# 17th Sunday in Ordinary Time July 27, 2025

Centuries before Jesus taught his disciples the importance of persistence in asking God to fulfill their needs, Abraham dared to persistently ask God how few innocent people needed to live in Sodom for its destruction to be prevented. In this lengthy exchange, Abraham discovers one power of prayer: not that Abraham could change God's mind as to what would eventually happen, but that Abraham might eventually know how wide God's mercy is. It turns out that God did not require as many as fifty innocents to spare the city, but as few as ten. By extending his conversation with God, by persisting in positioning a smaller and smaller number of innocents, Abraham is able to determine the wide extent of God's mercy.

The final verse of the first reading reveals the immense power of ten right-eous people. Ten innocent people would have been all that was necessary to spare the large city of Sodom. We know that Sodom was destroyed; presumably, ten innocents were not found. But imagine that there were. What an effect they would have had! God is willing to destroy the whole city based on the sinfulness of the many (which is said to be a lack of charity to the poor and needy, not any sexual practice), an example of punishment for communal sin. Two millennia later, Jesus sacrifices his life to save the many, an example of communal salvation. We each may sin individually, but as part of humanity we also sin communally. Only Jesus can save us all.

Bread makes two appearances in today's Gospel: as part of the prayer Jesus teaches his disciples and as the request the midnight caller makes of his friend. Last week we heard Abraham offer bread as a sign of hospitality to the strangers traveling past his home. Today Jesus makes use of this cultural tradition when he gives an example of a person whose cupboard is empty when a friend unexpectedly shows up at his house. His friend is in a dilemma. He must offer hospitality, but he has nothing to give. If Jesus goes so far to say that awakening a friend and disturbing their family is the right thing to do in this case, how free we must be to prevail on God in our need, no matter the circumstances!

### **Question of the Week:**

Over the coming week, take time each day to persistently ask God for a need of yours or a friends. At the end of the week, answer this question: What have I learned by persisting in prayer daily for this need?


### How to foster children's faith in summer:



# Mass & Eucharistic Procession

August 16, 2025 9:00 AM

Location: St Patrick's Catholic Church, 116 E Division St, Audubon, IA 50025



Join Bishop William Joensen and the parishioners of St. Patrick's Catholic Church in Audubon for Mass and a Eucharistic procession on Saturday, August 16th. The morning will begin with Mass at 9 AM at St. Patrick's Catholic Church. Following Mass there will be a one-mile Eucharistic procession starting at the church and ending at Albert the Bull.

There will be **no** transportation provided after the event. A shuttle service will be offered before Mass for those who wish to park at Albert the Bull. This shuttle will run from 8:20-8:50 AM.

### What is a Eucharistic Procession?

A Eucharistic procession is like a holy parade that brings Jesus, truly present in the Holy Eucharist, into the world that he loves. The Blessed Sacrament is placed in a monstrance and carried out of the church by a priest. A Eucharistic procession sometimes begins at one church and ends at another and is connected to the celebration of the Mass or a time of Adoration. The procession can be a short walk around the neighborhood of a church or can stretch for miles and miles from start to finish. Along the way, Jesus is accompanied by priests, deacons, altar servers, and people of all ages. Together they can pray the Rosary, sing hymns, or walk in silent prayer. Processions are often planned for the Solemnity of Corpus Christi but can take place just about any time of the year. The altar servers or other members of the Eucharistic procession might carry a canopy, processional cross, candles, a thurible, or bells. One type of processional canopy, a baldacchino, is held over the monstrance by four servers holding a pole for each corner. This creates a sacred space that is set aside for the Eucharist during the movement of the procession. The processional cross is a large crucifix attached to a long handle that can be lifted high for all to see. The candles remind us of Jesus, the Light of the World, truly present in the Holy Eucharist. The thurible is filled with burning incense, which releases sweet-smelling smoke that rises to the sky, symbolizing our prayers rising to heaven. The bells incorporate another of our five senses, announcing that Jesus is here with us. A Eucharistic procession is a wonderful opportunity to worship our Lord and pray together as a community as we witness our faith publicly to the world.
