# Note from the Pastor

Dear St. Paul Parishioners,

Religious Education Program

As I have mentioned previously, I have been working the past few weeks to ensure the continuation of our religious education program through the end of this school year. The interim steps we take now will give us time to explore and determine the best path forward for our religious education ministry.

This spring, we will complete the programs for sacramental preparation for First Communion and Confirmation which began in the Fall. A group of volunteers will lead our first communicants and their families for the rest of the year. Bridget McIntyre will lead our Confirmation program. For our other religious education classes, we will collaborate with the religious education program at St. Charles for the remainder of the school year.

St. Charles currently offers both online and hybrid faith formation classes to accommodate the different needs of families at this time. Fr. Tom Kovatch and Rose Johnson, the Coordinator of Religious Education at St. Charles, are eager to collaborate with us in this ministry. I am grateful for their support and willingness to work with us during this transition.

Concerning next steps, in the coming days, Rose Johnson will email our families to explain the process of joining the St. Charles program. To contact Rose directly, you can email her at rjohnson@stcharlesbloomington.org.

To further help with this transition, St. Paul's will be covering any costs associated with this transition so as not to put any additional financial strain on our families. Furthermore, we will schedule more opportunities this spring there will be more opportunities for parents to meet with me as we explore religious education beyond this school year.

In the interest of full disclosure, I want to share with you that the distinct challenges we face—fewer children in religious education and limited financial resources—require an openness and creativity in developing a more permanent path forward for religious education. We remain committed to serving our families and educating our children in our Catholic faith, but I am not sure what this will look like beyond this school year.

At the same time, I am excited about the opportunities this transition creates for us as a Catholic community here at St. Paul's and in Bloomington. I am also aware that even the possibility of adjustments can be scary and frustrating. I ask, therefore, each of us to pray for the guidance of the Holy Spirit during this transition and for an openness on our part us to following the Spirit's promptings.

# Catholic Charities





Because our human families struggle with weakness and sin, we have to come back to the Holy Family often for inspiration and guidance. # **Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture**

Tragedy and disappointment are inevitable. What sees you through this? There will be challenges, changes, unexpected circumstances, interrupted plans, hurts, and injustices experienced by every human being at some point in their lives. We will be asked to adjust our plans, change course, and even encounter suffering and death. Where do we learn all of the lessons we need to live life well? Some of them we learn along the way but much of what we bring to life, positive and negative, comes from our early beginnings, our families. This is our early world and provides the blueprint for how we see the bigger, more inclusive world, which unfolds before us.

Our families of origin can be sources of grace, heartache or a combination of both. Families are intended to be pivotal in providing us with proper social structure and understanding, a support system, lessons about relationships and communication, and the unconditional acceptance and love we so desperately crave. They can also determine whether we have an accessible and healthy relationship with God. Many of life's challenges can literally bring us to our knees and require that we possess a strength of character that resides well beyond the superficialities of our world. At some point we will all need three coping gifts that can be given to us only by God: faith, hope, and love. Our families help us learn that we are not the ones responsible for their creation, but God!

Our experience of early family life colors all of our relationships and what we expect to achieve from life in general. Resolving conflicts, dealing with difficulty and suffering, celebrating accomplishments, prioritizing our needs, listening to God's call, understanding relationships, understanding disappointment, learning about the virtues and living a centered focused life are all lessons our families either succeed in teaching or do not. To succeed, as God has designed and ordered our world, is to discover his presence and then trust that Presence. The Holy Family can teach even the most dysfunctional family how to best use God's gifts of faith, hope, and love to find him and do his will. Their simple humble example is always before us, showing us the way. Jesus, Mary and Joseph, pray for us!
