




LITURGY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING

Isaiah 63:16b-17, 19b; 64:2-7

Oh, that you would rend the heavens and come down!

You, Lord, are our father, our redeemer you are named forever. Why do you let us wander, O Lord, from your ways, and harden our hearts so that we fear you not? Return for the sake of your servants the tribes of your heritage. Oh, that you would rend the heavens and come down, with the mountains quaking before you, while you wrought awesome deeds we could not hope for, such as they had not heard of from of old. No ear has ever heard, no eye ever seen, any God but you doing such deeds for those who wait for him. Would that you might meet us doing right, that we were mindful of you in our ways! Behold, you are angry, and we are sinful; all of us have become like unclean people, all our good deeds are like polluted rags; we have all withered like leaves, and our guilt carries us away like the wind. E'en So Lord Jesus

Paul O. Manz (1919-2009)

Paul and Ruth Manz wrote "E'en So, Lord Jesus, Quickly Come" in 1953 during a time when their three-year-old son, John, was critically ill. Ruth said, "I think we'd reached the point where we felt that time was certainly running out so we committed it to the Lord and said, 'Lord Jesus quickly come'."

She prepared some text for Paul for a composition based on the Book of Revelation. While at his son's bedside, Paul Manz began drafting the composition, which later became this piece. John recovered and is now a pastor. This piece is a staple in the choral repertoire with over 1 million copies sold world-wide.

Peace be to you and grace from him who freed us from our sins, Who loved us all and shed his blood that we might saved be.

Sing holy, holy to our Lord, the Lord, Almighty God, Who was and is and is to come; sing holy, holy, Lord!

Rejoice on earth, ye saints below,


For Christ is coming, is coming soon, for Christ is coming soon!
