

A Note From Fr. Patrick

Happy Pentecost

The Solemnity of Pentecost is one of the primary feasts of the Catholic liturgical year alongside Christmas and Easter. Yet, sadly, it is often overlooked.

When those of us who have received the sacrament of Confirmation were going through our classes, we were taught of the importance of the Holy Spirit in our lives; how God deigns to dwell in our souls, completely united to our inmost being.

God became a human being. God united our humanity to His divinity in Jesus. He loves us so much; He didn't stop there. He sends forth His very Spirit, His very breath to be with us. In the unity of the Holy Spirit, we are always united to God, we are never forsaken. No sin cannot be forgiven. No pain or suffering is unredeemable. Every moment is filled with the power and beauty of God.

In the hymn from Pentecost, the "Veni, Sancte Spiritus," we hear this:

Cleanse that which is unclean, water that which is dry, heal that which is wounded.

Bend that which is inflexible, fire that which is chilled, correct what goes astray.

Give to your faithful, those who trust in you, the sevenfold gifts.

Grant the reward of virtue, grant the deliverance of salvation, grant eternal joy.

The Solemnity of Pentecost is the celebration of God working in us, of God calling us to conversion and giving us His very self to make that happen, of the joys and wonder of living in unity with God.

After several months of combatting an unseen and virulent virus, which has thrown almost every aspect of our lives into chaos and confusion, we celebrate this Pentecost the unseen and benevolent Holy Spirit, who draws us into the depths and riches of God's love and mercy and who brings clarity and purpose to the chaos and confusion.

Reopening St. Paul Catholic Center: Phase III

Press time for the bulletin is on Wednesdays so it is nearly impossible to keep it up-to-date with the changes that happen day-to-day with our response to the coronavirus pandemic and our reopening plan. For the most up-to-date information, please visit our website: hoosiercatholic.org

At the time of writing (May 26), we are planning to reopen St. Paul's for the public celebration of Sunday Masses the weekend of June 6 and 7. Our Mass schedule will be our normal, academic break Sunday schedule: Saturday, 4:30 pm

Sunday, 8:30 am, 10:30 am, 12:30 pm (Spanish), and 5:30 pm

We will need to keep to the guidelines of the local and state government as a well as those provided to us by the Archdiocese. As a result, we will initially be limited to around 100 people at each Sunday Mass. This will require us to continue, until further notice, to use Eventbrite and have people sign up online before attending Mass.

I want to stress again the necessity of referring to the website for the most up-to-date information. We are working diligently to keep it updated as frequently as possible.




My Jesus, I believe that you are present in the Most Holy Sacrament.

Amen.








