Letter from a Priest

Dear Parishioners,

One of the great ironies of life is that my favorite spaghetti sauce is my German grandmother's recipe. About once or twice a year I have the time to make it.

We called her "Grandma Jo," and she was an amazing cook. As she got older, she could not cook as much, so her task at holiday gatherings was to prepare the sweet potatoes. Not the canned ones, mind you, the real thing!

My other grandmother, whom we simply called "Grandma," was also an amazing cook. She was Polish (she was my maternal grandmother), and she made horseradish sauce, which we think might be her mother's recipe. We are not sure. During my over thirty years as a Dominican, I have made it for every community in which I have lived. I will make it again this week. I am told I will be having ham on Thanksgiving night, so I will bring a bowl of it for the ham and to share with my hosts!

It is great on ham and beef.

Grandma also prepared the stuffing for the turkey. I can still taste it.

My great aunt Rose, on my dad's side, was known for her flour biscuits. I don't know if anyone ever saw her make them, but they were always served at family gatherings, most memorably Christmas Eve. When she died, her children (my dad's cousins) put the biscuit recipe on her memorial card. It was the first time many of us saw the list of ingredients: whole milk, lard, flour, butter. We all agree that if we substituted something healthier, Aunt Rose would haunt us! They also wouldn't taste as good.

As we celebrate Thanksgiving this week, we are aware that this is the beginning of several weeks of gatherings that include food. Family recipes will be brought out and traditions will be continued.

Perhaps mothers and grandmothers will assist their children and grandchildren in cooking and baking using time tested family recipes! We often give thanks for the love and generosity of the people in our lives. And, of course, we are called to give thanks to God. Thanksgiving is a special day for that, when we pay more attention to the act of giving thanks.

We all have memories of food. I know that Grandma Jo's spaghetti is made correctly simply by the smell. As we gather to give thanks to each other during this season, let us take the time to acknowledge those whose love and skills provide us with continued food memories!

The fact that our loved ones live on in our memories is proof of the Resurrection. It is up to us to ensure their legacies continue. We can certainly give thanks for our loved ones through the food we prepare!


Mass Schedule for Week of November 20

St. Cecilia

Feast day: November 22

In the city of Rome there was a virgin named Cecilia, who came from an extremely rich family and was given in marriage to a youth named Valerian. She wore sackcloth next to her skin, fasted, and invoked the saints, angels, and virgins, beseeching them to guard her virginity. During St. Cecilia's wedding ceremony she was said to have sung in her heart to God and before the consummation of her nuptials, she told her husband she had taken a vow of virginity and had an angel protecting her. Valerian asked to see the angel as proof, and Cecilia told him he would have eyes to see once he traveled to the third milestone on the Via Appia (Appian Way) and was baptized by Pope Urbanus.

Following his baptism, Valerian returned to his wife and found an angel at her side. The angel then crowned Cecilia with a chaplet of rose and lily and when Valerian's brother, Tibertius, heard of the angel and his brother's baptism, he also was baptized and together the brothers dedicated their lives to burying the saints who were murdered each day by the prefect of the city, Turcius Almachius.

St. Cecilia is regarded as the patroness of music, because she heard heavenly music in her heart when she was married, and is represented in art with an organ or organ-pipes in her hand.
