DIVINE MERCY

Today is the Feast of Divine Mercy. In Notebook Five of her diary, Sr. Faustina writes the following message from God.



All grace flows from mercy and the last hour abounds with mercy for us. Let no one doubt concerning the goodness of God, even if a person's sins were as dark as night. God's mercy is stronger than our misery. One thing alone is necessary: that the sinner set ajar the door of his heart, be it ever so little, to let in a ray of God's merciful grace, and then God will do the rest.(1507)

One of the reasons that we often struggle with mercy is our selfishness. St Augustine describes sin as being bent over, only being able to see ourselves. If we could stand erect, we would see God and each other as the world really is, filled with God's love. Think about the times that you are angry, lack generosity, are unwilling to forgive or are extremely judgmental towards another. Is it really about anything that another has said or done, or is it more the compulsion to keep ourselves first and foremost?

I know for myself that I am tempted daily to decide what is fair, what I deserve, and not put that in the hands of God. Jesus may have taught us to turn the other cheek, but I am tempted to let the other know how much their action hurt before I do. We know what God wants. We have seen it in action in the life of Jesus, especially during his Passion. We rejoice when someone else shows us mercy and generosity. How do we do better?

Read again Sr. Faustina's words, "set ajar the door of his hear, be it ever so little..." Perhaps part of our difficulty is that we tend to be all or nothing types of people. We allow every failure to pull us all the way down, to reinforce the perceptions of the world and to give up more easily. We hear ourselves say, "I tried my best and was still selfish, I cannot do this."

Instead, seek God's grace. Did it take you a bit longer to pass judgment or become angry this time? God is present! Did you think more about sharing before you said no? God is in your heart! Look for these God moments. Instead of thinking about all your sinful behaviors, focus on one that you really want to work on for the moment. Don't focus on all the people who annoy you, choose one to forgive and seek reconciliation within the relationship. We see anything less than perfection as failure, whereas God encourages us to steadily make progress to ultimately achieve perfection. Allow the cracks in your hearts of selfishness to grow wider by recognizing God and the things of God and allowing them a home in your life. Here is a prayer to St. Thomas the Apostle that may help:

O Glorious Saint Thomas, our grief for Jesus was such that it would not let you believe he had risen unless you actually saw him and touched his wounds. But your love for Jesus was equally great and it led you to give up your life for him.

Pray for us that we may grieve for our sins which were the cause of Christ's sufferings. Help us to spend ourselves in his service and so earn the title of "blessed" which Jesus applied to those who would believe I him without seeing him. Amen.

On behalf of my brother priests, Deacon Dennis, and our parish staff, I want to thank all the parishioners who have shared notes and cards of encouragement, brought us meals and treats, and in general have affirmed our ministry in these challenging times. Your actions have brought us great joy and peace.

Divine Mercy Sunday

Our Liturgical Color is White This Week's Theme: Thomas Sees Jesus and Believes

Gospel of John 20: 19 - 31

Themes of this Sunday's Gospel:

When John wrote his Gospel, the other three Gospels of Mark, Matthew and Luke had already been written, so sometimes, John skipped over details already shared in the other Gospels. John was not a storyteller who wanted to simply share details or facts about Jesus' words and deeds. He wanted to take his readers right to the point: What is the point of Jesus' words and deeds? He wanted to bring his audience to deeper understanding.

An Easter recap which helps us to understand today's Gospel: John was often referred to as "the beloved disciple". After Mary Magdalene was the first to see the Risen Lord, she told the other disciples, who did not believe her. Peter and John, along with the others, ran to the empty tomb to "see" for themselves, and it is John, the "beloved disciple", through a graced moment of faith, who understood and believed that this was indeed the Resurrection that Jesus had talked about. He did not need to see Jesus to believe! John, in his Gospel reassures us that those who believe in the Risen Lord, without having seen him, are especially blessed.

In today's Gospel: Thomas is an Apostle who loves Jesus very much and he also depends on material or physical evidence. When the Risen Jesus appears among the gathered disciples, Thomas is not there, and when he returns, his co-disciples tell him that Jesus has appeared among them, but he does not believe them. Jesus comes back and this time, Thomas sees him. Jesus understands the human need for sensible signs and he invites Thomas to touch his wounds, at which Thomas exclaims, "You are my Lord and my God!"

We Pray: "Lord, you are a faithful and merciful God to all of us. May we come to you, ever so closely, this week, to walk with you, in your suffering and to witness your greatest act of Love. Have mercy on all of us. Amen."

We Talk: Do I see Thomas in myself? Do I see John, "the beloved disciple" in myself? Does Jesus understand me, us, humanity? What is the difference between "seeing" with our mind and with our heart? What are some things that just seem too hard to believe? What will help me believe that Jesus loves us, dies for us, and rose for us? Do I believe that I will rise agin too, along with all the people I
