

LITURGY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING

Acts of the Apostles 2:14a, 36-41

God has made Jesus both Lord and Christ.

Then Peter stood up with the Eleven, raised his voice, and proclaimed: "Let the whole house of Israel know for certain that God has made both Lord and Christ. this Jesus whom you crucified." Now when they heard this, they were cut to the heart, and they asked Peter and the other apostles, "What are we to do, my brothers?" Peter said to them. "Repent and be baptized, every one of you, in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins; and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. For the promise is made to you and to your children and to all those far off. whomever the Lord our God will call." He testified with many other arguments, and was exhorting them, "Save yourselves from this corrupt generation." Those who accepted his message were baptized, and about three thousand persons were added that day.

You have returned to the shepherd and guardian of your souls.

Beloved:

If you are patient when you suffer for doing what is good, this is a grace before God.

For to this you have been called,

because Christ also suffered for you,

leaving you an example that you should follow in his footsteps.

He committed no sin, and no deceit was found in his mouth.

When he was insulted, he returned no insult;

when he suffered, he did not threaten;

instead, he handed himself over to the one who judges justly.

He himself bore our sins in his body upon the cross,

so that, free from sin, we might live for righteousness.

By his wounds you have been healed.

For you had gone astray like sheep,

Gospel John 10:1-10

Jesus said:

"Amen, amen, I say to you,

whoever does not enter a sheepfold through the gate

but climbs over elsewhere is a thief and a robber.

But whoever enters through the gate is the shepherd of the sheep.

The gatekeeper opens it for him, and the sheep hear his voice, as the shepherd calls his own sheep by name and leads them out.

When he has driven out all his own,

he walks ahead of them, and the sheep follow him,

because they recognize his voice.

But they will not follow a stranger;

they will run away from him,

because they do not recognize the voice of strangers."

Although Jesus used this figure of speech,

the Pharisees did not realize what he was trying to tell them.

So Jesus said again, "Amen, amen, I say to you,

I am the gate for the sheep.

All who came before me are thieves and robbers,

but the sheep did not listen to them.

I am the gate.

Whoever enters through me will be saved,

and will come in and go out and find pasture.

A thief comes only to steal and slaughter and destroy;

I came so that they might have life and have it more abundantly."

Apostles' Creed

The Church particularly recommends the use of the Apostles' Creed during Easter Time. This ancient Creed, dating back to the early centuries of the Church, is the basis of our baptismal promises.


I believe in God, the Father almighty, Creator of heaven and earth, and in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord,

Making a profound bow... who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary,

suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried; he descended into hell; on the third day
he rose again from the dead;
he ascended into heaven,
and is seated at the right hand
of God the Father almighty;
from there he will come
to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting. Amen.


OFFERTORY MY SHEPHERD, YOU SUPPLY MY NEED

The mosaic above is the central chapel in the Crypt Church of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington D.C. Appropriately, it has been the altar of repose for the Blessed Sacrament since 1926. The depiction of Jesus as the Good Shepherd is among the oldest themes in Christian art. The Greek abbreviation IC-XC and the word nika translate: "Jesus Christ / Victor." This mosaic contains every variety and color of pure gold.







and I desire to receive You in my body, my soul, and my whole being. Since I cannot at this moment receive you sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart.


I embrace You as if you were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen.
