

EXPERIENCING JESUS ANEW

Today's Gospel is a key moment in the life of Jesus. In leading this foreign woman in an exploration of faith, Jesus comes to understand that his mission is broader than he first understood. A key moment in the life of the Church is when the Apostles, led by Paul, recognize the same thing; the message of Jesus is for all people, not just the Jewish people.



Such moments are rarely easy to assimilate in one's life. We condition ourselves and are, in turn, conditioned by our surroundings to see the world in a specific way. There is "us" and there are a great many more of "them". We prefer the company of "us". We learn to do tasks a certain way. It is hard to do them a different way, even if that new way is more efficient or faster. We have reasons for what we believe. We often resist changing our belief, even when faced with evidence that our original reasons are flawed.

Experts sometimes call this conditional bias. We interpret information based on our prior experiences and beliefs. Think of any political conversation/argument you have ever had. Have you ever changed another's mind through reason and evidence? Has your mind ever been changed? As a rule, we tend to ignore or question evidence that challenge our beliefs and embrace without question evidence that supports our position. Destructive relationships are another common example. A person outside the relationship easily recognizes narcissistic, manipulative, dangerous, or cruel behavior against a loved one. The loved one, however, often makes excuses, minimizes what is happening, or is assured that they are truly loved, and things will be better soon.

Conditional bias is sadly very present in the spiritual life. Some people see God as a stern judge, waiting for us to make a mistake. Others primarily envision God as loving and merciful. Some believe that the liturgy and prayer should always look and sound a certain way. Others embrace a variety of experiences and music to worship God. Some people have a specific list of topics that the Church should never teach upon or be involved in, while others are convinced that the Church needs to shine the light of God's revelation on all aspects of human life.

The consequences are real. There are Catholics who seek confession multiple times a week convinced that God is angry with them, and other Catholics who have not been to confession in decades. The first sees sin everywhere; the latter explain the gravest of sins away. The Church is divided in so many ways. Tragically, the greatest divide is not because of the forces of the evil hammering the Church from the outside. The greater divide is from within, being intolerant of other Catholics because they act and believe differently.

Not everything new or different is from God. However, do we really believe that the God of the universe has nothing new to share with his Church, or with me? In the spirit of this weekend's Scripture, perhaps it is a good time to listen and not simply respond to someone with different beliefs; to try a new way of praying or seeing God in your life. At the very least, examine some of your "non-negotiables" in Catholicism. Are they truly a teaching of the Church, or a personal preference for you?

"In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. All of you people, come and praise our God! Let his praises be heard. God protects us from death and keeps us steady. Let us praise God! (Psalm 66:8-9, 20). In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen."

MATTHEW 15:21-28 - JESUS HEALS US

Today's Psalm verses, which our family has just prayed, and Matthew's Gospel, focus on God's will and power to save, which extends to all peoples. Jesus respects and gives dignity to all those he encounters. He makes up for all the ways in which, we, as human beings, do not always show respect and acceptance.

Do you remember Saint Sr. Katharine Drexel, who was featured on July 28, in our Summer Story Series? She was the one who inherited millions of dollars and gave it all away to help the poor and the forgotten, She was the one who denounced injustice head-on by fighting individual and institutional racism. St. Katharine influenced many people. Here is one example:

N ECKERT, OFM Cap.(1869-1923)

He is called a Servant of God & Apostle of the African Americans. What do the letters OFM CAP. mean? They mean: Order of Friars Minor Capuchin. Fr. Stephen is a priest in the Franciscan Capuchin order, just like Fr. Peter in our own parish! Fr. Stephen was born in Ontario, Canada, in 1869 of German (Bavarian) immigrant parents. As a young man, he was considered a talented athlete and was once described as "on paging impagaily at a page of the stephen was considered."

described as "an engine impossible to oppose!" In 1890, at the age of 21, he entered the Order of Franciscan Capuchins, at St. Bonaventure Friary in Detroit, Michigan. There, he would meet one great disappointment - there would be no sports to participate in. Stephen accepted this great sacrifice, and met the challenges of his studies with determination and was ordained to the priesthood on July 2nd, 1896. He once wrote to his Superior, "it is better, out of obedience, to gather leaves that have fallen from a tree, than to be involved in important enterprises or lofty tasks".

Fr. Eckert was moved by the compassionate example of Katharine Drexel (not yet a saint) and her Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament in Philadelphia. He felt called to serve African-American populations, and in 1913, he moved to Wisconsin to serve as pastor of St. Benedict the Moor Parish, in the city of Milwaukee's North Side. Fr. Stephen went door to door, reaching out to African-American families and their children at a time when their material and spiritual needs were being ignored by society. Together with the parish, they built a school and actively advocated for human rights and equality for all people. Fr. Stephen Eckert certainly became "an engine impossible to oppose" in his life's work and vocation! Fr. Stephen, pray for us! (This story adapted from The Capuchin Journey Magazine, issue 2, 2020)

THE INSTITUTE OF THE INCARNATE WORD

I am Fr. Jasper Santos from the Institute of the Incarnate Word, currently serving as missionary priest based in Hong Kong.

First, I would like to thank Bishop Robert Deeley of the Diocese of Portland and your parish priest, Fr. Philip Tracy for allowing us to do this Mission Appeal in your parish. Although we planned to speak at your churches in person, the Coronavirus has made our appeal to you via written communication.

The Institute of the Incarnate Word is a religious congregation dedicated to the evangelization of the culture. This means that we shall go and work according to the will of the Holy Spirit in every place He sends us. By preaching the Gospel in various forms, we help our Lord and the Church to uplift the cultures according to the standard of the Gospel. This has brought us to difficult mission places, as in Gaza Strip, Syria, Tanzania, Guyana, Papua New Guinea and Solomon Islands.

Your contribution for this Mission Appeal will help these mostly neglected countries, for example, the Solomon Islands. Perhaps, if I tell you about the Battle of Guadalcanal and John F. Kennedy and the PT109, you may get some clues about that country. There in Solomon Islands, we were assigned a parish living among the migrants from Kiribati. Our parishioners live in extreme poverty as their community is isolated from the rest of the country: no electricity, no running water, food is scarce, school buildings are collapsing. Even the healthcare service is poor. However, there I found people with deep and fervent faith. The Mass attendance is very strong, rosaries are said at homes every evening, people approach the sacraments. As the faith is waning in the richer part of the globe, there in the Solomon's it is maintained. We want to keep their faith pure and intact, so that the material poverty may not be a cause of spiritual poverty. We have activities to uplift the people, mainly through education, livelihood programs all to complement the spiritual activities as the administration of sacraments and preaching retreats among many others.

The Institute of the Incarnate Word uses the funds collected from the mission appeals to care for the disabled, the elderly, and the sick, provide homes for the poor and for abandoned children, manage schools and educational institutions in rural areas in developing countries, and promote pastoral formation of our missionaries related to human, intellectual, and spiritual development. Present in 40 countries, our most challenging missions are in Argentina, Bolivia, Ecuador, Guyana, Iraq, Palestine (Gaza), Papua New Guinea, Peru, Syria, Tajikistan, Tanzania, and Ukraine among others.

The collected funds will be used for the day-to-day support for missionaries, to supply material goods, to finish projects, and to meet the basic needs in rural areas where we work. The children, the elderly, the sick, the poor, the abandoned, the handicapped, and the suffering will benefit from these funds. Your support funds basic needs - such as food and medicine, pastoral works, vehicles to arrive to remote rural areas where there are no roads, to build seminaries and churches to provide hope where the Catholic faith is a minority or does not exist at all for the enrichment of the evangelization program around the world.


