

Gospel Reading

Dear Beloved Parishioners,

Many are called, but few are chosen to the priesthood. In the good old days, there were plenty of young men going into the seminary. Parents would be so proud of their son wanting to be a priest. They considered it an honor. Sometimes a younger brother would follow his older brother into the seminary. Not all became priests, but many did. St. Patrick's Seminary was quite full in those days. Even when I was at St. Patrick's Seminary, we had a sizable student body. There were about 34 seminarians in my class. At the end, fifteen seminarians were ordained to the priesthood.

In today's gospel passage, we hear Jesus calling two sets of brothers to follow him. They were the original priests of Jesus. They heeded the call and they were chosen. Jesus continues to call men to the priesthood. Given the scandal of priests in our beloved Church, the priesthood and being a priest does not look too appealing. Why would anyone want to be a part of that? It is understandable. Yet, priests are needed and the call still goes out. Do not the sick and dying need to receive the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick and Last Rites? Do not people need to confess their sins? Do not infants need to be baptized? Do not people want to celebrate the Sacrament of Matrimony? Most importantly, do not Catholics yearn and desire to receive the real presence of Christ at the mass?

The People of God have a role if not a responsibility to foster and support vocations to the priesthood. Vocations germinate from the home, and are nourished by all of us. I have been a priest a long time. Even I cannot live forever nor would I want to. In the near future, I would like to be able to retire, and play golf at all of my favorite golf courses throughout the world. God forbid the Archbishop require that I work into my nineties. If you think that a young or not too old of a man would make a good priest, encourage him. God just might be speaking through you to him. This is the kind of sign or affirmation that he needs.

We Believe

Mapping Revelation

Jesus' public ministry begins in Capernaum. Once John the Baptist announces the coming of the Messiah, Jesus assumes his role there as Teacher, Preacher, and Savior of the World. Located on the northern shore of the Sea of Galilee, Capernaum was a village of fishermen and farmers that stretched for about three hundred meters along the western shore of Lake Gennesaret. This village of about 1500 inhabitants was known as the "Way of the Sea," situated along the famous Imperial Road, which started from Egypt, passed through Damascus, and led to Mesopotamia. Capernaum marked the border between Galilee and the Golan.

To understand *why* the Gospel of Matthew makes a point of Jesus' locale, it must be noted that Galilee was inhabited by Israelites considered by all as semi-pagans because they were born from the intermingling of different peoples. The Jews of Jerusalem despised them because they were considered poorly educated, ignorant of the law, corrupt in customs, and less observant of the rabbinic provisions. They were also viewed with suspicion because of their subversive tendencies in the political arena. It was the Galileans who initiated the Zealot movement that caused the bloody revolts against the Roman Empire.

It is in this region at the edge of the holy land, in this "*Galilee of the Gentiles*," Jesus begins his mission and, with this geographical choice, indicates who are the first recipients of his light, not the pure Jews, but the tainted, the excluded, and the distant. This love of the outcast continues to be affirmed throughout Jesus' life and beyond. As the Gospel of Matthew states, "*The publicans and the prostitutes are ahead of you in the kingdom of heaven*" (Mt 21:31). So, in today's gospel reading, Jesus' geographical location serves to emphasize Christ's message of love for all humanity and, in his choosing of his first followers, his preference for the undervalued "outcasts" among us.
