

Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Why do we believe in Jesus and the Catholic Church? Why should we continue to do so? We've never seen him face-toface (at least not most of us, I assume). Most of us have never had mystical visions of angels or saints. We live in the same world as our atheist and secularists friends. Why do we believe in Christ if we've never seen him?

The simple, symbolic answer the Gospel presents to us this week might surprise us: we believe because of John the Baptist. Early in John's Gospel we hear: "There was a man sent from God, his name was John. He came for testimony, to bear witness to the light, that all might believe through him." The Baptist powerfully announces Jesus. This is a historical fact, and it is also now a pattern at work in our lives.

John the Baptist stands for the entirety of the old covenant, everything entrusted to the Jewish people. And yet he prophetically opens the door to something entirely new in Jesus, to the revival and fulfillment of God's promises. In every generation, and in every human life, God continues to do this. He has done it through people named Augustine, Francis, Catherine, Theresa, and countless others. In my life, the Baptist's spirit has come through persons named Eric, Paul, Mary, and Ron. I challenge you to name at least three people through whom God has announced the coming of Jesus in your life. Consciously thank God for their testimony. And let's commit ourselves to listening to the spirit of John the Baptist testify again this week so that we might more strongly believe in the light.



Our Rector's Ramblings

Every study of Americans who self-identify as non -churchgoing, indicate that they are willing to accept an invitation to attend a church service with someone they trust. Not only are they willing to attend a service with someone they trust they are willing to have discussions about faith with someone they trust. There are two important words here, trust and discussion. When I trust someone I know that they have my best interests at heart, they desire my good, they desire our friendship to grow, and they are acting out of care, compassion, and love. A discussion is an exchange of ideas with the goal of greater understanding for both. Just like trust is not ever one-sided a discussion is not one-sided either.

As people of faith, we can use this information to inform our life this Holy Season. Perhaps we can invite someone we know to come to a Christmas Mass with us. It may mean that we go to the time that works best for them, not following our preferences. It could look like carpooling, or meeting for coffee to talk about what to expect. It may mean finding a little monthly booklet with the readings and how Mass moves along, so that our guest doesn't feel overwhelmed by what is normal for us and strange for someone else. It may look like having a question for dinner like, "What does Christmas mean for me?" or "What is my favorite holiday memory?" And listening and sharing and honoring our different experiences. Practically speaking it means a little preparation to be the hospitable host who reflects Jesus to the world. Imagine that our radical welcome and invitation filled our Church to overflow and if only one of our guests experiences the Love of Jesus in a tangible and real way. Or our tables filled with food and drink becoming filled with understanding and deep life giving conversation. May Jesus be born in us all. ~ Blessings, Fr. Tony~.
