The Last Supper by Leonardo da Vinci – Fresco – is among the most recognizable images in the world. The painting captures the scene that occured immediately after Christ tells the twelve that one of them will betray him.

Agnus Dei (Lamb of God) by Francisco de Zurbarán – Oil on canvas – Museo del Prado, Madrid. The Lamb of God is an expression of Christ's title as recorded in John's Gospel (John I: 29) when John the Baptist describes Jesus as 'The Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the World." Here, the Passover Lamb is bound and ready for sacrifice. In the New Passover, Jesus is the Lamb who, on Good Friday, was sacrificed to bring the world salvation.



THE EVENING MASS OF THE LORD'S SUPPER begins the Paschal Triduum – Latin for Three Days. These three days are the holiest in our liturgical calendar; in fact, to set them apart even more, the Church designates these three days as its own liturgical season. Due to this year's peculiar circumstances, the Washing of Feet (an optional rite) is omitted. The Collection on Holy Thursday is traditionally an offering for the poor. As we do at every Mass, we celebrate the Liturgy of the Eucharist, but tonight we have an opportunity to feel a deeper connection as we commemorate Christ instituting the Eucharist at the last supper. This evening's liturgy has no ending. Rather, the Triduum is viewed as one continuous liturgy or time of prayer. Strive to make these next days prayerful, so you can feel the presence of the sacred mysteries we're celebrating.

PRELUDE

LE BANQUET CÉLESTE

Olivier Messiaen (1908-1992)

"Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him."

Olivier Messiaen was one of the most prominent French composers of the 20th century. "Le Banque Céleste" was composed in 1928 while he was studying at the Paris Conservatory. A devout Catholic, Messiaen and based much of his music on scripture passages and religious ideas, like the one noted above. In this piece, the unique, sustained chords create an ethereal mood that remains throughout the piece. The pedal enters after a few minutes in an unusual way, playing staccato (short) notes "like drops of water" as Messiaen indicates. Scholars believe that this signifies drops of Christ's blood falling from the cross. The slow tempo and ambiguous nature of the piece hint that our perception of time is not that of God's. The piece ends on an unresolved chord, symbolizing that the celestial banquet, the Eucharist, is eternal.





LITURGY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING

The law regarding the passover meal.

Exodus 12:1-8, 11-14

The LORD said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt,

"This month shall stand at the head of your calendar; you shall reckon it the first month of the year.

Tell the whole community of Israel: On the tenth of this month every one of your families must procure for itself a lamb, one apiece for each household.

If a family is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join the nearest household in procuring one and shall share in the lamb in proportion to the number of persons who partake of it.

The lamb must be a year-old male and without blemish. You may take it from either the sheep or the goats. You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month, and then, with the whole assembly of Israel present, it shall be slaughtered during the evening twilight.

They shall take some of its blood and apply it to the two doorposts and the lintel of every house in which they partake of the lamb.

That same night they shall eat its roasted flesh with unleavened bread and bitter herbs.

"This is how you are to eat it: with your loins girt, sandals on your feet and your staff in hand, you shall eat like those who are in flight. It is the Passover of the LORD.

For on this same night I will go through Egypt, striking down every firstborn of the land, both man and beast, and executing judgment on all the gods of Egypt—I, the LORD!

But the blood will mark the houses where you are.

Seeing the blood, I will pass over you;

thus, when I strike the land of Egypt, no destructive blow will come upon you.

Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me."

For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the death of the Lord until he comes.

Gospel John 13:1-15

Before the feast of Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to pass from this world to the Father. He loved his own in the world and he loved them to the end.

The devil had already induced Judas, son of Simon the Iscariot, to hand him over. So, during supper, fully aware that the Father had put everything into his power and that he had come from God and was returning to God,

he rose from supper and took off his outer garments.

He took a towel and tied it around his waist. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and dry them with the towel around his waist. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Master, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered and said to him, "What I am doing, you do not understand now, but you will understand later." Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered him, "Unless I wash you, you will have no inheritance with me." Simon Peter said to him, "Master, then not only my feet, but my hands and head as well." Jesus said to him, "Whoever has bathed has no need except to have his feet washed, for he is clean all over; so you are clean, but not all."

For he knew who would betray him; for this reason, he said, "Not all of you are clean."

So when he had washed their feet and put his garments back on and reclined at table again, he said to them, "Do you realize what I have done for you? You call me 'teacher' and 'master,' and rightly so, for indeed I am.

If I, therefore, the master and teacher, have washed your feet, you ought to wash one another's feet. I have given you a model to follow, so that as I have done for you, you should also do."

We pray for those who seek spiritual, material or emotional assistance from our community of faith: that we may welcome them, assist them along life's journey, and share the gospel with them.

We pray for the intentions of those watching this broadcast. At this time, we will pause for a moment as you voice your intentions in your home, or type them in the comments field to share with your community.

We pray for our faithful departed loved ones, who ate the Divine Bread and drank the Holy Cup: that they may now share His victory over death in heaven.





This is the Body that will be given up for you; this is the Chalice of the new covenant in my Blood, says the Lord; do this, whenever you receive it, in memory of me.


A Prayer for Spiritual Communion
