

SOCIAL JUSTICE & PEACE COMMISSION EDUCATES PARISH FAMILIES

ON MARCH 1 AND 8, OUR PARISH LIFELONG FAITH FORMATION OFFICE INVITED THE SOCIAL JUSTICE & PEACE COMMISSION FOR AN AWARENESS BUILDING ACTIVITY WITH FAMILIES AT EACH OF OUR CHURCHES. COMMISSION MEMBERS WERE INVITED TO DISCUSS WHAT THE COMMISSION DOES AND THE IMPACT OUR PARISH MINISTRIES HAVE IN THE COMMUNITY. WHAT DOES IT MEAN WHEN A PERSON CALLS OUR PARISH FOR HELP WITH FOOD, FUEL, RENT, SOCIAL INTERACTION, LOVE & ATTENTION? HOW DO WE HELP PEOPLE NOT ONLY SURVIVE, BUT THRIVE? THROUGH A GROUP-CENTERED ACTIVITY, THE COMMISSION ENGAGED FAMILIES TO LOOK AT 4 AREAS OF ATTENTION WHICH OUR PARISH FOCUSES ON WHEN "REACHING OUT" TO PEOPLE: 1. NECESSARY CARE – THE BASIC THINGS THAT EVERY HUMAN BEING NEEDS TO LIVE A LIFE OF GOOD HEALTH AND DIGNITY 2. FAMILY HOME CARE – THE THINGS THAT EACH FAMILY NEEDS TO KEEP OUR LIVING SPACES SAFE AND RUNNING 3. MAKING CONNECTIONS – HELPING PEOPLE CONNECT WITH OTHER GROUPS IN OUR WIDER COMMUNITIES THAT CAN HELP THEM. 4. SPIRITUAL & EDUCATIONAL CARE – OUR SOULS, HEARTS, AND MINDS NEED SPECIAL THINGS TO GROW STRONGER AND CLOSER TO GOD & EACH OTHER.

The Commission on Social Justice and Peace for the Parish of the Holy Eucharist accepts the responsibility of serving as an instrument of God for the liberation and promotion of the poor. BLIND TO GOD?



One of my college roommates was fond of saying, "even a blind squirrel finds a nut occasionally." In today's Gospel, Jesus expresses the opposite sentiment. Even the most keen-sighted person can miss something obvious. When driving a vehicle, we are aware that there are blind spots where we will not notice another vehicle or object. Jesus challenges us to see that in life we have blind spots. Some of these may occur naturally. If we never had to deal with a serious illness, for example, we do not realize all the anxiety that may accompany it. We do not expect it and may not even recognize it for what it is at first. The people in Jesus' story had never seen such a miracle as the healing of a man born blind. They could be forgiven for not understanding everything.

However, some blind spots are created. The addict whose loved one tells them they need help and who replies that it is under control is not seeing reality clearly. They are interpreting data to suit them. The Pharisees do not want to give Jesus credit for anything, so they manufacture reasons to explain how this miracle did not happen or occurred through nefarious means. As disciples, we have an obligation to periodically review our lives. Do I have opinions and viewpoints that I do not like challenged? Do I have behaviors that I do not like others to look at and comment upon? In general, what are the things that put me most on the defensive? Those might be good places to look at in light of this Gospel. God may have sent someone into my life to help me overcome a weakness, and I am refusing to examine it. I may have so vilified someone or a position that I am not able to offer basic Christian charity and guidance to help the process of conversion and understanding.

Another way to see this is to appreciate the difference between a reason and an excuse. A reason is a principle or set of interpreted data that explains why I believe something. An excuse is subjective, often more of a feeling than logical deduction of facts. An excuse is frequently couched in terms of why an exception to general rules apply to me and my circumstance. In the story, if another Pharisee had prayed and affected the healing of the blind man, there would not have been a problem. Where am I possibly blind to God and the things of God, and how can I courageously and lovingly face this?

Laetare Sunday (Fourth Sunday of Lent)

Our Liturgical Color is ROSE
This Week's Theme: How can we learn to see with our hearts?

Gospel of John 9:1-41

Themes of this Sunday's Gospel:

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus opens the eyes of a man blind from birth. It is the man born blind who sees Jesus for who he really is, God. The man's neighbors, parents, and teachers have sight but are blind to who Jesus is. In many parishes, those preparing for Baptism receive the Creed this week.

Follow these 3 steps at home:

We Pray:

"O St Lucy, preserve the light of my eyes so that I may see the beauties of creation, the glow of the sun, the color of the flowers and the smile of children. Preserve also the eyes of my soul, the faith, through which I can know my God, understand His teachings, recognize His love for me and never miss the road that leads me to where you, St Lucy, ask God to protect my eyes and preserve my faith. St. Lucy, pray for us!! Amen."

We Talk:

Talk about all the different ways of "seeing." Although we often say, "Seeing is believing", or "Oh! I see what you mean!", or I can see another way of thinking about this." Talk together about how "believing is seeing." What is God's lesson for us in his healing of the blind man in the Gospel?

We Act:

With older youth: Have each member of the family write a "Prayer Tweet." That means that the prayer can be only 140 characters or less. The prayer should be about how important it is to really see or to ask God to help you overcome your blindness. Another family action: Explore the life of St. Lucy, who is the patron saint of those with visual impairments and is called the protector of the eyes.

SOCIAL JUSTICE & PEACE COMMISSION WORK AT PARISH OF THE HOLY EUCHARIST (continued from page 2)

The following is a summary of the work of the Commission that speaks to this calling in our parish, for the year ending 12/31/19:

Haiti: Donations received were \$24,314; Gifts given were \$36,600 for: our sister parish of Sacré Coeur de Meyer and its Cyvadier Community Center, parish of St Thérèse in Marbial, for feeding the school children. We also support the Twinning Foundation which oversees the Sister parish programs and their operations in Haiti.

Needy and Assistance Requests: The parish, through the Commission, received \$42,056 in donations from parishioners and offered \$41,382 in charity gifts for support work for: the area food pantries; summer recreation programs for area towns who identified families in need; and 2019 requests for assistance: Rent (11), Security (4), Mortgage (2), Motel (10), CMP (9), Water(0), Cable/Phone (1), Heating (11), Gas/car/gift card (6), Car payment (3), Car insurance (0), Car registration (3), Legal fees (2), Camp program (1), Reclass project (2), Food/gift cards (12), Gift cards (2), Medical (1), Moving costs (3); Town Assistance: Freeport (13), New Gloucester (5), Gray (9), So. Portland (5), Yarmouth (8), Lewiston (3), Brunswick (6), North Yarmouth (2), New Gloucester (5), Topsham (2), Pownal (4), Falmouth (1).

Parish wide activities sponsored by the Social Justice & Peace Commission:

Thanksgiving Appeals:

- * Parish-wide - gift food cards for 32/families/individuals for a total of \$825
- * Holy Martyrs - Baskets of Thanksgiving food and extra supplies were organized with 23 families and food for 110 people who benefited. About \$500 was used to purchase fresh fruit & vegetables, milk, and other items to complete the baskets.
- * St. Jude - Thanksgiving food drive for the Freeport Community Services Food Pantry received 39 bags of groceries. In addition, three turkeys were donated and checks to FCS for a total of \$350 as well as \$5.00 in cash.
- * St. Gregory - Thanksgiving appeal resulted in the following: 55 bags of food, 14 turkeys collected on Sunday; 40 bags of food, 19 turkeys. Donations of \$60 were used to buy fresh food paper products and supplies. The church delivered 12 boxes with food and turkeys. A donation of \$30 was used to purchase gluten-free items for a special family. A supply of 16 frozen turkeys was placed in the freezer and some extra food was stored temporarily for last-minutes needs. There was a donation of 4 turkeys to Chip Carney's "Seeds of Independence" organization.
- * Sacred Heart - 80 bags of food were delivered to the Yarmouth pantry in November

Christmas Appeals:

- * Parish-wide Christmas Giving Trees with roughly 575 gift tags; 44 gift cards valued over \$1,000; Food appeal/holiday baskets, with a full Christmas dinner, serving 114 people; food items to stock local pantries.
- * Long Creek gifts to 60 people at Long Creek Youth Development Center

- * Support for Habitat for Humanity - Collaboration with community towns of Yarmouth, North Yarmouth and Cumberland for the annual Good Friday walk.
- * Other Commission actions - regularly discuss other proposals suggested by Parishioners or diocesan contacts such as Catholic Charities; host guest speakers, such as the Director of the Gathering Place in Brunswick, a facility for the Homeless, help parish Aging with Grace Ministry to sponsor monthly Senior Lunches; support the Knights of Columbus school backpack campaign in the fall; support a parishioner's leadership in organizing a clothing collection campaign for new families coming into the Portland area.



Pots and Pans (Sets or individual pans in good condition are accepted)
Cleaning Supplies* such as:
Broom/dustpan, Sponges, Can of cleanser (i.e. Ajax), Laundry detergent, Dish detergent, All purpose Spray Cleaner, Toilet Brush


