcoming mission into the world.

Jesus refers to the disciples as "witnesses" (martyrs in Greek). They are to be disciples who will give everything they have to proclaim the Risen Christ. Peter becomes a great example of this kind of change. We see in this weekend's first reading, a way different Peter from the one who denied Jesus three times. Filled with the truth of the Resurrection and the power of the Holy Spirit, Peter is the very opposite of the former fearful man. With courage he now stands before those who condemned Jesus and proclaims him as the fulfillment of the promises of the prophets and calls them all to repentance. In the Gospel, St. John gives us a similarly powerful message that reminds the community of Jesus' immense forgiveness.

So, what about us? It's easy in our human weakness to let fear and doubt take hold of us. Still, fear and doubt must never have the last word: Christ always finds a way to reassure us of the truth and reality of the Resurrection, and its offer of eternal life. We're believers, and as such, we discover reassurance in the sacramental and liturgical life of the Church, where we hear the Scriptures proclaimed and feel the Holy Spirit at work. Here we encounter Christ. Here our Lord Jesus Christ takes away our fears and doubts, and frees us to go out and share the Good News with others. Jesus has conquered sin and death.

The reign of fear is over. Alleluia. Let us go out and share the Good News without fear. Alleluia.



St. Philip's can be judged amazing. During the uncertain and unsettling times of a pandemic that strained all aspects of our society, the families, individuals and children of St. Philip's stepped forward and donated \$11,239.30 to the annual FoodShare Drive to feed the hungry.



To put the generosity of our parishioners in perspective, the local Food Shelf established a 2021 fundraising goal of \$100,000 for the entire community. This parish achieved over 11 percent of that goal during the two weekends leading to Easter.

The Knights of Columbus initiated the effort with a \$1,000 contribution and the drive closed with \$600.30 collected from St. Philip's School students, staff, faculty and parents. Thanks to them and the many members of the St. Philip's congregation who responded so generously to ease hunger across our region.

CROOKSTON, MINNESOTA, April 13, 2021 – It has been announced today that, after an extensive investigation, the Holy Father, Pope Francis, asked for, and has now accepted the resignation of Bishop Michael Hoeppner from the pastoral governance of the Diocese of Crookston. The investigation which led to the acceptance of Bishop Hoeppner's resignation arose from reports that he had at times failed to observe applicable norms when presented with allegations of sexual abuse involving clergy of the Diocese of Crookston. The investigation was conducted pursuant to the *motu proprio, Vos estis lux mundi*, which had been promulgated by the Holy Father in mid-2019. The investigation was conducted under the supervision of Archbishop Bernard Hebda, the Metropolitan Archbishop of the Province of St. Paul and Minneapolis, which includes the Diocese of Crookston.

At the same time that the Holy Father accepted the resignation of Bishop Hoeppner, he has also appointed the Most Rev. Richard E. Pates, Bishop Emeritus of Des Moines, to serve as Apostolic Administrator of the Diocese of Crookston until a new bishop is designated. Bishop Pates' appointment as Apostolic Administrator takes effect immediately.



Bookkeeping/Accounting Position Opening

Dear Christ's Faithful of the Diocese of Crookston,

Pope Francis has asked for and accepted my resignation as Bishop of Crookston. My resignation comes as a result of the investigation into reports that I, " ... at times, failed to observe applicable norms when presented with allegations of sexual abuse involving clergy of the Diocese of Crookston." The Church describes the ministry of a diocesan bishop as teaching, sanctifying and governing. It has been a joy and a blessing for me to have served as your bishop for the past 13+ years. I apologize to you, as I have apologized to our Holy Father, for my failures in governing as bishop.

At the same time, I hold dear the many good things and blessings that God has showered upon us these past years. I have enjoyed sharing with you the teaching of the Church in articles, presentations, and homilies. In our world of today where so many are confused about so many things, it is important that the truth of the Gospel and the Church's Tradition be clearly presented for all to hear. I have enjoyed celebrating the Sacraments in the many wonderful parishes throughout our diocese. I have especially enjoyed the Confirmations-hundreds each year- and the Ordinations and the Chrism Masses. Governing involves providing vision and direction and the Second Synod of Crookston and its resulting pastoral letter Meeting Christ - Living Christ provided a solid vision and direction in my first years here. More recently, the vision has come as a result of Pope Francis' encyclical The Joy of the Gospel and the joint convocation we held with the Diocese of Fargo. We have been and continue to be actively engaged in the work of forming missionary disciples, faith-filled disciples who are fully alive in the mission Jesus has given us, the task of evangelization and re-evangelization.

I want to thank all the wonderful people with whom I have had the privilege to work these years: my brother priests, our deacons, the religious and lay faithful. I especially thank the members of the diocesan curia and diocesan staff. It has been a delight to come to work each day and engage with such wonderful, dedicated people in the work of the Church. I thank Bishop Balke for his continuing friendship and support. Too, I thank Bishop Richard Pates for his willingness to become Apostolic Administrator and watch over you until a new ordinary is appointed. And I thank you, all the faithful of the Diocese of Crookston. I have always told others: "the faith-life is strong here." It is seen so beautifully lived out in family life, in involvement in parish life, in your desire to grow in the knowledge of the faith, and in your love for one another and those in need. It is seen, too, in the financial support you give to the Church here and abroad. Thanks to your continued support, the Diocese of Crookston is today financially healthy.

What will I do next? Well, for the past few years, my sister Mary has been looking to move out of Minnesota to a place where "it isn't so cold and snowy!" I always told her that when I retired I would join her in that warmer place. And so, that is the plan for my immediate future. I will join her and move out of state to a warmer climate. I look forward to returning to Crookston for personal visits and will await the appointment of a new bishop here to determine other activity.

When we bishops of Minnesota have been involved in meetings with others and we have been asked to state who we are and where we serve, I have often said: "I am Bishop Hoeppner from Crookston, the premiere diocese of Minnesota." You who are the local Church of Crookston, will always be the premiere diocese for me. You have heard me say, and it is true, "I am a blessed bishop." And, it is as true today as the day I said it at my ordaination as your bishop, "you have a bishop who loves you." Be assured, I will continue to keep you all in my prayers each day. May God continue to be with you and bless you always.


