Despite the challenges of this year, there are many blessings we have received. Let us continue to pray for our leaders, both spiritual and political, that they may use their authority to create an environment where everyone lives in peace, where love and progress are established, and where the dignity of human life is respected from conception to death.

Lastly, as we come to the end of the year 2023, let us have a deeper reflection on our past and see how we can make amendments in the coming year. As the year goes on, our days are becoming shorter on earth; there is a need to ask some fundamental questions: Where will I be after this earthly journey?
