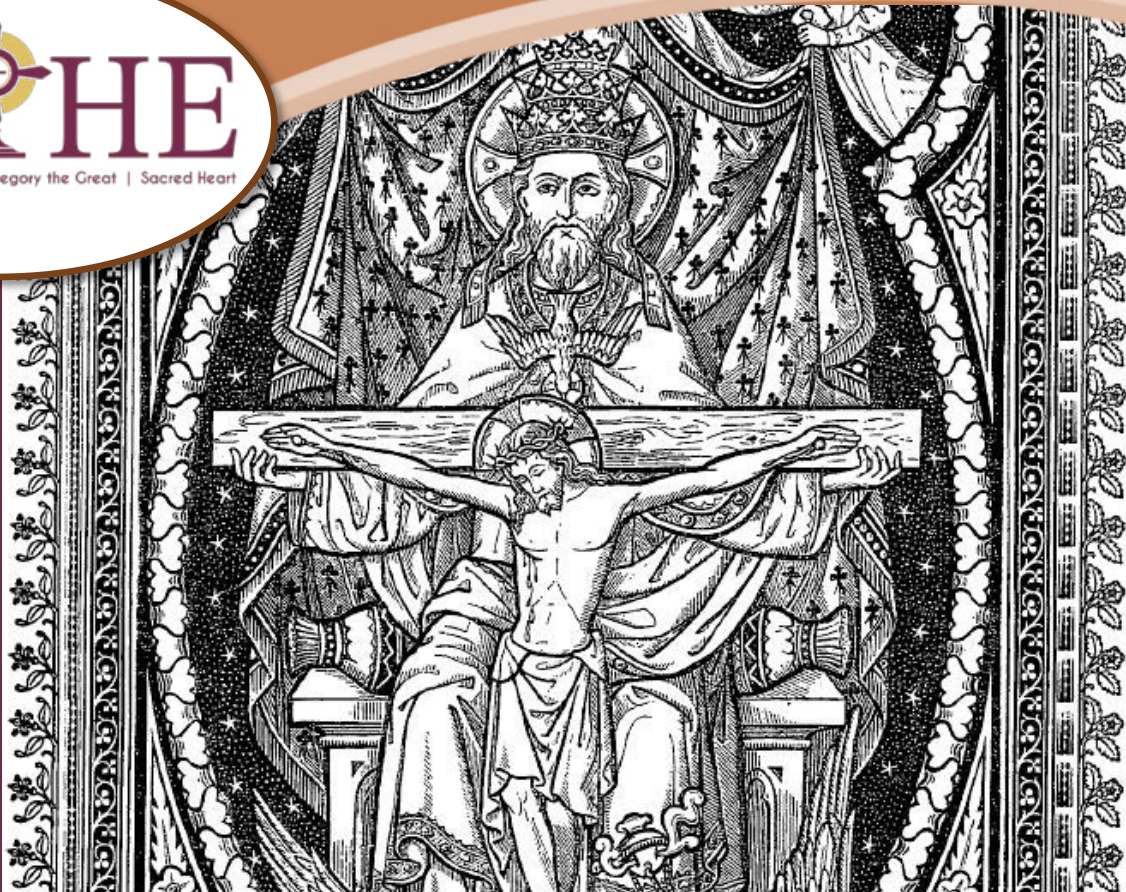

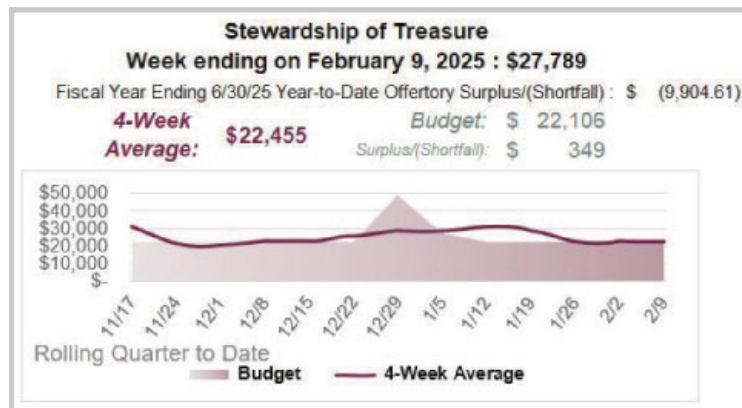

PASTOR'S PONDEROSA



My dear parishioners,

As we have entered the holy season of lent, I would like to remind all of us of our Lenten duties of **fasting and abstinence**. It is a traditional doctrine of Christian spirituality that a basic part of repentance, of turning away from sin and back to God, includes some form of penance, without which the Christian is unlikely to remain on the narrow path and be saved (Jer 18:11, 25:5; Ez 18:30, 33:11-15; Joel 2:12; Mt 3:2; Mt 4:17; Acts 2:38). Christ Himself said that His disciples would fast once He had departed (Lk 5:35).

The **law of fasting** requires a Catholic from their 18th to the 59th birthday to reduce the amount of food eaten from normal. The Church defines this as one meal a day, and two smaller meals, which if added together would not exceed the main meal in quantity. **Such fasting is obligatory on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.** The fast is broken by eating between meals and by drinks which could be considered food (milk shakes, but not milk). Alcoholic beverages do not break the fast; however, they seem to be contrary to the spirit of doing penance.

The **law of abstinence** requires a Catholic 14 years of age until death to **abstain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and the Fridays of Lent** in honor of the Passion of Jesus on Good Friday. Meat is considered to be the flesh and organs of mammals and fowl. Also forbidden are soups or gravies made from them. Salt and freshwater species of fish, amphibians, reptiles, and shellfish are permitted.

Yes, there are some who are excused from fast and abstinence: Besides those outside the age limits, those of unsound mind, the sick, the frail, pregnant or nursing women according to need for meat or nourishment, manual laborers according to need, guests at a meal who cannot excuse themselves without giving great offense or causing enmity, and other situations of moral or physical impossibility to observe the penitential discipline are excused.

There is a lot going on in our parish during this holy season. I would like to direct your attention to the *Ideas for a Fruitful Lent* card which you received last weekend, as well as to the LENT tab at the top of our website. Also, please be aware that a new weekly confession time has been added. There will be a priest hearing confessions now on **Tuesdays at St. Gregory the Great in Gray, from 5:30-6:30 pm.**

Servant of God, Catherine Doherty once said, "*Lent is a time of going very deeply into ourselves... What is it that stands between us and God? Between us and our brothers and sisters? Between us and life, the life of the Spirit? Whatever it is, let us relentlessly tear it out, without a moment's hesitation.*"

Lent is meant to be a time of spiritual renewal, where we look at our lives and determine where we need to improve. As we progress during this season, may we reflect on this passage from Catherine Doherty and look at ourselves to see what we need to get ready for our final voyage to Heaven.

MUSINGS ON THE ORATORY—PART 2 FOOD AND GAMES

As mentioned last week, fun was a key part of Don Bosco's Oratory. As you may have already gathered, I'm a convert to the concept. My default would be to skip to the classroom content and not worry about anything else. My mind changed on it back when I was a Cap Corps Volunteer. We had a summer service retreat called the "Capuchin Outreach Program" or "COP." For a week, high school students stayed at our retreat house on the Hudson River, did service projects at different sites during the day, and came back for prayer and activities (and sleep) at night.

On the third day of the retreat, Fr. Marvin (the chaplain) announced we would be having "Messy Games." I've included a picture of Fr. Marvin during the games to give you a sense of what I mean by mess. Mess included things like going down a slip and slide covered in paint or covering the Cap Corps Volunteer from head to toe in shaving cream. When the games were over and the teens went back into the retreat house to clean up, the blue footprints that covered the floor made it look like we had been invaded by an army of Smurfs.



When I first heard this was the plan, I expressed my reservations to Fr. Marvin. Mess like this didn't sound like a good time to me. What was the point exactly? He said, "Wait and see. In past years, this was the point in the retreat where the teens really started to love each other." He was right. There were a lot of laughs during the games, but the dynamic shifted completely in the wake of them. They had a chance to let their guard down around each other. After that they started building friendships and they started opening up to the retreat in a way they hadn't before. There was nothing catechetical about the games, but after them they were open to hearing catechesis. I was pleasantly surprised.

No such messes happen at the Oratory, but we do start every night off with games. One of the teens rings the bell in the church tower to signal the start of the Oratory, we say an opening prayer, and then we play games like spoons, Mafia, Lobster Mobster, etc. While the games are going on, dinner is cooking in the kitchen. One of our volunteers cooks a full dinner for them every Oratory night. When dinner is ready, we say grace and then (much to the chagrin of the middle school boys), the girls go first for food.

Like Don Bosco, we're trying to create a place that is both a home and a place of fun. Bit by bit the teens (who come from all over our parish) have gotten to know each other and it has made the prayer and learning aspects of the Oratory more fruitful. More on that next week.

NEW ADDITION TO CONFESSION SCHEDULE: This Lent, our faithful priests are providing another weekly opportunity for us to experience the healing Sacrament of Reconciliation. PARISH LENTEN RETREAT: Our Lenten Retreat this year will be March 24-26 at 11:00 am at Sacred Heart or 5:00 pm at St. Gregory the Great. Each session will include a talk on the Sacred Heart of Jesus followed by prayer and meditation. For those who wish to participate at home, talks and meditations will be available under parish website Lent tab.

PARISH READ: We will once again be undertaking a parish spiritual read. Fr. Cartwright selected Bishop Barron's *Introduction to Prayer*. This book offers a collection of rich yet brief reflections on prayer in the Catholic spiritual tradition from acclaimed author, speaker, and theologian, Bishop Robert Barron. This book explores the answers to questions like: Why should I pray? What should I say or do when I'm praying? Who exactly am I praying to? Are there different types of prayer? What do the spiritual masters say about prayer?, How can I establish a solid routine of prayer? Fr. Cartwright hopes this book will inspire us to seek out more frequent conversation and a deeper communion with God, not only through Lent but beyond. Available now at all churches. FASTING

THINGS PERHAPS FORGOTTEN ABOUT FASTING: Those who are between the ages of 18-59 are obliged to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Fasting consists of one full meal and two smaller meals that together are not equal to one full meal. Those who are age 14 and older are obliged to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and all Fridays during Lent. For exceptions, please refer to [Fasting Exceptions: USCCB pdf](#), which can also be found on our website under the Lent tab.

FAST FROM WHAT? In Fr. Cartwright's February 16 Pastor's Ponderosa, he suggested additional fasting for our other senses. He wrote, "For example, you can fast for your ears by turning off the car radio, television, or music app for a certain time each day or week. You can fast your eyes by turning off the television, computer, or tablet at regular times each day or week. You can avoid going to or watching movies on Netflix to fast for your eyes. Giving up shopping as a recreation for a certain day or week of Lent is a way to give our senses a break from stimulation. Some people avoid entertainment in public during Lent such as dancing, gambling, or concerts. All of these are actually very small penances, but they are a way to make Lent different from the rest of the year and to remind ourselves that many people in the world go without these pleasures every single day. These small penances are a way to simplify our life to focus on what is really important, namely, our faith and our loved ones."
