Recently, in my reading I came across this: Christianity's unique trump card is always and forever: The Incarnation. Stepping back from whatever contemporary negative connotations that may lessen the impact of the word "trump", it is still a perfectly good and forceful way to make this all-important point.

The coming of the Word of God among us, taking on flesh in all its vulnerability and depth was something that no god had ever done before.

"In the beginning was the word..." begins John's gospel, "And the word was with God and the Word was God."

He who was God before time took on the limitations of time in the person of his son, Jesus. By so doing, he elevated the human experience, that of all creation that is not God. By his death and resurrection, Jesus became The Christ, The Anointed One. In him, all of creation, not just human experience is drawn to share in the life of God.

While an intellectual belief that Jesus rose from the dead is a baseline belief for us, it is in the realization that the experience of the suffering Jesus and the "Risen Christ" is a parable, a story, the model of the journey of all of us and of all creation that our faith is fully realized.

From Senior Deacon Mike:


The first reading for the liturgy on the 30th Sunday in Ordinary time is an excerpt from the Book of Sirach. These writings constitute the teaching of Ben Sirach who offered principles for life. This excerpt complements the excerpt from the Gospel of Luke.

"...the LORD is a God of justice, who knows no favorites. Though not unduly partial toward the weak, yet he hears the cry of the oppressed. The Lord is not deaf to the wail of the orphan, nor to the widow when she pours out her complaint. The one who serves God willingly is heard; his petition reaches the heavens. The prayer of the lowly pierces the clouds; it does not rest till it reaches its goal, nor will it withdraw till the Most High responds, judges justly and affirms the right, and the Lord will not delay..."

Fair Trade and Sustainable Halloween Treat Guide

Support workers and care for our common home this Halloween.

Halloween, Fair Trade, Sustainability, and Catholic Social Teaching (CST)

Halloween is celebrated with jack-o-lanterns, costumes, and candy in many countries around the world. During this time when so many are purchasing trick or treat goodies, it is important to think about how these products were made, packaged, and transported, from the fields to our homes. Here are a few connections between CST, fair trade, sustainability, and being a mindful consumer:

The Life and Dignity of the Human Person

As Christians, we are called to participate in society and act in ways that promote the innate dignity of every human being. One way you can support this theme of CST is by purchasing fair trade products that ensure producers receive a wage that upholds their dignity.

The Common Good

Fair trade products uphold the common good by creating an economy that focuses on improving social conditions so that all people can flourish. Making sure that treats are grown and packaged in a sustainable way cares for the common good of future generations as well.

The Dignity and Rights of Workers

Buying fair trade products shows concern for the most vulnerable members in our global community by supporting their work on local farms and ensuring that each worker is paid fair and just wages.

Care for God's Creation

Not only are fair trade products made in ecologically sustainable ways, but the process of farming ensures that the environment is protected for those in society who rely on it for their livelihoods.

How to Support Fair Trade and Sustainable Treats this Halloween

Consider the following as you choose treats to share this Halloween: Fair Trade Chocolate and Sugar

Choose companies that source fair trade products that help to ensure that farmers are justly compensated for their labor.

Equal Exchange is a co-op that sources its cacao from farmers in Latin America. Purchasing chocolate helps to promote a more equitable supply chain. bit.ly/2MyTM9J

Divine Chocolate is a co-op started by farmers in Ghana that aims to empower farmers, especially women, to earn a livelihood through fair farming. bit.ly/35Y1fqT

Wholesome is a company that produces many different kinds of candy using Fair Trade certified cane sugar. bit.ly/2P6dqvB

Packaging

Millions of individually plastic-wrapped candies will be taken home by trick-or-treaters, but there are eco-friendly alternatives. Stick to candy that comes in cardboard boxes or look for ones in compostable wrappers. Alter Eco is a company that sells organic, palm oil free candy and chocolate that comes in wrappers that are safe for backyard compost and should break down in 6 weeks. bit.ly/35RkUsh

Palm Oil

The palm oil industry is a major contributor to deforestation in Southeast Asia. In addition to many workers rights violations in the industry, certain endangered species are threatened by unsustainable palm oil practices. Unfortunately, palm oil is in many of foods, especially candy.
